FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY



White House Briefing

Several weeks ago I was privileged to be invited to a special briefing arranged by the White House and the State Department for the Presidents of National Jewish Organizations. Mr. Reagan, we were told, would probably drop in to say, "Hello". Instead the President spoke to our fairly small group of one hundred people for about half an hour. He spoke about Israel briefly. His theme was Nicaragua, and he chose this occasion to make a major policy speech. Just before he entered, the small room was flooded with TV cameras.

I had watched President Reagan on TV many times. His style is really geared to a small room. He came across sincerely. Kenneth Bialkin, currently serving as Chairman of the Conference of Presidents of American Jewish Organizations, thanked Mr. Reagan for his aid to Israel and for his efforts to gain the release of Scharansky. Mr. Reagan felt warm enough to tell us a joke, it wasn't as good as his speech.

The real discussion relating to Jewish affairs was led by Richard Murphy, Under Secretary of State for Mid-East affairs. Mr. Murphy made it clear that with Hussein's abandonment of Arafat and the recent terrorist murder of the Israeli appointed Arab Mayor of Nablus (the major city in the west Bank), that Israel and the United States have lost both aspects of new current initiatives for peace.

The result is a stand off. The key unknown factor in the situation now is Syria. Syria holds her cards close to her vest. She can be an important helper. Thus far she has chosen to remain silent while building up her army and air-force. Through Syria, Russia could become more of a factor in the Mid-East. Neither Israel nor the U.S. would enjoy this. It **could** be the way things will go - if indeed peace is to be obtainable.

The briefing also included an appearance by Chief of Staff Donald Regan, who is not the most impressive person in the administration, and the new chief of anti-terrorism activities. I must admit that I only lasted through four hours of the briefing, and I had to catch a return plane.

My previous briefing in Washington was with a smaller group of Synagogue Council Rabbis (five) who met with State Dept. officials concerning a new phase of Soviet mistreatment of its Jews. We found then (several months ago) that the Reagan administration is willing to give the Jewish community considerable attention when it comes to relations with the Soviet Union - whether it be anti-Semitism in the Soviet Union or the Soviet arming of Mid-East nations. It is because the administration sees Nicaragua as another example of Communist infiltration that it links what is going on in Central America to activities in the Mid-East and within the Soviet Union.

We Jews should not be blind to what is happening in Nicaragua. Jews forced to leave there speak of Arab (PLO) influence in the revolutionary government. Administration sources, according to Pres. Reagan, have clear evidence that Nicaragua will be another Cuba, another Soviet base near to our shores. There is some conflicting testimony, as there was originally concerning Castro. Some historians claim that if we had worked with Castro, he would not have become a Communist ally. Those who take this view say we should befriend the current government in Nicaragua. The debate on this issue holds sway in Congress as this is written. It is not easy to get a clear line on the best path to follow, especially because violence is involved. Yet major gains in human history have sometimes been achieved by military means. How we solve the Nicaraguan crisis may be one of Americas most critical decisions.
