REQUIREMENTS FOR BAR MITZVAH

It is best for those desiring Bar or Bas Mitzvah to begin Sunday School at five years and Hebrew School at eight years. The absolute minimum requirement is three years of both Hebrew and Sunday School. In addition children must pass a minimum exam in both schools in both schools.

Hysteria in the weeks before a Bar Mitzvah can be avoided if the parents will see that the children learn their Hebrew in the early years. Parents should study with children where possible. Boys and girls who ignore their lessons day in and day out cannot expect to perform adequately at the final ceremony.

To encourage more girls to attend Hebrew School, the Temple Board has agreed to permit the performance of Bas Mitzvahs only on Friday night, provided the Service schedule permits.

Rabbi's Column

The special halo of the Holidays has departed—as, unfortunately, have so many of our ardent worshippers at that season. What special quirk of the mind leads people to believe that they can atone for a year of detachment from their community by praying in double time on the Holidays? Certainly nowhere in the Jewish sources is such an attitude encouraged.

After our emphasis on the need to study Judaism in a modern way, we rather expected a stampede at the Adult Education classes on Wednesday evening. True, we did have the largest enrollment in our history, but more than a few of you weren't there. Guess you didn't believe me, after all, eh? But I was quite serious. I believe that the adult who doesn't seek to discover what Judaism really is (and as children none of us were properly taught, including myself), indicates by his apathy, a will to die as a Jew. Is that you? Then, better not deceive yourself. Withdraw your children from the Religious School and play the game whole hog. You can't experience Judaism through them vicariously (how many adults say, we belong to the Temple for the children's sake?). Judaism is much too profound to discover at a great distance from the classroom. It can only be discovered there.

If you hate yourself for being a Jew, you will not try to learn what it is to be a Jew or you will say to yourself, "Of course, I know what it is to be a Jew." Can you answer one question, "In what way was Abraham different from his pagan parents?" It has taken me eight years of concentrated study to amass the material to answer this question. You can benefit from the studies of those who know more than you (and admit their ignorance) by attending Adult Education classes—see you Wednesday night.

HEBREW CLASS FOR ADULTS

Wonder of wonders. Two men came up to the Rabbi and said, "Rabbi, we have forgotten our Hebrew. Teach us to read." In tribute to these men (ignorance is no crime, but lack of curiosity is) and to all those who haven't yet come forward a class in Hebrew for adults will be instituted. The class will begin from the beginning. All fathers are especially invited. The first class will be held on Sunday morning, October 23 at 11 A.M.

AMERICA'S FIRST MEDICAL COLLEGE UNDER JEWISH AUS-PICES TO BE DEDICATED OCTOBER 23

On Sunday, October 23, 1955, the Albert Einstein College of Medicine of Yeshiva University will be dedicated as America's first medical college under Jewish auspices. Impressive public ceremonies will be held at 2:00 p.m. at the medical college, Morris Park Avenue and Eastchester Road, the Bronx.

Many leading scientists, physicians, educators and community leaders from all parts of the country and from abroad will participate in the ceremonies dedicating this living memorial to the late Professor Albert Einstein. During his lifetime, Professor Einstein was deeply interested in the College and regarded it as the most important undertaking of the American Jewish community for the benefit of the entire country.

The Albert Einstein College of Medicine opened its doors to its first class of students just a few weeks ago. A fine example of interfaith in action, of democracy at work, its students and faculty have been selected solely on the basis of scholarship, character and ability, without regard to race, color or creed. Students come from all racial and religious groups and from all parts of the country and abroad. The faculty consists of many internationally known figures in the field of medicine.

The College will have magnificent facilities available for teaching, medical care and research. It will be the core of a \$100,000,000 medical center, which includes a \$40,000,000 Municipal Hospital Center constructed by the City of New York and a \$45,000,000 Psychiatric Hospital Center to be constructed by the State of New York. The combined facilities will cover 200 acres and have a total bed capacity of 5400—one of the largest and most comprehensive centers of medical teaching, care and research in the country.

A special section at the Dedication Ceremonies has been set aside for members of Congregations and their families who are invited to attend as guests of the College.

Among some of the better known organizations where he has served as club and group leader and program supervisor are The Educational Alliance and The Henry Street Settlement in New York. In 1953, he became Youth Director

at Bellerose Jewish Center, Bellerose, Long Island, where he was responsible for organizing and directing a Youth Program involving approximately 350

teen-agers

In addition to his regular duties, Mr. Levine specialized in teaching ballroom, folk and square dancing to all age groups. He recalls with pleasure the time he was called on by radio station WMCA to participate in broadcasts experimenting in dance instruction. He maintains that his interest in Youth Work was the direct result of knowing Lillian D. Wald, one of America's youth work pioneers.

CONFIRMATION CLUBS IN PROGRESS

The Confirmation Clubs of the Temple held their first meetings on Saturday, September 24th. Registration for these clubs will be accepted at the office. The fee is \$10 per year. The office. The fee is \$10 per year. clubs combine discussions on topics of general and Jewish interests. There is no formal textual study. 13 year olds or gratuates of the Sunday School are eligible for the Pre-Confirmation Club. 14 year olds are eligible for the Stars of David and, 15 year olds (who will be 16 by September of 1956) are eligible for the Confirmation Club. Credit will be given towards Confirmation on a point basis. Those who enter the Confirmation Club without previously entering the other clubs will have more points to assemble.

JEWISH BOOK MONTH

Simchat Torah is not too far behind for us to remember the parade of the Torahs, the conclusion of the reading of Deuteronomy, the beginning of the reading of Genesis, the gayety of the service, the revelry of the children, and the lively spirit of the grown-ups.
