FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

On the World Council of Churches

The World Council of Churches has consistently passed resolutions in its General Assembly which call for the return of Israel's armed forces to the 1967 armistice lines. These resolutions ignore the battles initiated by the Arabs since that time (remember the Yom Kippur War!), and they require that Israel place its neck under the knife of Arab "good intentions." This same World Council refused to pass a resolution condemning the Soviet Union for the Invasion of Afghanistan, while it condemned United States policy in Central America.

What is going on in the World Council of Churches? Well, first of all we must understand that this policy of the W.C.O.C. is not a new one. Secondly, we should know that the Council is organized much like the U.N., in the sense that it has representatives from every country in the world, many of which are behind the Iron Curtain, and many of which are from Arab or Islamic lands. A vote in the W.C.O.C. thus reflects much of the politics of the world, and we must remember that delegates from many of these countries are not free, as are American delegates, to vote freely.

The delegates which are the friendliest to Israel are the delegates from American fundamentalist churches, that is to say, those churches that interpret the Bible literally. These fundamentalist churches are pro-Israel for their own reasons. They see what is happening there as the forerunner of the second coming of Jesus. It is these churches, which have much strength in the U.S., which refuse to swallow Arab propaganda.

The vote urging Israel to return to the 1967 Armistice lines passed by about 60%-40%. Considering the background of the delegates, this was not as bad as it seems.

The resolution also called for Israeli abandonment of the West Bank and the internationalization of Jerusalem. The latter point fascinates many Christians even when they are positively oriented towards the State of Israel. Christians tend to think of Jerusalem as the holy city of Jesus. That is, they think of the city in Christian spiritual terms and not in terms of the hundreds of thousands of Jews who are settled there. The pragmatic and political realities of the city are not the most significant thing to these Christians. Israelis, of course, wonder how so many of them can be ignored, although they have demonstrated an intense respect for the holy places of all religions.

To some Christians, the presence of a Jewish nation in the holy land is a passing fancy which will ultimately lead to Christian domination, especially of Jerusalem, in at least a spiritual sense. Some Christians, like the fundamentalists, look upon the Jewish presence there as a necessary prelude to the second coming of Jesus and, therefore, they support the Jewish state. Other Christians don't quite understand why Jews are there when they supposedly were bypassed by Christianity and history long ago.

All of this ought to be further evidence to Jews that we have to support the Jews of Israel very strongly. Other than ourselves, very few people are committed to the enduring growth and stay of the Jews in their ancient homeland.
