

Beth Am teachers will participate in workshops conducted by Dr. Michael Zeldin of Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion, Los Angeles Campus. He will meet with Religious School teachers on Saturday, March 15 and Day School teachers on Monday, March 18 and Wednesday, March 20.



Dr. Zeldin is associate professor of Education at H.U.C. -J.I.R. (Jewish Institute of Religion). FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

The Seagull and the Tree (Part Two)

What Else Is Important?

People trained only to receive but not to give have difficulty when they get married. Since they have only known that kind of relationship where they are the receivers, how can they now suddenly participate in a relationship where they are also required to be givers? They have been trained to be entertained constantly. How can they now assume the burden of taking care of another person and sharing problems and decisions? Marriage is for trees but not for seagulls. When you're married, you can't be flying all over the place. Marriage cuts down on your mobility. People trained all their lives to move around but not to sink down roots have considerable trouble with the marriage relationship.

The visible results of what is going on in America today are these: many young people are delaying marriage until their very late twenties or even into the thirties. When they do get married, the divorce rate is around fifty per cent. If they are interested in children, their interest wanes after the first or second child. Why? Having children, I am told, interfers with their lifestyle. No self-centered person wants to share his sky space with his own child.

Besides, a child binds one to the earth.

Now, I have made the situation a little more extreme than it actually is, but only a little more extreme. I have done so to help you understand the obvious trend of our time. Certainly this is true for middle class families such as ours, and it is all the more true for Jewish families, because we are the most career-oriented of all middle-class families. Therefore, the problem of the times is most evidenced in our midst.

To those who deal in statistics, the present trend is disastrous for the Jew in America. Our children are not getting married, and those who do are having few children. It has been projected that within a few generations, if this trend continues, it will be all over for the Jewish people in America.

With these projections in mind, what then are we to teach our children? A career is important, of course, but it is only one of many important things in life. Survival for the Jewish people is important. Sharing within the family is important. Contributing to the family needs is important. Maintaining and contributing to Jewish institutions is important. Saving our country is important. Sharing the problems of city, state, and national governments is important.

Currently we are teaching our children to be seagulls, to be luftmenschen. We have to teach them to become trees with their roots in the earth and giving fruit to those in need.

Full color prints of Miami watercolorist Nancy Greenberg's "Panorama: The Jewish-American Experience" will be offered for sale by the Museum Shop of Historical Museum of Southern Florida.

The exhibition, which traces the Jewish experience from colonial days to the present, continues at the Museum, **101 West Flagler St.**, from now through March 16th.

"Panorama" is Greenberg's rendering that consists of 26 scenes illustrating events and times in American history where Jews played a prominent role. Each print comes with a guide which explains the significance of every vignette.
