Wolfe University Center director Whit Hollis, who funded the project, hopes the project will become an annual event. "I like the fact that we have no idea what we will end up with thematically," he said. "We'll see different styles and attitudes over the years as these paintings fill the building with beauty and expression. We're a young institution and we have the ability to start our own traditions. I hope more students get inspired to bring about their ideas. With a little creativity, anyone can start a tradition that can out live them."



To Your Health

Student Affairs: The Year in Review

During the past year, several major accomplishments were noted in the Division of Student Affairs under the direction of Vice President Paul Gallagher, who celebrated his first anniversary in the division in March.

Minority Student Services (now the Office of Multicultural Programs and Services), has excelled with grants being awarded to the department. Its Student Support Services received \$180,000 per year for four years for Super Summer students. Upward Bound, a program for 9th to 12th grade students to stimulate their interest in attending college, was awarded \$228,000 per year for four years.

Also receiving grants was the Victims Advocacy Center, which, along with Child Assault Prevention Program and Jackson Memorial Rape Center, received \$88,000 to establish a student coalition of peer educators and volunteers. The center also was awarded and doubled its Victims of Crime Act grant to provide crisis counseling to crime victims and to enhance its 24-hour crisis line.

The Graham University Center Phase II renovation plan was completed in time for the 25th anniversary celebration last Fall.

New residence halls are also planned for University Park and North Campus. A program


statement for a new residence hall at NC has been completed, and one was also finished for a new facility at UP. Major renovations will also be done to the UP apartments and the residence hall at NC.

Both The Beacon and WUFI radio continue to improve. The newspaper won the highest award it has ever received from the Columbia Scholastic Press Association and has purchased new computers to improve its operation. The radio station received more than \$100,000 toward equipment purchases needed to reach FM status. It is anticipated the station will go FM at 88.1 prior to this semester's end.

Other key division accomplishments included the creation of a Panther Parents Association, the Volunteer Action Center's Alternative Spring Break being named the top program in the nation, the Student Handbook being named the best student handbook, Career Services international award for

Picture Tel's Best Practice, the Team Ropes Adventure Course becoming fully operational at North Campus, and the accreditation of the Counseling and Psychological Services Center. The Student Affairs directors surprised Dr. Gallagher with a cake and gifts to celebrate his

first year in the division at a Director's Meeting March 4. The division looks forward to another year of accomplishments under his leadership.

Ernest R. Graham University Center Rededicated

The Graham University Center was rededicated last September 15 in ceremonies featuring U.S. Senator Bob Graham, FIU's first president, Chuck Perry, and a day full of celebrations and activities.

Sen. Graham was the keynote speaker at the dedication of Graham Center's new minimall, food court, and classroom wing. The senator also presented the University with a portrait of his father, Ernest R. Graham, for whom the building is named. The latter Graham first introduced legislation to establish a public university in South Florida.

The original building, "University House," opened its doors in June, 1974, with a gross square footage of I86,006 and housed basic facilities for food service, administrative and


student service offices, bookstore, game room, and meeting rooms.

The first major addition and renovation of 54.424 gross square feet, accommodating ballrooms, cafeteria, Gracie's Grill, game room, Faculty Club, Graham Center Office, and Student Affairs services, was completed in 1991. On September 30 of that year, it was renamed in tribute to the late Florida

The most recent addition of I67,320 gross square feet for 23 classrooms, a University Mall with a food court and retail spaces, computer lab, and renovation of the second and third floors, was completed in September, 1997, at a cost of \$11,276,192. The new total gross square footage is 207, 750.

Panther Cards

The Graham University Center hosted the annual State University System ID Card User's Group Conference in January. Over 25 Florida administrators responsible for managing their institutions' identification card programs met at Graham Center to address the issues of proposed changes for SUS libraries and the impact on the ID card system; the "smart" cards; and new technologies.

The group was given a demonstration of FIU's state-of-the-art, real-time, ID system, which services FIU's multiple campuses and vendors. Participants were shown FIU's system's applications of access control and debit financial transactions. The financial module has transacted over \$15,000,000 in the past four years. FIU is the only university in Florida to have a hologram ID card.

Sherry Carrillo, associate director of FIU Libraries, led a panel discussion on the proposed library changes, while Graham Center director Ruth Hamilton presented an overview of FIU's ID card program from its inception to present and future plans.





During the Fall, 1997 semester, University Housing staff, with the cooperation of several campus departments and faculty members, planned and implemented 152 social, cultural, and educational programs within the residence halls. In evaluations of the programs, 97 percent were rated by students as good, very good, or excellent.

FIU's new Safe Zone program has received a \$2,500 grant from the Dade Human Rights Foundation. The new program has been implemented as a result of conversations with faculty, staff, and students who thought that places need to be identified where individuals can discuss sexual orientation issues.

Safe Zones are also places where individuals who have learned that a parent, roommate, or friend is gay, lesbian, or bisexual can go and speak with someone who is understanding, supportive, and trustworthy. They are good listeners and have community resources that people can go to if necessary to get additional information.

A "Safe Zone" office is identified by a pink triangle magnet or sign with a green circle around it. The pink triangle has long been a symbol of gay pride and awareness of gay issues. The green circle serves the opposite effect of the popular red circle with a slash, denoting that it is okay to talk about gay issues where the magnet is displayed.

Career Services has been breaking records lately! For its 1997 Career Fair, 157 employers, 1,300 students, and 10 faculty attended. Twenty-three College of Engineering faculty and 38 recruiters participated in the first Industry and Engineering Forum.

In 1998, 157 employers, 1,700 students, and 10 faculty attended the Career Fair. Twelve College of Business dean, associate deans, chairpersons, and faculty and 36 recruiters participated in the first Industry and Business Forum.

The first Education Forum in Spring drew 160 students, 12 recruiters, and three faculty members.

Career Services also published the first *Career Manual*, hosted the SUS Career Services Directors Annual meeting, and had over 100 students attend the Fall Business Etiquette Dinner. Director Olga Magnusen made a Power Point presentation at the Spring meeting of the Board of Trustees.

First things FYRST

The Fall, 1997 semester marked the second year of University Housing's F.Y.R.S.T. (First Year Residents Succeeding Together) Program, based in Panther Hall. It is a program designed to assist first year residents with their transition to FIU. It doubled from its original size to over 80

Moving on up

The Upward Bound Program is designed to help students overcome class and social and cultural barriers to higher education. FIU's Upward Bound Program was developed for students with academic potential who need additional academic preparation and motivation to complete high school and later to succeed in college.

Sponsored by the Office of Multicultural Programs and Services, Upward Bound began in the Fall, 1995 with a grant awarded by the Federal TRIO Programs, U.S. Department of Education. It is one of several programs developed by FIU to motivate high school students to pursue a college education. It is presently funded to serve 50 students.

The program provides on-going academic preparation, counseling, and enrichment activities to pursue a college degree Students may participate in the program from the time they are enrolled in the Spring of ninth grade until they enter their first year of college.

During the Summer, a six-week residential program is offered. Designed to simulate the experience of attending college, the Summer program focuses on academics and counseling services.

The program is directed by Sofia Santiesteban with the collaboration of Carlton Daley, assistant director. The office is located in Graham Center 225.

The Student Support Services Program is a federally funded program that FIU received in the Summer, 1997 under the direction of George Simms, former associate vice president for Pre-College and Minority Student Services. It marks the second TRIO program grant (the other is Upward Bound) that Dr. Simms received while at FIU. A third TRIO grant (Talent Search) was completed and submitted on his last day at the University.

TRIO refers to six programs funded under the Higher Education Act of 1965 as amended: Educational Opportunity Centers, the Ronald E. McNair Post-baccalaureate Achievement Programs, Student Support Services, Talent Search, Upward Bound, and a training program for TRIO staff. The Student Support Services program is aimed at increasing the retention and graduation rates of first generation college students until they earn their baccalaureate degree.

The program is directed by Dorret Sawyers, with the assistance of two coordinators, Jeanette Cruz, University Park, and Jeffrey McNamee, North Campus.

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


The Women's Center also collected donations which were given to women who were in a domestic violence shelter over the holidays.
