FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

SILENT IN THE PRESENCE OF GOD

Modern people find it difficult to pray. Jewish prayer is based on the hypothesis that you can hold a conversation with the Source of Life; that this Source is interested in you and cares about you; that you need no intermediator to reach It. Our concept of prayer assumes that God is ideal love and justice and that God beckons to us to come to Him (It). That is, prayer is part of the process through which we take the qualities we associate with God into ourselves.

Prayer, then, is serious business. It is part of a process of becoming, becoming like God. As in anything else, to participate in prayer properly, one must train for the moment. One must prepare to pray. In all religions it is beieved that this preparation stage must be one of silence, i.e. one tries to shut out all the sounds and thoughts associated with routine living, and one tries to concentrate on thoughts of God. The Christian thinks of Jesus. The Eastern mystic thinks of nothing. The Jew tries to think of ideal love and justice, a living love.

When my mother used to light the candles, she would put herself in such a mood. For several minutes she would stand there at the candles, quiet, sincerely reaching for the highest of which she was capable of conceiving. When I was in Israel last I ventured into the synagogue area to the left of the Western Wall. Far into that area, in a remote corner, I found a bearded man praying with such K'vanah (intention) that every bone and muscle in his body was involved. He was saying the traditional prayers but with a spontaneity of his own creativi-

I inevitably contrast the spirit of praying people with the attitude and practice of many people who come to Beth Am for Shabbat Services. For many of these people the Sanctuary is just like any other room, an auditorium perhaps, a meeting place, anything but a special place in which one prepares to meet God, in which one attempts to reach out to the Source of our being.

Some adults come to me to complain about young people who have no understainding of what a prayer service should be, and indeed there are many youngsters who have to learn that the Sanctuary is a special place where one rehearsesquietness. But I cannot help feel that these youngsters are merely reflecting the attitude of their parents and other adults who treat the Sanctuary with disrespect.

I am quite aware of the fact that in Eastern Europe, the Synagogue was never a Cathedral. It was indeed a meeting place where village folk related to each other in an intimate if unsophisticated fashion. There is something good about this, and I have never anticipated the icy silence of a Cathedral in the Synagogue. But there is a limit to informality and bounds which even warm folksiness must observe.

Beth Amites, who are ordinarily so attentive once a service begins, must learn how to prepare for prayer in appropriate quietness. We must start with the adults. If we can train them, then the young people will come along.

Temple Beth Am Fiscal Policy

The fiscal year of the Temple begins July 1 and ends June 30. Fair Share Dues for the forthcoming year become due on July 1.

- Registration forms for membership and Religious Schools will not be offered to members until all past due accounts are paid.
- One half of the dues is due on July 1. All balances are due by December 31.
- Registration fees for Religious and Hebrew Schools are due at the time of registration.
- Registration for Nursery/Kindergarten, Day School or Summer Camp will be honored for those members of the Temple who are current in their dues and fees.
- Capital Fund pledges are due on July 1 of the year for which you are registering.
