iami—the sun and fun capital of the world—has grown. By attracting commerce, agriculture and industry from other countries, Miami has become a major international banking and business center.

There are ultra-modern office towers, multi-national corporations, luxurious hotels, endless condominiums and gleaming skyscrapers. With over 5,000 manufacturing firms, 120 banks and a multi-million dollar agricultural industry, Miami is a dynamic new crossroad of commerce, culture and tourism.

Included in the Greater Miami area is the tropical island of Miami Beach. Connected to the mainland by causeways across beautiful Biscayne Bay, Miami Beach is a magnificent ocean resort. Boasting a 300-foot-wide white sandy beach that stretches for miles, Miami Beach is dotted with swaying palms and scenic promenades. It borders a gentle blue ocean that has a surf temperature of 68 degrees and above.

Miami's location makes it a natural gateway to international travelers. The Port of Miami is the nation's largest cruise port, handling more passengers than does any other in the world.

Greater Miami is a mixture of business and pleasure par excellence. Recreational activities include everything under the sun, from tennis and sailing to dog races and jai-alai to FIU athletics events.

If you want to see the sights, you can visit the magnificent historic mansion Vizcaya, tour the Art Deco District in Miami Beach, see killer whales perform at the Seaquarium, walk among the animals at Metrozoo or stroll through Little Havana.

If shopping is your passion, you can find anything from seashell souvenirs to a Spanish lace mantilla to a yacht. Boutiques, shopping plazas, department and specialty stores abound. Shopping areas include the Miami Fashion District—an area of discount shops offering everything from shoes to sporting goods—to the Bal Harbour Shops—a group

pleted and a \$12 million Physical Sciences Building is currently underway. Construction is also underway for a new College of Business Administration Building.

The 200-acre North Miami Campus is located directly on Biscayne Bay. The campus has a new, one million volume library. Recreational facilities at North Campus include tennis courts, an aquatic center and an Olympic-sized pool. Attractive, affordable, apartment-style housing is available on both campuses, and shuttle bus service runs between the two sites.

University Park also is the site of Golden Panther Arena, the home of the FIU Golden Panthers athletics teams. At adjacent Tamiami Park, students can enjoy all park facilities, such as pools, tracks and courts.

In addition to academic programs and facilities at University Park and North Miami, the University provides higher education programs in neighboring Broward County. FIU offers a number of programs at University Tower in downtown Ft. Lauderdale and at the FIU Broward Center in Davie.

FIU is a fully-accredited Ph.D. granting institution, with a budget of nearly \$12 million for contracts and grants, which is almost equally divided between training and research. The University is currently listed in *Barron's Guide to "The Best, Most Popular and Most Exciting Colleges"* and *"The Most Prestigious Colleges."* FIU was cited as one of the country's top 25 comprehensive universities in *U.S. News and World Report's* 1988 and 1989 reports on "America's Best Colleges." The combination of its academic achievements and Florida's low state university tuition also merited FIU's inclusion in Edward Fiske's widely quoted *"The Best Buys in College Education."*

In a relatively short period, FIU has attained the highest level of academic accreditation, has been granted NCAA Division I status (the nation's most competitive sports division), and become recognized as one of the country's most notable up-and-coming public universities.



The FIU Baseball Complex



lorida International University plays all its home baseball games at its 1500-seat complex located at University Park. The field is considered one of the finest collegiate baseball facilities in the State of Florida.

The 15-year old complex has an excellent lighting system, installed just prior to the 1983 season, allowing the play of night games and giving many more spectators the opportunity to watch and enjoy Golden Panthers baseball.

Through the generosity of University faculty member, Dr. Rene J. Leonard and his family, a press box was built and opened in time for the 1984 campaign.

In 1988 Mr. Tito Gomez, through the auspices of Southern Bell, assisted FIU in realizing the resources necessary to acquire a state-of-the-art sound system for the ballpark.

Last year, astroturf was installed in the foul territories to add a "touch of class" to the field, along with ensuring its safe and easy upkeep.

The park is equipped with a fully electric scoreboard. The playing surface is natural grass and the dimensions are 325 feet down the lines, 375 feet in the power alleys and 400 feet to straight-away center field.

The field was dedicated on March 13, 1974, with a double-header against Indiana University. FIU has won 462 home games, while losing only 167, for a winning percentage of .734.

Dr. Modesto A. Maidique, University President

n August 27, 1986, the Board of Regents of the State of Florida unanimously appointed Dr. Modesto "Mitch" Maidique to the presidency of Florida International University.

Dr. Maidique is the University's fourth president and the first Cuban-

born president of a four-year university in the United States. He earned his bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees in Electrical Engineering from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) and graduated from Harvard's program for Management Development. Dr. Maidique also taught at Harvard and Stanford Universities before joining the University of Miami in 1984 as a Professor of Management.

Dr. Maidique was a general partner of Hambrecht and Quist Venture Partners, the largest venture capital company in the world. He has served as business consultant and chief executive of several private firms. He was also the co-founder of Analog Devices, Inc., the second largest producer of high performance linear integrated circuits in the country.

Dr. Maidique has been an indefatigable civic and community representative, serving on the Board of Directors and Board of Trustees of organizations as prestigious as The United Way of Dade County, The Beacon Council, The Coral Gables Chamber of Commerce Board of Governors, The Cuban American National Foundation, and the Dade Heritage Trust.

Dr. Maidique was also selected to serve as a member of the National Advisory Committee for Presidential Personnel, which assists in choosing over 4,000 employees for President Bush's administration.

Dr. Maidique is married to Ana Margarita and has two children — Ana Teresa and Mark Alex.

Dr. Richard J. Correnti, V.P. for Student Affairs

r. Richard J. Correnti, as vice president for student affairs at Florida International University, oversees a wide range of University programs, including Intercollegiate Athletics and Campus Recreation.

Dr. Correnti was appointed vice president on April 26, 1987 after serving in a similar capacity at Ithaca College, Ithaca, New York, a position he had held since 1977. A native of Potsdam, New York, he graduated from State University College Plattsburgh, New York, in 1962 with a bachelor's degree in Secondary Mathematics Education. Dr. Correnti earned his master's degree in Guidance and Counseling at Seton Hall University, and his doctoral degrees in Student Personnel Administration and Higher Education Counseling from Ohio University in Athens.

He is a past president of the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators (NASPA). Among his numerous other professional activities are service as a member of the Middle States Accreditation Team in 1982 and 1986; 1986 chairperson of the NASPA committees on awards, constitution and bylaws, finance and operation; and l984 chairperson of the NASPA committees on strategic planning, dues increase, finance and operations, and selections and resolutions.

Dr. Correnti and his wife Carol have three children — Kim, Kindry and Rip.



Dr. Arthur W. Herriott, NCAA Faculty Representative

r. Arthur W. Herriott is the associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and professor of Chemistry at Florida International University. Dr. Herriott earned a B.A. degree from the College of Wooster in 1963 and

earned his Ph.D. in 1967 from the University of Florida. Prior to his association with Florida International, Dr. Herriott spent five years at the State University of New York at Albany as an assistant professor of chemistry.

Since 1981, Dr. Herriott has been the NCAA faculty representative for the Golden Panthers, responsible for representing the institution at Association functions and chairing the University's Athletic Council, which oversees the smooth operation of the Athletics Department.

Dr. Richard A. Young, Director of Athletics

r. Richard A. (Dick) Young was named Flòrida International University's seventh director of intercollegiate athletics on June 1, 1987. He came to FIU from Washington State University, where he had been athletics director since August, 1983.

"I can sum up Dick Young in two words: integrity and experience, with emphasis on integrity," said University President Dr.

Mitch Maidique.

Dr. Richard Correnti, FIU's vice president for student affairs, to whom Young reports, said, "We are extremely pleased and proud to have Dick Young join the FIU administrative team as athletics director. Dick has a record of unquestionable integrity, broad experience and high achievement at three major universities in the Mid-American, Big Eight and Pac-10 conferences. Attracting him to FIU is a major step forward in our quest for excellence in our new Division I athletics program."

A native of Columbus, Ohio, Young earned his bachelor of science degree in Education from Ohio State University in 1955, and his master's degree in Education from OSU in 1959. He received his Ph.D. in Educational Administration at

Bowling Green State University in 1975.

As an athlete, Young lettered as a football defensive back at Ohio State in 1953 and 1954 under head coach Woody Hayes. After spending the next three years as a naval aviator, Young returned to his alma mater to work toward his master's degree. While there, he worked as a graduate assistant football coach under Hayes.

In 1959, Young became an administrative assistant in Health, Physical Education and Athletics at Bowling Green. He held that position until 1971 when he was named acting chairperson of that department. Later that year, he was named BGSU's athletics director where he remained until 1978.

While at Bowling Green, Young was also head baseball coach from 1959-71, compiling a 184-146-6 record, was the freshman football coach from 1960-68 with a 31-7 record and was a defensive backfield coach in 1959—the year Bowling Green won the NCAA Small College Championship under Doyt Perry, who later went on to become FIU's first director of athletics.

Young went on to become athletics director at Oklahoma State University in 1978 and five years later, moved on to become the athletics director at Washington State.

His professional activities include membership in the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics, the United States Sports Academy Advisory Board and the National Education Association.

He was also the state director of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes in Oklahoma.

Young's wife, Sandy, is a sports enthusiast, and they have two daughters — Pam and Alyson.

Danny Price, Head Coach

College: Florida International, 1974

he driving force leading the continued growth of Golden Panthers baseball has been its coach, Danny Price. In ten seasons,

the dynamic Price has tried his hand at virtually everything possible in order to secure the means necessary to progress as a successful major college program. But success doesn't come easy. He has accepted any and all speaking engagements, conducted clinics and camps, sold advertisements, concessions, and Christmas trees, spent countless hours on the telephone with potential boosters and will shake the hand of anyone willing to listen about Florida International University baseball.

"My goals are to continue our winning tradition and expand on it," said Price. "We're trying hard to put FIU on the baseball

map as a national intercollegiate powerhouse."

"Trying hard," is indeed an understatement. Price, his staff, and student-athletes have all worked above and beyond the call of duty to reach that goal.

Price has never backed down from hard work in pursuit of a dream. Even as a youngster in high school at Rocky Mount's (NC) Northern Nash, Price starred in football and baseball while working to help support his family.

After graduation, Price journeyed to Florida's Indian River Community College where he was named an all-star outfielder.

In 1973, Price was a charter member of Florida International's first intercollegiate baseball squad. That season, he led the team with 79 base hits, a school record that stood for the next six years. In recognition of his offensive accomplishments, Price was named Most Valuable Player and voted co-captain of the following year's squad.

After earning his bachelor's degree in 1974, Price joined the staff at Miami Central High School where he was an assistant coach in both baseball and football. After practices, he attended night school and worked toward a master's degree in Health Education that he received from FIU in 1976.

Two years later, Price was given his first opportunity to coach at the college level. FIU Coach Tom H. Wonderling sought a batting instructor and help with recruiting. Price was offered the position of assistant, strictly on a volunteer basis. He readily accepted. During that next spring, FIU went on to break or tie 36 offensive records en route to a team batting average of .318.

When Wonderling departed the program in 1980, Price was elevated to the University's head baseball coach, becoming only the second in the eight-year history of the school.

Coaches

Under Price's guidance, his first club broke or tied another 45 offensive records, added another 19 points to its team batting average, and finished fourth at the NCAA National Championship Tournament. Price's accomplishments did not go unnoticed. The Florida Diamond Club selected him the State's Division II Coach of the Year, while the Miami City Commission honored him and his team with a Proclamation of Excellence.

The most successful season of all came in 1982 when the FIU team finished with a 51-12 record and earned a No. 5 national ranking in the final Collegiate Baseball Division II coaches' poll.

For the last seven years, Price has kept busy developing his program at the NCAA Division I level. His ten-year coaching record stands at 399-193, ranking him 78th in total career wins and 29th in winning percentage.

Rolando Casanova, Assistant Coach

olando Casanova enters his eleventh season as an assistant in the Florida International University baseball program.
Casanova, a second baseman at Miami Loyola High School, Miami-Dade C.C. South and FIU, works as the defensive coach, base running

instructor and recruiting coordinator.

The 33-year old Miami native has involved himself with amateur coaching for the last 16 years. In 1974, he was the junior varsity baseball and basketball coach at his high school alma mater. The following season, he was chosen as Loyola's assistant varsity baseball coach.

Casanova received his bachelor's degree in Physical Education from FIU in 1978, and that year, entered the college coaching ranks, joining the baseball staff at St. Thomas University. In 1979, he joined the FIU coaching staff, assisting then Head Coach Tom H. Wonderling.

In 1981, Casanova returned to Loyola, this time as a teacher and head baseball coach. He guided the Bulldogs to the Class 1A state championship. Head Coach Danny Price brought Casanova back to FIU, this time as a full-time assistant in 1982, and he's been Price's right hand man ever since—the longest tenure ever for a Golden Panther assistant coach.

Casanova also managed the Brewster Whitecaps last summer in the prestigious Cape Cod League, an amateur league comprised of many of today's college stars. He guided his expansion club to a second place divisional finish.

"The enjoyment I receive from coaching is seeing so many young people develop athletically and mature as human beings," said Casanova. "I feel it is an honor to be coaching at FIU — the school where I played ball and graduated."

Coach Casanova and his wife, the former Sylvia Betancourt are the parents of two sons — Adrian and Gabriel.



Tim Reker, Assistant Coach

itching coach Tim Reker begins his fourth season on the staff. Another alumnus of the FIU program, Reker pitched on both the 1984 and '85 squads and posted a combined record of 19-8. In 1985, he was the ace of the staff, leading the Golden Panthers

with a 12-4 record and 101 innings of work. Over the next two summers, Reker played in the New York Yankees organization and was a member of the Florida State League champion Ft. Lauderdale club of 1985.

A two-sport letter winner in high school, Reker played both baseball and football at Miami's Westminster Christian. As the starting quarterback on the football team there, he was selected All-County, All-Conference, All-District, and third-team All-State as a senior.

Reker has been given much of the credit for a FIU pitching staff that has ranked among the nation's leaders in earned run average over the past three years, including the 1987 staff that led the nation with an ERA of 2.84. That staff also set several new school records over the course of the 41-19 season.

"Tim possesses a wide range of experience as a player and he is a positive person who relates well with the players," said Coach Price. "He has done an outstanding job with our pitchers in the last three years and he's proven to be a valuable member of my staff."

Reker and his wife Teresa reside in Miami.



Rich Radford, Assistant Coach

ich Radford begins his first season as a student assistant on Coach Price's staff following a three-year playing career at FIU. He played in 109 games for FIU, batting .242 in 339 career at bats. He was second on the team last season with eleven home runs, and also fin-

ished third on the team with a .552 slugging percentage.
Radford's main duties include working with the outfielders, implimenting the weight program and coaching first base.



Mike Cadahia, Assistant Coach

ike Cadahia begins his first season on the Golden Panthers staff. Cadahia is a 1975 graduate of Miami-Dade New World Center, where he also was a two-year catcher. Prior to that, he played three years at Miami Springs High School.

Cadahia is currently owner of a local sporting goods store and is an Associate Scout with the Milwaukee Brewers. He and his wife Maritza have two children, Crystal, 7, and Michael, 6.

1990 Outlook

he Florida International University baseball team has never had a losing season in seventeen years of intercollegiate competition, so you would expect another winning campaign from Head Coach Danny Price and his team. But how about when you lose six of eight starters and four pitchers who combined for 26 victories and six saves from the previous season? That is what confronts Price as he heads into his eleventh season as head coach of the Golden Panthers.

With a schedule that has FIU facing Miami (FL), Florida State, Florida, Stetson, Central Florida, Villanova and Washington State, just to name a few, Price's squad is going to have to hustle for every win this season. "I'm pleased with the teams we were able to schedule this season." Price said.

"There are numerous teams that will be ranked nationally and others that appeared in both the national rankings and the NCAA Tournament in 1989.

"We feel like we are getting out to show others what we can do and hopefully we'll do enough that could enable us to receive our first regional bid," Price added.

Wiseman, Caraballo, Vazquez and Varela are just some of the names that have appeared on the lineup card for at least the past two seasons who have all graduated.

This season the Golden Panthers will not have the power hitting team of a season ago, when the squad hit 60 home runs. It will be a hit-and-run, steal, put-the-ball-in-play team that will force the opponent to execute in order to defeat FIU.

The following is a position-by-position look at the 1990 FIU Golden Panthers.

Pitching—The biggest key for the pitching staff this season will be whether or not there are enough arms on the staff to make up for the loss of Denny Wiseman, who is now pitching in the St. Louis Cardinals organization. Wiseman, a four-year starter for Price, holds many of the FIU pitching records, including wins, starts, complete games, and innings pitched, just to name a few. Other pitchers who have departed for the professional ranks from last season include Peter Gietzen and Larry Stanford (NY Yankees) and Al Pacheco (St. Louis Cardinals)

Leading the way among the returning pitchers is right-hander **Paul Anderson** (Spring Valley, CA), who won seven games and posted a 3.59 ERA during the 1989 campaign. He pitched as the number-two starter throughout the season last year and should once again see the mound in key games in 1990.

Also returning is left-hander **Leroy Ball** (Monaca, PA), who won three games with one save last season. He has pitched the most innings of any hurler on the 1990 Golden Panthers squad, having tossed 195 innings in the past three seasons.

Others who could see the starting rotation include **Jerry Santos** (Miami), **Danny Donovan** (Freehold, NJ), **Steve Milisits** (Minot, ND), or **Kevin Lucero** (Arvada, CO), all newcomers to the Golden Panthers squad.

Santos transferred from Florida State, while Donovan was an All-Region selection at Brookdale Community College. Milisits posted a 13-4 record with a 3.01 ERA at Iowa Western Community college over the past two seasons. Lucero pitched the past two seasons at Trinidad (CO) State Community College.

1990 Outlook

Armando Bertematti (Miami), Doug Girling (Miami) and Todd Lange (Sandusky, OH) could be used as long or middle relievers. Lange may also be used as the short reliever.

Bertematti posted a 2-0 mark with three saves last season, while Girling was 1-1 in his freshman campaign. Lange posted one save in limited action.

Infielders—There are currently six players battling for the four starting infield positions, but only Juan Barquin (Miami) returns from the 1989 squad. He looks to be the everyday shortstop for the second straight year for Price. He batted .287 last season with five home runs and 28 runs batted in. He should also help FIU field a strong defense up the middle.

At first base, **Jorge Gonzales** (Miami) has the starting spot heading into the season. Gonzales had a fine fall practice and

could also be used as the designated hitter.

Eric Cruz (Miami) heads into the season as the starting second baseman, with backup help from Mandy Palaez (Miami). Cruz was team MVP at Valencia Community College and was a first-team All-Mid Florida Conference selection in 1989. Palaez transferred from Miami-Dade New World Center and will add depth to the squad.

Nathan Harvey (Annapolis, MD) and Thomas Lane (Boca Raton, FL) are battling for the top spot at third base. Harvey was selected as the Maryland private school Player of the Year last season, while Lane was an All-Conference selection at Lake City Community College.

Outfielders — Gilberto Torres (Catano, Puerto Rico) is the only returning starter among the outfielders. He batted .277 with

six home runs and 24 runs batted in.

Michael Warner (Lake Park, FL) looks to have a shot at starting in center field to open the 1990 season. He was a two-time All-State player while playing at Cardinal Newman HS in West Palm Beach, FL.

Roger Bowman (Baltimore, MD) played in 45 games last season, leading the team with 23 steals in 30 attempts. He should

play a key role in left field.

Others who will be battling for playing time include **John Yselonia** (Coconut Creek, FL), **Javier Rodriguez** (Miami) and **Loris Mazzocca** (Montreal, Quebec, CAN). Yselonia could add to the offensive punch of the team, while Rodriguez may be the finest defensive player on the team.

Catchers — Fausto Tejero (Hialeah, FL) played in 37 games last season, starting 27 times, and will take over the starting catching duties full time in 1990. Tejero batted .267 last season

with 17 runs batted in.

Backing up Tejero are **James Ramos** (Tampa, FL) and **Hector Tundidor** (Miami). Ramos helped Tampa Plant HS to the Class 3A state title as a junior and a state runner-up finish as a senior. Tundidor transferred to FIU from Miami Dade New World Center.

Designated Hitter—Another set of shoes to fill are those of Freddy Varela, who hit 22 home runs over the past two seasons. He was an All-Region selection last year, when he batted .374 and set a school record with 58 walks.

Yselonia and Gonzales are the players that look to share the designated hitter duties.




