#### FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



The Seagull and the Tree

(The following is an excerpt from a sermon given in 1976. Copies of it have been requested from around the country. You, too, can have a copy by inquiring at the Rabbi's office.)

But Rabbi, you might ask, are you saying that we shall give up the traditional Jewish emphasis on learning? I am not saying that at all. What I am saying is that learning is not the only thing in the world. I am saying that even more important than academic learning and preparation for a career is teaching a child his responsibilities to the family, to the Jewish people, and to his country.

Since we do not give our children the opportunity to work for family, people, and country, we are teaching them something else. In addition to teaching them of the consuming importance of a career, we teach them to receive. We do not teach them how to give, to share. We teach them to take. No wonder so many of our children join all sorts of crazy groups that offer just these other possibilities for them!

What does the Rev. Moon offer his young people? He offers them work for a cause, a high purpose beyond themselves, and belonging to a meaningful group. We Jews have all these things to offer and more, but we don't offer it. All we offer is attendance at the best college and free room, board, and spending money!

Children trained only to receive but not to give sometimes cannot understand that paradoxical moment when we parents finally say, "All right, you're on your own now. We're not giving any more." "How can this be possible?" the young person might well ask. "Parents are meant to give. All our young life our parents gave and gave and gave. How dare they now say they are not going to give anymore?" For young people trained only to receive, this moment when the handouts cease can be overwhelming. It can be perceived by them as vindictiveness or as miserliness on our part. Other children are sensitive enough to perceive that they are constantly taking from their parents without giving in return. They understand this as a dehumanizing process. They see this as an undermining of their character; but since they are involved in the long term effort towards professionalism, they have no alternative but to take from their parents. As a result, they come to have ambivalent feelings towards the hands that feed them, for these very hands have made mushy dependents of them. This is a paradox of our career-oriented society.

People trained only to receive but not to give have difficulty when they get married. Since they have only known that kind of relationship where they are the receivers, how can they now suddenly participate in a relationship where they are **also** required to be givers? They have been trained to be entertained constantly. How can they now assume, suddenly, that marriage is for trees but not for seagulls? When you're married, you can't be flying all over the place. Marriage cuts down on your mobility. People trained all their lives to move around but not to sink down roots have considerable trouble with the marriage relationship.

The visible results of what is going on in America today are these: many young people are delaying marriage until their very late twenties or even into the thirties. When they do get married, the divorce rate is around fifty per cent. If they do get married, many of them are not interested in having children. If they are interested in children, their interest wanes after the first or second child. Why? Having children, I am told, interferes with their lifestyle. No self-centered person wants to share his sky space with his own child. Besides, a child binds one to the earth.
