"MINUTES of the PREVIOUS MEETING"

In order to keep the Congregation well-informed on its proceedings, the Temple Board of Trustees will publish, as a regular feature of the Bulletin, digests of its minutes. The most recent meeting was held on September 7, and as always was **open to the entire membership.**

Mr. Samuel Shack, Chairman of the Membership Committee reported that twenty-one families have affiliated with the Temple who never belonged before. All members, especially new ones, are urged to attend all the Congregational Meetings.

Our Temple Affairs Committee is at work on the Annual Installation festivities which usually take place in March. Plans are being made so that the Installing ceremonies will be open to all.

Mr. Morris Emanuel, Chairman of the Board, announced that due to the dissolution of Congregation Beth Shalom we shall be the recipients of several gifts and a cash donation from them.

gifts and a cash donation from them. Newly elected to the Temple Board are Mr. Samuel Rothstein, Mr. Murray Kershow, and Mrs. David Brand. These people will fill unexpired terms until the regular elections in February. At this last meeting Mr. Sol Rothenberg tendered his resignation, and the Board will act to fill the vacancy at its next meeting.

Rabbi's Column

Anyone who visits the Temple office these days at any time from 9 A. M. to 11 P. M. will learn what a tremendous operation our Temple has become. Our Temple is intimately concerned with the lives of 2,500 people, when we consider the membership of all of our affiliates. Some of you know what it is to be responsible for supervising 10 or 50 or 100 people, but what about 2,500 people whose birth, death, marriage, pain, joy are your intimate concern? As Rabbi of the congregation I see my task as monumental, and it is just impossible for me to deal with every situation. That I am able to proceed from day to day on something resembling a sane schedule is due to the voluntary contributions in labor and time of a few devoted people. Even those who are technically paid members of the professional staff make voluntary contributions to the congregation in time and labor which are far beyond the call of duty.

In sharp contrast to the dedication of some of these people is the attitude of those people who believe that the Temple is an enterprise seeking private "you" or "they", is reaping financial benefit from the many activities of the Temple. Some people are not aware that \$50 a year dues is infinitestimal compared to most congregations with our facilities and program. For ex-ample, did you know that it costs the Temple \$20 a year per family simply to maintain the building? Did you know that your presence in the Temple costs the Temple office \$10 a year. costs \$24 a year per family for the Educational Department, exclusive of salaries for Rabbis and Cantor. It costs \$27 a year per family for the salaries of Rabbis and Cantor. It will cost \$40 a year per family to pay the cost of the new building additions being com-pleted. This adds up to something over \$120 a year and does not include miscellaneous expenses, Youth Group Expenses, etc., which take an additional \$20 a year per family. These figures demonstrate that most families are not contributing their share of expenses to the congregation on the basis of dues payments alone.

The difference between expenses and dues income must be met by contributions from our families, those who understand that the "contribution" is really one's rightful share of the community burden. The Temple is forced to ask its members to Tax themselves voluntarily that our budgets may be met. You can do this by making a pledge to the building fund now or on Kol Nidre night. Pledges are being sought on a three year basis, payable at times agreeable to the particular family. This is one way you can become a participant and not a freeloader. See you on board!
