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FLORIDA INTERNATIONAL RECEIVES UNIVERSITY WITHOUT WALLS GRANT

Florida International University has joined with the Union for Experimenting Colleges and Universities, a group of 17 institutions of higher education, to plan and develop a University Without Walls (UWW) program to meet the needs of low-income and disadvantaged students.

The University received a planning grant of \$20,000 to carry out the planning and development of the UWW program, which will be done in collaboration with Miami-Dade Junior College. It will be called the Florida International-Miami Dade UWW Program.

The joint effort is an undertaking to provide low income and disadvantaged people with new tools to enter college or to continue their studies. This is the first time such a program has been established between a community college and upper-level university.

Representing Florida International on the task force which will oversee planning of the program are: Dr. Jules O. Pagano, Dean, Special Programs; Eric Katz, Assistant to the Dean, and James Reid, Coordinator, School of Independent Studies.

"The proceeds from this sale are returned to our waste control operations to reduce our cost of total waste disposal," Slayton said.
"By our practical and economically beneficial application of this recycling technique, we hope to encourage others to move in this direction."
