JAN B. LUYTJES

Biographical Sketch

Dr. Jan B. Luytjes, Professor of Business Administration in the School of Business and Organizational Sciences, has been a member of the faculty since September 1, 1971.

He was formerly Associate Professor of Business Administration and Deputy Director of the Office of Development Services and Business Research at the University of Kentucky.

Dr. Luytjes was born in Bogor, Indonesia, is fluent in Dutch and German and also speaks French and Bahasa Indonesian.

Before coming to the United States in 1950, he attended the Vrijzinnig Christelijk Lyceum at the Hague in Holland. He received his higher education at Middlebury College and the University of Pennsylvania, where he received the bachelor of arts degree in 1953, master degree in business administration in 1955 and doctorate in economics in 1961.

From 1956-58, he was an Instructor at the Drexel Institute of Technology, and served as Assistant Professor in 1962-66. In 1958-62, he was an Instructor at the Wharton School of Finance and Commerce of the University of Pennsylvania. In 1967-68, he was a Visiting Professor at the University of Kentucky.

Dr. Luytjes is the co-author of the book, Comparative Management, published by Harper and Row, 1971, and the articles, "Appalachian Brain Drain," published in Growth and Change, January, 1971, and "Midland - A New Town in Appalachia," a feasibility study published by the Economic Development Administration, among others. A new book, Private Initiative and the World Economy, is in progress.

His honors include a Fulbright Grant and a Smith-Mundt Act Grant in 1950. He is a member of Beta Gamma Sigma, Board Director of the American Society of International Executives, Secretary of the International Economic Council, and the Educational Chairman of the Pennsylvania-Bahia Partners for the Alliance and Kentucky-Ecuador Partners for the Alliance.
