Passover, A Wonderful Home Holiday, Begins Friday Evening April Fifth

The first home Seder for Passover will be held on Friday evening, April 5th. It is hoped that all Jews will be at a Seder on that evening. Because of the coincidence of the Sabbath and Passover, there will be no late service on Friday night. Instead there will be a brief "minyan" service promptly at 6 p.m. in the Sanctuary.

Saturday morning service will be held at the usual time, 11:15 a.m. and both the Sabbath and Passover themes will be emphasized.

The annual **Temple Seder** will be held on Saturday evening, **April 6th**, **at 6 p.m**. Our Rabbis will conduct, assisted by Dr. Jonathan Baumgard as lead singer. Jon is a former song leader at Camp Coleman. This is a warm modernized Seder and reservations are suggested because of limits in space.

On Friday evening, candles are lit both for the Sabbath and for the festival (the same candles will serve, with the blessings slightly changed). The blessing over the wine is also made. Following are the home prayers:

1. Candles are lit - Bah-ruch Ah-tah Ah-do-nai Eh-loh-hay-nu Meh-lech Ha-oh-lahm Ah-Sher Kid'shah-nu B'mitz-voh-tah V'tzi-vah-nu L'had-lik Nare Shel Shabbat V'yom-tov.

FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



They Are After Us -The Conversion Game

Forced conversion was a constant threat to the Jews of Europe in the long centuries that followed our expulsion from Jerusalem by the Romans in 135 CE, (AD). In modern times, the seekers of Jewish souls are using more subtle techniques.

The customary threat is, "If you don't accept Jesus as your Lord and Savior, you will go to eternal Hell". This can be frightening for those who accept the reality of a God who has reserved such a terrible fate for those who will not accept Christianity. A more subtle appeal is to say, "You can join us, the majority, and still remain a Jew. If you become a Christian you are only a FULFILLED Jew, as Jesus was". This appeals to those who want to be "one-up" on their parents. They like the idea of opposing their parents and yet being "a better Jew" than their parents.

In spite of these oblique appeals to a susceptible Jewish child, not many of our young people convert to Christianity. They are more susceptible to the Moonies and to Hari Krishna. The cults offer the option of something OTHER than Christianity, so that the child does not have to feel guilty about the kind of conversion about which his parents have long warned him. These cults offer the illusion of something NEW, something DIFFERENT, something MYSTERIOUS. They also offer a cause. Young people caught in the snares of these cults are taught that they are NEEDED, that they are IMPORTANT. No matter that they must surrender their individuality. They are given a place in a group and they are made to feel that they have an important role to play. The easiest prey for this kind of cult is the child with an inferiority complex who has been made to feel, in one way or another, that he/she is not "making it" in general society. This child is probably not the best student and feels himself a failure. On the other hand, the family is probably affluent and has never asked the child to contribute to the family's needs, so he feels no sense of purpose.

Now comes news that in Texas there is a great battle between the Mormons and the evangelical Baptists. The evangelical Baptists can only offer heaven for the faithful. The Mormons offer the prospect of becoming divine (for the male). Newsweek tells us that the Mormons are converting fifty people a day to their faith in Texas. No doubt this battle will spread to other parts of the country.

Meanwhile, how are we Jews doing with respect to converting others to our faith? The answer is we are not doing badly at all. Of course, we do not go out and proselytize, but there are many adults today who for one reason or another (usually the possibility of marriage) are investigating Judaism. The vast majority of those who investigate Judaism ultimately convert. Judaism has a great appeal for a wide range of Americans.

It is important for Jews to know, however, that there are increasing numbers of groups after us. The Seventh Day Adventists, for example, are now distributing a magazine called, "The New Israelite" to Jewish homes. Most of the articles are friendly to Jews and to Israel. Indeed, you might think it is a Jewish magazine. The very name of the magazine, however, suggests the purpose of its publishers. The thrust of early Christianity was that Christians were the NEW Israel. We are supposedly rejected by God and they are in.

What can we Jews do? First of all, we have to find out all we can about our faith. Jews who were immersed in Judaism, through all the cruel centuries of persecution in Europe, would not change their faith. The problem is that most American Jews are relatively ignorant and non-practicing! Jews who do not know Jewish sources and who do not experience the regular pleasure of Jewish rituals are ripe for conversion.

Beth Am provides excellent Adult Ed courses. But if you don't have the discipline to sit in for a five week course, why not visit the Beth Am Library, which is an unusually fine synagogue Library, and go at your own pace, or you can pick up a copy of ''Gates of The Seasons'' in our Judaica Shop and start practicing one ritual at home (preferably the
