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#### SECTION I

## The Beginning of a New Program

Florida International University, which began operation September, 1972, is not any place for a faint-hearted baseball coach.

"I don't expect to win any NCAA titles in the first year," said university president Charles E. Perry, "but I'll re-evaluate that position the second year."

Confidently planning to meet the challenge - even though it may have been a little tongue-in-cheek is Tom Wonderling whose Austin Peay State University, Clarksville, Tennesse, team won the Ohio Valley Conference Championship in 1971 with a 38-12 record.

Wonderling was selected from more than 100 applicants by

Paul E. Hartman, Chairman of the University's Division of Health,

Physical Education, Recreation and Athletics and Doyt L. Perry,

Associate Director of Athletics.

Wonderling was just the aggressive, energetic, successful young talent that Hartman and Perry were looking for.

Why did Wonderling want the job? "Because in the creative and experimental attitude at Florida International I see a bright future for athletics, as well as education, "Wonderling answers. Recruiting was Wonderling's first chore and his efforts were aimed primarily at the junior college level in Florida International's immediate area. The University is an upper division (junior and senior level) institution and must depend largely on the community college for students. With the players he gathered in Florida, and a few who followed from Austin Peay State University, Wonderling feels he has done pretty well. "I'm still looking for a couple more pitchers and an infielder," he said, "but what coach wouldn't want a couple more pitchers?" The new school is going to play a 56-game spring schedule

and a 10 game tour of Central America.

"We don't want to be too agressive until we get our feet on the ground," Wonderling explains.

However, he has plans to get aggressive.

"We'll get the nation's best," he says. "We'll play exhibitions against some of the minor league clubs in Florida, and we are going to tour one foreign country a year to play exhibitions."

The team will be playing home games on a borrowed field this spring, but work will be under way on a one million dollar sports complex, which will include a game field, a practice infield, five batting cages, four pitching machines and a field house.

Wonderling glows with enthusiasm when he things about it all, but somewhere in the back of his mind has got to be President Perry's "we'll re-evaluate that position next season."

#### SECTION II

# F.I.U. Sunblazers Open Season

Taking on an impressive 53-game schedule in its first year, Florida International University opens its 1973 baseball season against Miami-Dade Junior College, South, on Saturday, February 10, Head Baseball Coach Tom Wonderling announced.

The University slated games with such intercollegiate powers as Florida State University, Southern Illinois and the University of Miami. Other opponents included Cornell University, Seton Hall University of New Hampshire, Eastern Illinois and St. Joseph's College.

Florida International took on the UM Hurricanes four times during the season and wrapped up the year on April 28 against Miami-Dade South. The University also was invited to play in the Embry-Riddle Invitational in Daytona Beach March 14-16.

Since last September, Wonderling's 23-man squad played exhibition games with various Florida colleges and universities and Wonderling said he was "very pleased" with the

outcome of the exhibition play.

"Our main objective was to determine our strengths and weaknesses, to move the talent around and find out how much depth we had," he said. "Our pitching depth was questionable and we needed another infielder. We helped solve that by recruiting a number of players who completed their junior college requirements during the fall."

Eight players were picked up at the beginning of the University's winter quarter and Wonderling pointed to some of the standouts. "Mike Sanz, who started at shortshop, was very impressive. Larry Hoskin, our first baseman, also impressed me.

In the eight, Wonderling also picked up three hurlers -John Perez of Dade South, Ralph Alvarez of Dade North, and
Guy Bellavance, a French-Canadian who attended Palm Beach
Junior College. They backed up Wonderling's two top pitching
prospects, right-hander Frank Baumgardner, who comes from
Miami-Dade North, and lefty Bill Fireline, from Austin Peay
State University.

Wonderling named his starting line-up, made up of Douglas Cornett, Richmond, Kentucky, catcher; Larry Hoskin,

Suffield, Mass., 1B; Martin Jacobs, Hollywood, Fla., 2B;
Mike Sanz, Miami, Fla., shortstop; Jim Knox, Pittsburgh, Pa.,
3B; Danny Price, Whitakers, North Carolina, left field; and
Derek Crass, Clarsville, Tenn., center field; and Howie
Finkelstein, Miami, Fla., right field.

On February 17, Florida International played the second half of a doubleheader against Florida State. Between games, all lumni from Florida State and Miami-Dade Junior Colleges were honored.

Most of Florida International's home games were played at Tamiami Park, adjacent to the University's Tamiami Campus. A number were also played at Miami-Dae, North and South, Wonderling noted. "Miami-Dade, North and South, has been very cooperative in extending their facilities to us," he added.

#### SECTION III

Sunblazers Tour Three Latin American Countries

Florida International University's Sunblazers baseball team, which posted a winning 34-22 record in its first year, will left on a 10-day, ten game tour of three Central American countries on Friday, May 4.

The 28-man squad, including Head Coach Tom Wondeling, and Assistant Coaches Frank Merchant and Robert Delgado, toured Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua, and play three games in each country. The Sunblasers returned to Miami, May 14.

This was the first Latin American tour for the club.

Coach Wonderling said he is planning to make it a yearly

affair.

On May 5-6, Florida International played in Guatemala, with a doubleheader on the 6th.

The Sunblazers were in Honduras on May 8-9-10, for games with the Honduras military team; Verdun -- one of the top amateur teams; and the University of Honduras.

On May 11-12-13, the Sunblazers played Nicaragua's

top amateur federation team, which was the runner-up in the 20th World Games held last November in that country.

The Sunblazers nine wrapped up a 56-game schedule last Saturday, losing to Miami-Dade South, 5-0 -- the same team they won the season opener against, 6-0, last February 10.

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Baseball in Central America . . . where college ballplayers are given the hearty welcome of professionals, in a land where people from all levels of society abandon their television sets to attend athletic activities. When it comes to goodwill, the Florida International University baseball squad and Coach Tom Wonderling entered Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua, to play a ten game schedule, with the promotion of American collegiate interests in mind. They emerged from Latin American soil with seven wins under their belts, to give the Sunblazers at 41-25 record, in what Wonderling termed to be "the culmination of a hard working, patient, and understanding season on the part of his players, under adverse conditions, where they traveled almost daily to distant junior college fields within the Miami area to meet the majority of their opponents."

The visit to Central America, which had its beginning in Guatemala, marked the end of the efforts of the school's inaugural baseball squad, in its first year within the collegiate baseball ranks.

Confidence was instilled into the F.I.U. team in the initial game against Motos Suzuki, where Miamian Howie Finkelstein gave the Sunblazers an early lead with a three run homer in the second inning and a run scoring double in the third, producing an 8-5 victory. Florida International swept the remaining two games, 5-1 over Municipal and a 16-1 hitting barrage over the Universidad de San Carlos, where they lashed out 21 hits to remain undefeated until they hit the diamond in the second game played in Honduras.

Following Jerry Walsh's game winning double against the Honduras Air Force, which sent Ron Hodges and Jim Knox in to score and eventual victory of 9-7, the Sunblazers had a disappointing finish against the Verdun ball club. A 3-0 FIU lead was stopped after a grand slam home run off FIU relief pitcher, Terry Willis in the sixth inning fired up the opposition and proved to be a fatal blow as FIU lost its first game in Central America.

The FIU nine, led by Danny Price, Marty Jacobs, and

Carlos Perez, who each collected three hits and the able

pitching arm of former Miami-Dade North product, Frank Baumgardner,

bounced back in the series with an 8-2 win over Medias Verdes.

Baumgardner pitched 7 and one third innings of two hit ball,

before he strained a muscle and was replaced by Ralph Alvarez.

The Sunblazers played their remaining four games in Nicaragua for the benefit of the relief fund, established to rebuild the city of Managua, destroyed by an earthquake last December. The FIU bats could not manage to get the runs across, as the Nicaraguan All-Stars utilized their defensive efforts to stop FIU, 4-2. Canadian pitcher for the Sunblazers, Guy Bellevance could not match the Latin talent, and hurled for four innings before he was relieved by FIU's number one pitching prospect, former Austing Peay star, Bill Fireline, who tossed for five innings of no-hit ball.

Florida International's winning ways were revived in
the 107 degree heat against the Leon ball players. Sam Lombardo
pitched a five hit shutout to give the Sunblazers a final 3-0
and their sixth victory of the trip. Price, who was up at
bat four times, earned two hits and a two run double in the

fifth inning.

Chinadega could not catch up to FIU's s 7-4 rout,
despite a rally in the ninth inning, to give the Sunblazers
their final win on an enjoyable visit to Latin America. They
dropped their concluding game, 5-2, to Equipo Nacional, after
becoming victim of the best pitching talent in Nicaragua.

#### SECTION IV

## F.I.U. Sunblazers Complete Successful Year

Coach Tom Wonderling's squad had an impressive beginning compiling a record of 34 wins and 22 losses, they beat the University of Miami in the first game to be played between the two schools. After splitting its first six games, the Sunblazers took off on a streak, winning 13 of the next 16 games in the first half of March. They are also 1 for 1 in tournament play, taking the Embry-Riddle Invitational in Daytona Beach. The team also played five doubleheaders, winning four and splitting the fifth.

Outfielder Danny Price, a junior from North Carolina, paced the Sunblazers hitting with a fine .352 average. Another outfielder, Derek Crass, hit .312. Bill Fireline led the pitching with 7 wins and 3 losses.

The highlight of the baseball season was a 10-day, 10-game tour of three Central American countries in May.

The F.I.U. Sunblazers completed the fall season 17-3, spring season 34-22, and tour of Central American countries 7-3; for a successful year of 58 wins and 28 losses.
