FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Give and Take with Caspar Weinberger

Israel

One of the functions of the Synagogue Council of America is that it serves as a contact with government officials in behalf of American Jewry. To that end, the SCA maintains "our man in Washington", but in addition, the SCA provides a forum for key government officials who wish from time to time to make a direct contact with the Jewish community.

In November of this past year, Caspar Weinberger agreed to meet with SCA leaders (representing the three branches of Judaism in America). At that time, there was a strengthening view that Weinberger was Israel's adversary and that he stressed too much the Arab side of things. We assumed that Weinberger wanted to correct this impression. We believed it important to have this intimate contact.

Weinberger spent about an hour and a half with the Rabbis and lay Board members of the SCA, and said things like this (in paraphrase):

I recognize that barbaric attacks, such as that directed against the Marines in Beirut, have been directed against Israel many times in the past... I know that Israel has many times offered peace and the offer has been answered by aggression... I have been to Israel and know that the presence of the Soviet Union represents a growing threat... There are even parts of Syria where the Soviets ban the Syrians and will not let them in...

First we have to make certain that Lebanon is restored as a stable national state... We want to assist the Jordanian Government to develop some kind of atmosphere in which the President's peace initiative can be put into effect.

Our President has affirmed the moral obligation of our nation to assure the continued existence of Israel as a nation. Israel shares our democratic values and is a formidable force in the Middle East that has to be reckoned with... We have an invader in the Middle East, the Soviet Union, which has invaded Afghanistan and has an enormous military presence in Syria. We think the ultimate aim of the Soviet Union is to deny the West access to the oil fields.

I am a strong supporter of Israel. Finally, and this is the crucial point, the U.S. cannot afford to have any one of our friends in the region, including moderate Arab nations conclude that we are unreliable, as it would seem if we were to abandon Israel.

I would like to deny the allegation that I personally or that American commanders in the field rejected an Israeli offer of help and medical assistance after the attack on our marines. The Israeli offer came two hours after the attack, and our commanders thought we had the situation under control... that there were not so many killed or hurt... and that the wounded could be handled on board ship or in Cyprus which is closer than Haifa.

America tries to maintain good relationships with the moderate Arab states, Egypt, Jordan, Saudi Arabia, because all of these countries can do a great deal to preserve the stability of the region.

Some people in either the State or Defense Departments may have a different view of things than the President, but once he has made a decision, that becomes government policy... Sales to Saudi Arabia have been only defensive weapons... The Israeli administration may be against the President's peace plan, but the Labor Party, and many other Israelis are not... It seems to us that it is better to try to improve the relationship of Israel with its neighbors than to accept the fact that there is going to be permanent hatred.

Vis a vis the Soviets, the real danger is that they might perceive that we lack the will or the capability of deterrent strength. We do not increase the possibility of war by building up our arm strength to parity with the Soviets.

My feeling is that Arafat is irrelevant now. He is a tool of the Soviets... Grenada was intended as another Soviet Base in the Americas.

(Note the above is a paraphrase and not a direct quote of the Secretary. The important fact about the meeting was that the Secretary was anxious for the meeting and wanted above all to correct the notion that he was an enemy of Israel. It does seem that the experience of the U.S., in Lebanon has brought them closer to the Israelis.)
