FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



Post Holy Day Thoughts

I always leave the Holy Day period with a "high." Beth Am is a well disciplined congregation, and it is most pleasurable to experience a prayer service with such real participation as we have during this period. While so many of the modern generation feel awkward singing, I believe that the deepest emotion is expressed during the congregational singing. Especially during the refrain for "Ahvinu Malkaynu" and "V'al kulam," this congregation gets into the "jet stream" of prayer. You are not fortunate enough to be on the Altar during these moments, but those of us who are witness to what is going on (and do not only hear) have a special thrill.

The Sanctuary music directed by Selma Baumgard was up to its usual high standard. Some say it was better than ever. Don Bennett, our Soloist, was in excellent voice, and our veteran choir was in top form. While we do have a number of non-Temple members in the adult choir, the heart of our choir is formed by Temple members who have been with the choir almost since its inception. Jim Bennett continues with his high standard at the organ. Upstairs in the Gymn, Jackie Berney serves both as Cantorial Soloist and as Director of the youth choir. She is a special talent, and the young people sing a full repertoire with enthusiasm and cohesion. There can be no question that our music adds a great deal to the spirituality of our services.

Perhaps the most dramatic point of the Holidays occurred when the microphones, the lights and the air conditioning (all electricity) went out in the middle of the Yom Kippur afternoon service. Rabbi Norman Lipson, who helps us part time in several capacities, was giving the sermon. We all admired Rabbi Lipson's equanimity as he pressed on in spite of the impossible situation. The electrical problem was due to a power failure at F.P.&.L. There are a thousand things that can go wrong on the Holidays, and often they do, but with the cooperation of all of you, we have been able to share in a series of meaningful services.

One of the problems on the Holidays is that we can't really predict what the attendance will be at any particular service. There was a time when the morning services were the most fully attended. For reasons that we don't completely comprehend, since all of the services are equally significant to the Holiday observance, some people will pick and choose their services as carefully as when and where they are going to go on vacation. In case some of you don't understand, our schedule is prepared with this in mind: 1) Equally significant are the Rosh Hashanah evening and morning service (your attendance is anticipated at both). 2) The Rosh Hashanah afternoon service, on the other hand, is an option for the morning service. 3) On Yom Kippur, evening, morning, **and afternoon** are equally significant, and it is anticipated that all worshippers will attend all three. Certainly such attendance is essential if one desires to experience the **full** impact of the Holiday.

I do hope that many of you were inspired enough to want to share in our Torah services on Saturday mornings (at 11:15 a.m.) or in our Friday evening services on a more regular basis. **The only time you really enjoy something is when you are deeply immersed in it.** Shortly, we hope to mail out to the congregation the rituals for Friday evening at home, about which I spoke on Yom Kippur morning ('Taking On a New Soul - A Recipe For Lovers''). I hope you will read this pamphlet closely. It offers some interesting insights into these observances that you may not know about. Those of us who follow these rituals in the spirit described find them to be very rewarding.
