UNIVERSITY HOLDS THIRD COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY

About 370 persons are expected to graduate on Saturday, December 15, when Florida International University holds its third Commencement, at 10 a.m., in Tamiami Stadium, immediately adjacent to the campus. These graduates will bring the number of alumni to more than 770.

President Charles E. Perry will preside at the informal activities which will include remarks by Dr. William T. Jerome III, Vice-President for Academic Affairs, and the individual awarding of diplomas by the six Academic Deans.

The entire University community and the general public are invited to join the graduates and their families and friends at the ceremony.

MATERIALS SHORTAGE

DELAYS FACILITIES

A nationwide shortage of materials is having a significant effect on the construction of buildings at Florida International according to Donald McDowell, Vice-President for Administrative Affairs. "We expect the shortages will push back the completion date on some of the buildings," he added.

Construction on University House and the Multi-Function II Building is presently on schedule, he said, but the temporary Technology Building will not be ready for opening until March 1-a month beyond expectation.

ALTERNATE ENERGY SOURCES

DISPLAYED IN "BUBBLE BUILDING"

At a time when questions of energy sources and use are critical, an unusual type of "Bubble Building" will be used at the University to display alternate sources of energy.

Philip Coulter, Associate Professor, Technology, is guiding his students in a project to construct the building from a variety of materials which also have alternate uses. "No forms of conventional energy will be used at any time," he said. "Nearby pond water will cool and the sun will heat the building." Cost is only \$248, one-eighth the cost of a conventional structure.

CONFERENCE FOCUSES ON ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT

A December 13-14 workshop organized by the School of Technology will focus on the definition, interpretation and implementation of Environmental Impact Statements now required by the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969. Engineers, public officials, city planners, industrialists and others involved in preparing or evaluating Environmental Impact Statements will participate in the workshop to be held at the Marriott Motor Hotel.

The two-day workshop program will begin with a definitional consideration of EI statements by Dr. Lloyd Stover of Environmental Technology Assessment, Inc., Washington, D.C. Case studies of EI statements for transportation, water, and power planning will also be presented. Dr. Robert Ellis, Dean, Technology, will discuss the role of the urban university in environmental planning. Recent developments in environmental assessment will be outlined by David Aggerholm of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Environmental Impact Review Division. Faculty members from the School of Technology will lead workshop participants in a panel session to develop an environmental impact statement at the conclusion of the workshop.
