

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE by HY JOBRACK

A few years ago we had to make a momentous decision. We had to decide whether we should keep our Temple open for Sabbath Service during the summer months. As chairman of the Ritual Committee, it was my contention that we had to keep our place of worship open all year. I felt that to close down for the summer the very first year would set a bad precedent, and so we coaxed and badgered and bribed enough men and boys to come down at different weekends, all summer long. We succeeded very well, and we were very proud of the fact that people who needed a place to say Kaddish or name a child came to us and told us we were the only Temple around the entire section here to be open all summer.

Why, you may well ask, do we go to so much trouble? If our people do not feel the need to come to say a few prayers, why should we pressure them to do so? My answer to that line of reasoning is always the same. members who need a service to observe the Yarseit of their loved ones, are entitled to that privilege. Those members who need a place to name their newborn babies are entitled to that place. Today I need the Temple. Tomorrow it may be you. We have a right to expect that our house of worship, for which we sacrifice so much, wil in return provide us with facilities and the necessary personnel to fulfill our needs. You would be surprised at the number of people who required our services during the past year, or the amount of income these services brought in.

With the approach of the present vacation season, we are confronted again with the problem of getting enough people down to attend our services, especially Saturday mornings. The entire service is only one hour long.

Won't you help us maintain our record of being able to say we are there when you need us, all year round.
