Professor Sandler's Class On Mondays Discusses "Three Levels of Solving Problems"

Prof. Robert Sandler's class on Monday evenings (7:30 -9:30 p.m. in the Chapel) is called The Wisdom of the Sages Throughout the Ages. Discussions are based on the book, CHOOSE LIFE, edited by Bernard Mandelbaum. Beth Am members and their friends are welcome to come to the class at any time.

The unit that is currently being discussed deals with "Three Levels of Solving Problems": in ourselves, our families, our city, our nation, the world. The first level is "Curing the IIIs of the present"; the second: "Preventing Known IIIs from Recurring"; the third: "Positive Growth and Movement toward Perfection."

Short passages in the book (from one sentence to a brief paragraph) are taken from the entire sweep of Jewish history and literature from Biblical and Talmudic times to modern times. Quotations from such non-Jewish thinkers and writers as Thoreau, Jefferson, Franklin, Cervantes, Goethe, Emerson, and Gandhi, among others, are also included.

From the Talmud:

"Fix a time for the study of Judaism."

"He who does not increase his knowledge decreases it."

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

Israel and Jesus

What does a Rabbi do in his "spare" time? Let's see this past week went as follows: on Sunday, Dec. 11, I met with an Adult Ed class at the Kendall Methodist Church. On Monday nite, Dec. 12th, I recorded two TV shows which are to appear on Channel 7's "Perspectives" program on Tuesday afternoon (Dec. 13th), I gave a short Torah interpretation before the Executive Board of the Greater Miami Jewish Federation, on Wednesday, Dec. 14th, I was a co-speaker with Bishop Scofield of the Episcopal Diocese at a meeting of the Interfaith Dialogue sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews. Shall I go on?

Of special interest to our readers might be the meeting in Houston, Texas, in November. This included national representatives of the evangelical Christians and a small group of Reform Rabbis. I was there representing the Synagogue Council of America. We met at a Baptist Church which is building an auditorium to seat eight thousand people. The existing facilities are already larger than those of Beth Am.

The evangelicals are those Christians who look expectantly for the second coming of Jesus (their Messiah), and they are eager to bring into their movement all of those who might share the belief that the promised kingdom will not only come, but soon. These Christians look for signs that point to this second coming. The most significant of these signs for them is the rebirth of the State of Israel. As they interpret their scripture, Jesus will return soon after the restoration of Israel. Therefore, the restoration of Israel is central to their belief, and they side with the Israelis against all their opponents! They believe with certain Orthodox Jews that the rebirth of Israel is none other than God's work, and it must therefore be supported.

The general Jewish response to the evangelicals, who constitute a large percentage of American Christians, has been one of indifference. The feeling has been that the evangelicals are befriending us only because they look for us to convert as a prelude to the second coming. Prime Minister Begin, however, was quick to accept the proffered hand of friendship from this group. The meeting with the Reform Rabbis in Houston is an indication that some of the leading Reform Rabbis are anxious to explore the possibilities of this friendship.

First of all, you ought to know that the meeting was very much open and above board. All the critical questions wereput on the table. How much of this group's interest in Jews involves an attempt to convert us? What will happen to their friendship when they discover that, second coming or not, we are not going to convert? Papers were presented by both parties at the meeting on what we mean by "covenant" or partnership with God. The scholarship represented on the Christian side was good. The President of the Dallas Theological Seminary was there and gave a learned exposition. A professor from a Christian Seminary in San Francisco was there, along with delegates from Chicago and the mid-west. We learned that a large number of Seminaries and a great deal of money is behind this movement. This is not the Jerry Falwell movement (which is also evangelical). Apparently this is a more sophisticated seminary oriented group.

A number of friendships were cemented in Houston. We agreed to meet again in Chicago next year. Meanwhile we are writing to one another. The Rabbis learned something at this meeting, a "first" of its kind. We think the ministers learned something too. They discovered that we could quote scripture at least as well as they, and that the texts we selected had a different purpose. They also learned of our interpretations of their proof texts. They seemed to be impressed with our academic background.

No one is going to change anyone else's theology at these meetings, but it is good to expand contacts and to develop new friends.
