The Temple's Annual Seder will be held on Tuesday, April 14th, at 6 p.m. Rabbi Baumgard will conduct the service.

The Temple office will be closed on Monday, April 20th. There will be no Day School, Hebrew School or Monday Night School that day

You have an opportunity to vote for liberalizing education in Israel

If you are a member of any Zionist Organization, as for example, ARZA, Hadassah, Pioneer Women or the ZOA, you will have the opportunity in May to vote in the World Zionist Congress election. In May, you will be receiving a ballot with the list of delegates nominated. If you will vote for delegates sympathetic to Reform Judaism, we will have a greater chance of influencing the way money is spent for educational groups in Israel.

For example, millions of dollars are filtered thru the WZA to educational organizations in Israel. Most often, the money goes to Orthodox organizations, some of which work against liberalizing religious institutions and attitudes in Israel. If you vote for the ARZA delegates (American Reform Zionist Association), you increase the chances of some of this money going to more liberal groups. Even if you do not belong to ARZA, but do belong to some other Zionist organization, like Hadassah, you can vote for the ARZA slate. Included in this slate are Rabbi Baumgard, Iris Franco, and Jon Kislak from Beth Am.

So look for your ballot and be sure to vote. Incidentally, if you are not a member of ARZA, you may join for only a few dollars. Make your check out to ARZA, 838 - Fifth Ave. NYC. \$18 for single membership and \$25 for a family. Our Rabbis hope for a 100% Beth Am enrollment in ARZA.

ARZA works for religious rights and full equality for all Jews in Israel, and a state of Israel committed to the ideals of prophetic Judaism.

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FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

The "Tribute" Service

(Following is an excerpt from Rabbi Baumgard's remarks at the Tribute Service, Friday, March 20th)

Commencing this Fall, the sermons preached from this pulpit will not be delivered by Rabbi Baumgard and his associates but by Rabbi Leonard Schoolman and his associates. Rabbi Schoolman is fortunate to have such a capable professional staff to carry on the work they have done so well over the years. He is also fortunate to have a congregation of highly educated and talented people who will want to help him over the bridging years. Each Rabbi has his own style of teaching and his distinctive personality, but all Rabbis share the same legacy with our fellow Jews. That legacy does not change. Indeed, in this Sanctuary the legacy fairly screams at you.

From the texture of the Ark, we read the Prophet Zechariah's teaching, "Not by military power, nor by force, but by My spirit,' saith the Lord." I leave behind that legacy. From the first window on your right we read the teaching from our Prayerbook, "B'chol yom m'chadesh ma'ah'seh b'raysheet, Each day God recreates the deeds of creation." I leave behind that message of hope. And from the window on my right, there calls the teaching of Rabbi Hillel who said, "If I am not for myself, who is for me; but if I am for myself alone, what am I? and if not now, when?" I leave behind this challenge to caring action. Indeed, since I am responsible for choosing all of these messages from our tradition for our windows, I will, in a sense, never cease speaking in this beautiful Sanctuary.

You see, I have tricked you, for I have encapsulated the great messages of our tradition here in our Sanctuary. They are mine, yes simply because I have tried to make them my own. They are not only the legacy of our tradition to you, they are in a smaller but more immediate sense my gift to you. My prayer is that each of you will make them your message, as well. I pray that each of you will come to "possess" these teachings and give them in turn to others.

A final word about you and me. I want you to know that I consider myself also to be merely a symbol. A Rabbi is, after all, only the designated religious leader of his community. He becomes by their choice the people's representative. I want you to know that I do not consider what has been accomplished here at Beth Am as merely a personal achievement. We have done all this together, and I am privileged to have been a part of it. We have shared over these thirty years not just the construction of half a dozen buildings, nor just the development of important spiritual and moral programs. What we have shared is — half a lifetime!

We have shared dreams and frustrations and failures and successes. We have shared births and Bar Mitzvot, and confirmations and marriages and illnesses and deaths. A Rabbi lives in the vortex of life, in the crucible of life's teeming. Some of us have touched infrequently, others of us have worked closely together and have shared many rich experiences over an enduring period of time. Many of us have lived our adult lives together. We have shared both laughter and tears. I want you to know that while I am stepping down as Rabbi, I am not stepping out of your life. My family and I will continue to live in Miami, and I will continue to be concerned about what happens to you and to yours. Friendship and caring do not end with an official announcement of retirement.

So let us look at this evening as a kind of joint celebration of what we have done together. We have earned the right to be immensly proud, and we have cause to be hopeful that the future will be equally rewarding
