"Souls on Fire" by Elie Wiesel Reviewed by Rabbi Baumgard, Nov. 18th

In honor of Jewish Book Month, Rabbi Baumgard will review the book "Souls on Fire" by Elie Wiesel at the Friday evening service of November 18th at 8:15 p.m. Rabbi Baumgard will use the book as a springboard to discuss the contribution of Hasidism to modern Judaism.

Rabbi Baumgard explains, "We consider Beth Am to be a Hasidic-Reform congregation, in the sense that we consciously take the emotional aspects of Hasidism and the rational aspects of Reform and try to blend them into a harmonious whole."

While Mr. Wiesel's book attempts to present the leaders and teachers of Hasidism as the "Souls on Fire" which they indeed were, Rabbi Baumgard will speak not only of these leaders but also of the special doctrines associated with them. Rabbi Baumgard will say, "Hasidism was an emotional revolt against Orthodoxy in its origins, whatever it has become in its modern manifestations. Its leaders tried to demonstrate that God was closer than breathing, which meant that He was best found in human relationships and in nature, rather than in intellectually oriented books like the Talmud. Hasidic leaders taught, "Judaism is the religion of people, rather than the religion of the Book".

As might be expected this revolt aroused the opposition of Talmudic scholars who feared that the people would be led away from study (as they were). "In spite of the problems of Hasidic excesses," Rabbi Baumgard will say, "it has given us an interpretation of Judaism which is tremendously important even to this day. All Jews should be, at least in part, Hasidic".

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

A New Study on Intermarriage*

(Part Two)

Last week we discussed the recent survey reported by UPI indicating that when a Jew and a non-Jew married, and the non-Jew did not convert to Judaism, 92% of the children of such a marriage marry a non-Jew. The evidence supports those of us who have long held that, unless a marriage is committed to Judaism from the beginning, it tends to weaken the Jewish people. For that reason intermarriage (a marriage where each partner maintains his separate faith) can be a threat to Jewish survival.

Again, let us remind ourselves, that when a non-Jew converts to Judaism prior to the marriage, the marriage is not an intermarriage. A convert stands as a Jew under the chupah. The children of this kind of marriage, IF the marriage is a good one, and IF the parents work to establish Jewish commitment, can be good for the Jews. On the other hand, if the marriage is not a good one, it is not unusual for debates to develop, even if the non-Jew has converted, as to what is to happen to the children, religiously speaking. We must admit that bringing a non-Jew into our Jewish mishpachah carries risks. Sometimes we make a significant gain. Sometimes we lose grievously.

This brings us to the current debate on patrilineal descent. It has long been true in Jewish life that a child born to a Jewish mother was considered to be Jewish, no matter who the father was. On the other hand, even if there were a Jewish father, the child of a non-Jewish mother (unless she converted) was considered to be officially a member of the mother's faith. In its recent convention, the Central Conference of American Rabbis (Reform) passed a resolution stating, "The child of any Jewish parent is presumed to be Jewish, and this presumption may be affirmed by active steps such as circumcision, naming in the synagogue, Bar/Bat Mitzvah, Confirmation, and the like."

The purpose of this resolution, which has been attacked by the Orthodox, was to encourage mixed-marriage families to register their children in our schools and to assure these families that we would be happy to work with them. Reform Rabbis are convinced that we have to do everything possible to save Jews for the future.

In Beth Am, we have always admitted children to our schools without inquiring about their pedigrees. We take such registration as a commitment by the parents to raise their children as Jews. We welcome such children with open arms. Similarly, we welcome couples to membership without asking their pedigrees. We assume that such membership is a commitment which delights us. We do not require conversion of a non-Jew who seeks admission to the Temple. Should they wish to go through the conversion process later, they are more than welcome.

The Union of American Hebrew Congregations, our parent organization, has established a national "Outreach Program" to mixed-married couples. Beth Am has always had its own such program. We want to help Jews remain Jews, we want to guide children of uncertain orientation into our faith, and we want to let non-Jews know that we are anxious to have them learn more about our religion. We Jews are not "savers of souls", but we do want to save our people.
