


Media credentials Credentials for all FIU games are for working media only. Requests for media credentials should be made in writing on appropriate letterhead at least one week prior to the game, with season requests made at least two weeks prior to the first game. Requests should be directed to Rich Kelch, assistant athletic director for media relations. Requests from media covering visiting teams will be confirmed with that school's sports information director.

Spouses, dates, children and other non-workers are not permitted in working media areas in compliance with the working code of the Football Writers Association of America. All media services (statistics, telephones, game info., etc.) will be readily available at your convenience.

Credentials can be picked up at the Media Will Call desk at the northwest corner of FIU Community Stadium, gate N6. Media Will Call opens one-and-a-half hours prior to kick off.

Photographers Photo credentials will be issued on a game-bygame basis only. FIU will adhere to all NCAA guidelines regarding sideline photography. Photographers and videographers are not permitted to shoot between the 25-yard lines and must wear proper credentials at all time. Photographers may only work unrestricted on the playing field or in the bench area immediately before and after the end of the game.

Parking Media parking is located on a limited basis in the west lot (No. 7) adjacent to the FIU Community Stadium. Requests for parking credentials should be submitted to Rich Kelch, assistant athletic director for media relations.

Telephones Long distance telephones will be available in the press box for working media. These phones require collect calls or a credit card for billing. Any special requests, such as multiple phone lines, should be made at least two weeks prior to the

It is recommended that media on deadline order phone lines by calling BellSouth at (800) 753-0115. The address of FIU Community Stadium is 11200 SW 17 Street, Miami, Fla. 33199. Media who order lines are reminded to bring a phone set since only lines are installed.

Press Policies Working space in the press box is assigned on a first-come, first-served basis. Credentials will be issued according to the following criteria:

- 1.) Local and state newspapers by circulation, wire services, national publications, newspapers from opponents' area and student newspapers from FIU and opponents' schools.
- 2.) Other daily newspapers with preference to those that regularly cover FIU.
- 3.) Radio and television personnel not broadcasting, but considered reporting (Seats may be provided in the stands and locker room access granted.).
- 4.) Non-daily newspapers, with preference to those that regularly cover FIU.
- 5.) Scouts.

Freelance and/or non-daily writers may be asked to produce copies of actual publications in which their work has appeared. In some cases, these materials will be requested as verification of the writers' status.

Post-Game Interviews Media will be escorted to the field with approximately five minutes remaining in the game. FIU head coach Don Strock will be brought directly to the interview room, along with requested players, as soon as he dismisses the team and declares the locker room open. FIU's locker room is open to all media. However, it is imperative that female reporters inform FIU Media Relations personnel during the game that they will need locker room access. FIU players have been assured that they will be told on a game-by-game basis whether there will be female reporters in the locker room—a courtesy we feel must be extended. Post-game quotes will also be provided after all FIU home games.

Each visiting team will set its own post-game interview policy, which will be announced in the press box during the fourth quarter. Check with the opposing team's sports information staff if you have further questions.

Interview Policy All FIU players and coaches will be available throughout the season for interviews with members of the media. It is important, however, that all requests for interviews be made through the FIU Athletic Media Relations Office at (305) 348-3164. This allows us to arrange a time that will not interfere with a student-athlete's academic schedule, which is a top priority. No player phone numbers will be given out.

Golden Panther Web Site Notes, releases, statistics and other pertinent information are available on FIU's official athletic web site: www.fiusports.com. The Golden Panthers updated statistics will be available following each game, while updated game notes should be ready by Thursday afternoon prior to the game.

On THE AIR

WAXY 2790 (790 AM) is the radio home of Golden Panthers football. The 25,000-watt Jefferson Pilot Communications-owned station's signal reaches from Key West, north to Palm Beach and west to Fort Myers.

MZM Productions, Inc. enters its ninth season as the radio rights holder of the Florida International University radio network. The Miami Lakes based company, owned by former Miami Dolphin tight end and current Dolphins' radio analyst Jim Mandich. In addition to the FIU broadcast rights, MZM produces both "Strock Talk" and the "Donnie Marsh Radio Show." MZM also owns the "Sunday Morning Sports Page" radio show heard weekly on SportsRadio 560 WQAM.

Randy Kassewitz, who has worked the last eight years as the "Radio Voice of Golden Panthers Basketball" will handle the play-by-play duties for the inaugural season of FIU football. Kassewitz is a third generation Miami native who graduated with a degree in broadcast journalism from the University of Georgia in 1989 and is currently a partner and an executive vice president of MZM Productions.

Adam Levinson will join the broadcasts this season as the pre-game, halftime and post-game host as well as handle sideline reporting during the games. Levinson is a graduate of Syracuse University's S.I. Newhouse School of Public Communications with a degree in broadcast journalism. While at Syracuse, he was assistant sports director at WAER radio where he handled many of SU's football, basketball and lacrosse broadcasts.


STROCK TALK



The Don Strock Show on WTVJ



SPANISH RADIO

For the first time in the history of FIU athletics, all Golden Panthers football games will be broadcast in Spanish on WHRC (1550 AM) and WWFE (670 AM). A "Hot Line" (Linea Caliente con los Golden Panthers) will air on Thursdays from 4 to 5 PM on WHRC — Cadena Azul — 1550 AM.

Jerry del Castillo will call the games en Español. He was the Spanish play-by-play voice of the University of Miami since 1994 in football, baseball and basketball. del Castillo has broadcast two national championship football games as well as the Gator and Sugar Bowls. He was also the first Spanish play-by-play broadcaster of a College World Series and he called three national championship games there.

Jose "Pepe" Campos will act this season as color analyst. He's worked as the Spanish color analyst for baseball and basketball of University of Miami broadcasts and was host of pre-game, halftime and post-game shows of the UM football games since 1999.

Working the sidelines for all games will be **Jose Sotolongo** and **Eddy Cora** will be studio host.

STUDENT RADIO

WRGP (88.1 FM), Florida International University's student radio station, which can be heard through South Miami-Dade County as well as on the Internet, will carry selected Golden Panthers football games. Sports director Messod Bendayan and his staff will handle the broadcast duties.

From Miami International Airport

Take State Road No. 836 West (Dolphin Expressway) to Northwest 107 Avenue/South exit. Proceed south on 107 Avenue to Southwest Eighth Street (SR 41/Tamiami Trail). Turn right on Eighth Street, two traffic lights to Southwest 112 Avenue. Turn left onto the FIU campus, then make right-hand turns at the first two stop signs. Make left-hand turns at the third and fourth stop signs, then proceed along Southwest 17 Street to the media parking lot (No. 7) and enter Community Stadium through the Press Gate (N6).

From I-95


Traveling north or south on I-95, exit at State Road No. 836 West (Dolphin Expressway) to Northwest 107 Avenue/South exit. Proceed south on 107 Avenue to Southwest Eighth Street (SR 41/Tamiami Trail). Turn right on Eighth Street, two traffic lights to Southwest 112 Avenue. Turn left onto the FIU campus, then go right at the first two stop signs. Make left-hand turns at the third and fourth stop signs, then proceed along Southwest 17 Street to the media parking lot (No. 7) and enter Community Stadium through the Press Gate (N6).

From the Palmetto Expressway (SR 826)

Traveling north or south on the Palmetto Expressway, exit westbound on Southwest Eight Street (SR 41/Tamiami Trail). Proceed to Southwest 112 Avenue. Turn left onto the FIU campus, then go right at the first two stop signs. Make left-hand turns at the third and fourth stop signs, then proceed along Southwest 17 Street to the media parking lot (No. 7) and enter Community Stadium through the Press Gate (N6).

From the Florida Turnpike

Exit at Southwest Eighth Street (No. 25/Tamiami Trail). Turn right on Eighth Street (SR 41/Tamiami Trail). Go three traffic lights to Southwest 112 Avenue. Turn right onto the FIU campus, then go right at the first two stop signs. Make left-hand turns at the third and fourth stop signs, then proceed along Southwest 17 Street to the media parking lot (No. 7) and enter Community Stadium through the Press Gate (N6).

FIU currently has more than 33,000 students, 1,100 full-time faculty and 95,000 alumni, making it the largest public university in South Florida. FIU has been ranked among the top 100 public national universities in the U.S. News & World Report annual guide to "America's Best Colleges." The magazine also ranked the University as a "Best Buy" in higher education.

The University

Florida International University - Miami's public research university - is one of America's most dynamic institutions of higher learning. In the 30 years since accepting its first class. FIU has achieved benchmarks of excellence that have taken other universities more than a century to reach.

The University offers more than 180 baccalaureate, master's and doctoral degree programs in 16 colleges and schools. This fall, the FIU College of Law opened its doors to its inaugural class, becoming the only public law school in South Florida. FIU is among the nation's 25 largest colleges and universities and is America's top university in production of Hispanic bachelor's and master's degree recipients.

U.S. News & World Report has ranked FIU among the top 100 public national universities in its annual survey of "America's Best Colleges." FIU has also been recognized as one of the top 10 public commuter universities in the nation by Money magazine. Kiplinger's Personal Finance Magazine ranked FIU as the country's 18th best value in public higher education

The University is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's oldest and most distinguished academic honor society. FIU emphasizes research as a major component of its mission and is ranked by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching as a Doctoral/Research University-Extensive, the highest ranking in the Foundation's classification system. Sponsored research funding from external sources was more than \$60 million in 2001-02; over the past decade, research funding has increased more than 400 percent.

The Students

FIU has 33,000 students from throughout the United States and more than 150 countries. The student body is a microcosm of the diverse Miami community, with nearly 70 percent of student enrollment from minority groups: 51 percent Hispanic, 14 percent black, and 3.5 percent Asian. Approximately 10 percent of enrollment comprises international students.

The Faculty

The University has a nationally renowned faculty recognized for outstanding teaching and cutting-edge research. Seventy-seven percent of the 1,100 full-time faculty have terminal degrees. The student-to-faculty ratio is 17 to one.

A volunteer board of alumni leaders leads membership in the FIU Alumni Association.

The Campuses

The University has two campuses -- University Park in western Miami-Dade County and the Biscayne Bay Campus (BBC) in northeast Miami-Dade -- and two educational sites that serve nearby Broward County, including a new facility now under construction at the Academic Village in Pembroke Pines. FIU-University Park was FIU's first campus and administrative headquarters and continues to serve as the main campus today. It occupies 342 acres of lush, tropically landscaped grounds. Apartment-style and traditional residence halls, the Golden Panther Arena and other athletic facilities, the state-of-the-art, eight-story Greene Library and an environmental preserve contribute to a collegiate atmosphere that is distinctly Miami. The 40-acre Center for Engineering and Applied Science, a major research facility, is located eight blocks north of University Park. FlU-Biscayne Bay encompasses nearly 200 acres, including a natural mangrove preserve. The scenic, waterfront campus offers apartment-style housing, a library, an aquatic center, the Roz and Cal Kovens Conference Center (a state-of-the-art conference facility that can accommodate up to 500 persons) and gorgeous bay views.

The Administration

In its 30 years, FIU has been led by four university presidents, beginning with Charles Perry, who set in motion the growth and development of FIU and for whom the University Park administration building is named. Modesto A. idating mascot! Maidique is not only FIU's current president, but also the longest serving of any current president of a public university in Florida with a tenure now in its 16th year. Under his leadership, the university's enrollment has more



The Research

FIU's research programs have drawn increasing local, state and national recognition over the past several years, the most significant of which is the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching's most comprehensive ranking, conferred in 2000. FIU is now one of only 152 universities nationwide and one of only five Florida schools to hold the designation of "Doctoral/Research University-Extensive." Of the university's \$60 million in research contracts and grants, two-thirds comes from federal grants, with the Department of Energy and the National Science Foundation funding the most awards. Federal grants are considered the most competitive funding source and a key measure of the maturity of any university research program.

When FIU opened its doors in 1972, the Sunblazer was its mascot. The Sunblazers represented FIU for 14 years, but in 1987, President Maidique promoted a campaign to replace the Sunblazer with the Golden Panthers, a mascot that better represented FIU and its ties to Florida's natural environment, and the university adopted new school colors - blue and gold. In the summer of 2001, the FIU Golden Panther got a makeover, and the result was a "meaner, leaner" predator ready for a fight. FIU administration and students felt that the University's maturing athletic program -- especially with the start of football -- deserved a more intim-

band for the university, La Banda del Sol comprises more than 100 members. Under the direction of Marching Band Director Greg Martin, the group of musicians encompasses the international flavor of South Florida.

The Golden Dazzlers

The Golden Dazzlers are the dance team at FIU. In existence since 1989, the team now consists of 20 performers. Over the course of its history, the group has won the National Cheerleading Association Dance National Championship and racked up third- and eighth-place finishes in other years. The Golden Dazzlers currently perform at all home basketball and football games, as well as school pep rallies and special events.

The Cheerleaders

In 1998, FIU's cheerleaders received national recognition when they won the National Cheerleaders Association Grand National Championship Award. The FIU Golden Panthers cheerleading squad was the first team from Florida to win the national crown. The squad is made up of 27 members who perform at all football and men's and women's basketball home games.

The Student Groups

FIU Student Government Association — FIU's University Park and Biscayne Bay campuses each has a student government association, which works closely with one other and manages a \$6.5 million budget with funds allocated to each campus. Both campuses' SGA work to improve the quality of the academic, social and professional lives of FIU's students. Students at FIU-University Park recently elected their first woman president in more than 20 years, Jessica Morfi. Adrian Carter was elected to his second term as president at FIU-Biscayne Bay.

Volunteer Action Center – FIU Volunteer Action Center (VAC), is a student-run organization, designed to provide diverse opportunities for students to serve the South Florida community through volunteerism, service learning and advocacy. Founded in 1993, the VAC has empowered more than 2,500 FIU students to give more than 30,000 hours of service to South Florida non-profit agencies. The VAC provides services to faculty and acts as a resource to enable professors to incorporate service learning or community service components into their courses. Last Spring, students from the VAC spent their spring break volunteering at the site of the World Trade Center – a project that was prominently featured on the CBS newsmagazine 48 Hours.

Greek Organizations -- Social Greek-letter organizations are a relatively recent phenomenon at FIU. The first chapter, Phi

Beta Sigma, was established in the early 1980s. It was also the first Black Greek chapter and led to the founding of a National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC) at FIU. Phi Sigma Sigma, in 1984, was the first women's sorority. The Panhellenic Council (PC) soon followed to govern the women's groups. There are now 20 social fraternities and sororities at FIU governed by NPHC, PC and Interfraternity Council. Recruitment activities for the chapters occur throughout the academic year. Activities that all groups participate in include community service, social events and educational programs. Fraternities and sororities are committed to the overall development of their members, encompassing academic, athletic, and personal enhancement.

The Golden Panther Club

The Golden Panther Club (GPC) is the team behind the teams. The GPC is the official student-athlete support organization at FIU.

FIU Panther Pride Points

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching has ranked FIU as a Doctoral/Research University-Extensive, the highest ranking in its classification system.

FIU has a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, the oldest and most distinguished collegiate honorary society. FIU is the youngest university in the country with a chapter; there are 262 nationally and five in Florida.

FIU's Management Information Systems faculty was ranked II th best in the nation in terms of research productivity by The Academy of Management Journal in 2001

The FIU Creative Writing Program is ranked among the top 10 creative writing programs in the country by "Who Runs American Literature?" in the Dictionary of Literary Biography.

The FIU Tropical Biology Program embraces one of the largest concentrations of tropical biologists in the United States.

The FIU Latin American and Caribbean Center, recognized as one of the finest programs of its type in the world, is designated as a Title VI National Resource Center by the U.S. Department of Education.

Industry leaders recognize the FIU School of Hospitality Management as one of the nation's top five hospitality management programs.

The FIU International Hurricane Center is the nation's only university-based research facility dedicated to mitigating the damage tropical storms inflict on people, the economy and the environment.

The 2000 National CPA Examination Report noted that FIU graduate students rank first in the nation in passing the CPA exam on the first try and are consistently (last five years) in the top five in their exam scores.

The FIU Hemispheric Center for Environmental Technology, established in partnership with the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), is the nation's largest university site for nuclear decontamination research. The DOE's Oak Ridge Laboratory earlier this year named FIU the nation's top predominantly minority university.

In 1986, Modesto A. Maidique became president of Florida International University (FIU). During his tenure Dr. Maidique has presided over the establishment of the School of Architecture, the College of Law, and the football program, and doubled enrollment to more than 32,000 students. In addition, sponsored research has increased more than seven-fold, from \$8.5 million to more than \$60 million. In the year 2000-01, the university achieved the Carnegie Foundation's lead ranking, was awarded a Phi Beta Kappa chapter, completed the \$200-million "Campaign for FIU" and awarded its 100,000th degree. Now in his 16th year of service, Dr. Maidique is the longest-serving president in Florida's public university system.

A graduate of the Department of Electrical Engineering and Computer Science at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the Harvard Business School's PMD program, Dr. Maidique has taught at both of his alma maters and at Stanford University. He is a renowned authority on the management of high-technology enterprises. For more than two decades -- for institutions including the White House, Harvard and IBM -- Dr. Maidique has provided counsel on critical management and educational issues affecting our nation.

Throughout his career in both the corporate and academic worlds, Dr. Maidique has been involved with high technology firms in a variety of capacities: as an executive in established and entrepreneurial high technology firms; as a consultant, lecturer and

director for multinational high technology giants; and as professor and lecturer at leading universities.

In 1970, Dr. Maidique co-founded a semiconductor company that later merged with Analog Devices, Inc. (ADI), a manufacturer of integrated circuits. He also served as president and CEO of Collaborative Research, Inc., a genetic engineering company, and as a general partner of Hambrecht & Quist, a venture capital firm. He has consulted and lectured for major American firms including IBM, Rockwell International. Honeywell and Texas Instruments.

Dr. Maidique is the author of numerous articles in academic journals, a contributing author to 10 books, and a co-author of Strategic Management of Technology and Innovation, a textbook now in its third edition, which has been adopted by more than 100 colleges and universities. An article he co-authored, "The Art of High-Technology Management," is one of the best-selling articles published by the Sloan Management Review. He is also the co-author of Energy Future, a New York Times best seller on energy policy.

Dr. Maidique was appointed to President George H. Bush's Educational Policy Advisory Committee in 1989, and appointed to the Transition Task Force on Education by President George W. Bush in 2001. He serves on the boards of National Semiconductor and Carnival Corporation, is Vice Chairman of the Miami Business Forum, and is past chairman of The Beacon Council, Miami's economic development authority.

DIRECTOR OF INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS AND CAMPUS RECREATION



Rick Mello was named as Florida International University's tenth director of intercollegiate athletics and campus recreation on June 16 2000

In two years here, he has overseen the progress of the intercollegiate football program, spearheading program and stadium improvements for that sport while making great strides in the area of Title IX/Gender Equity. Under his watch, a new volleyball locker room and a women's tennis/softball facility was constructed. He also oversaw the search for the university's first-ever women's swimming coach who will lead the Golden Panthers when they begin competition in the winter of 2003-04.

The 43-year old California native served as the athletics director chair of the Sun Belt Conference Executive Committee from 1996-98 and aided in the development of the locally-syndicated Sun Belt Conference basketball television package. He also served two consecutive terms as the SBC representative on the NCAA Division I Management Council and has been chair of the NCAA Administrative Review Subcommittee for three year.

Mello spent the five previous years as director of athletics at the University of Arkansas-Little Rock where he successfully negotiated a five-year contract with the ALLTEL Arena that generated upwards of \$200,000 in preferred seat license revenue for the university. He also enhanced the UALR Sports Hall of Fame and established the UALR Trojan Foundation and its athletic booster club.

Mello is no stranger to the South Florida community. He served three years at the University of Miami (1992-95), where he was responsible for all outside revenue generation as the associate athletic director for external operations (development, ticket operanizations.

ations, marketing and promotions and special events). Those units produced \$12.9 million in 1993-94, including a record \$3.11 million in annual giving through the implementation of a new priority seating plan and solicitation system.

Before Miami, Mello spent eight years at the University of California (associate director for media relations, 1984-87; football recruiting coordinator, 1987-90; and assistant athletic director for marketing and promotions, 1990-92).

Additionally, Mello was media relations director at the University of the Pacific (1983-84), assistant executive director of the Cal State Fullerton Titan Foundation (1982-83) and director of marketing and media relations for women's athletics at UCLA

Mello graduated Cum Laude in Journalism from Utah State University in 1980 where he served as assistant sports information director for two years.

"After an extensive national search, I am delighted that Rick Mello has accepted the challenge to lead FIU Athletics further up the ladder of success and provide leadership as we launch intercollegiate football," said University President Dr. Modesto A. Maidique. "He comes to the university at a time of great excitement, which includes the start of a College of Law. FIU students expect success on all fronts and I am sure they will not be disappointed."

Mello is married to the former Kathy Notarangelo, a licensed marriage, child and family counselor with a Ph.D. in clinical Psychology. Their interests include antique collecting and a commitment to animals through work with national and local animal rescue organizations.



ATHLETIC SUCCESS 2001-02

FIU Athletic teams found themselves achieving more goals than ever before, as five teams reached the NCAA postseason and two won conference championships. The Golden Panthers finished fifth in the overall Sun Belt Conference standings, despite not playing in four league sports

Baseball – The Golden Panthers racked up quite a bit of hardware in the 2002 season. Senior first baseman Brad Eldred was awarded the Sun Belt Conference Player of the Year and freshman pitcher Derek DeCarlo won Freshman of the Year. Both were named to the all-conference team, along

with junior catcher **Tommy Dueñas**. In addition, Eldred and Dueñas received All-American honors and DeCarlo was selected with Freshman All-American status. FIU made its eighth NCAA Regional appearance and sixth consecutive, while head coach Danny Price picked up his 900th career coaching victory.

Men's Basketball – In only his second year at the helm, head coach Donnie Marsh brought national attention to the program. Brick Oettinger of PrepStars.com ranked Marsh's recruiting class as the fall's No. 22 best in the nation and the publication Basketball Times placed the Golden Panthers among their top-30 recruiting classes. FIU finished tops in the Sun Belt with 286 steals (9.53/game) and second in turnover margin (+1.53).

women's Basketball – Head coach Cindy Russo got her program back into the NCAA Tournament while recording her 500th career coaching victory and winning her first Sun Belt Conference Championship along the way. Russo was named the conference Coach of the Year for guiding her Golden Panthers to a 13-1 league mark and 27-6 overall. FIU reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament, after defeating Creighton, 73-58. Senior forward Gergana Slavtcheva was selected in the

second round of the WNBA draft.

Men's Cross Country - Senior Luiz Prestes earned All-Sun Belt Conference honors and posted the fifth-fastest time (25:10) in school history in the 8,000-meter run at the Walt Disney World Classic. FIU won three of seven meets, including the prestigious Disney, and finished in the top three five times.

Women's Cross Country – Junior Rebecca Rodriguez was the first all-conference runner in three years and raced in the NCAA South Regional. Rodriguez won the FIU Invitational to lead the Golden Panthers to a third-place finish.

Football – The football team ended its final spring practice with the defense dominating. The defense forced four turnovers on two interceptions and two fumble recoveries, and sacked the quarterback eight times. Head Coach **Don Strock** is ready to lead FIU through its first football season in school history.

Women's Golf – Junior Andrea Sarratt was named to the All-Sun Belt Conference team, marking the sixth consecutive season a golfer has been selected for conference honors. Sarratt led all FIU golfers with a 79.63 stroke average. The Golden Panthers finished three tournaments in the top five, including the Sun Belt Conference Championships.

Men's Soccer – The Golden Panthers appeared in their 13th NCAA postseason and fifth in Division I, while posting a 10-8 overall record. Midfielder Matias Asorey and defender Allen Handy were named Player and Freshman of the Year, respectively, in the Atlantic Soccer Conference, while Ezequiel Romero, Hendrix Emanuel and Juan Rivera earned all-league honors.

Women's Soccer – After winning the 2000 Sun Belt Conference title, the team came up one win shy of repeating the feat, ending with a 6-1-1 mark and 11-4-2 overall. FIU beat cross-town rival and then-No. 14 ranked Miami and ran head coach Everton Edwards win mark to just five shy of 150.

Softball – FIU had four players selected to the All-Sun Belt Conference team, including freshman pitcher Amanda Nealer. The southpaw finished sixth in the NCAA in saves (6) and 36th in ERA (1.09). Head coach Kim Gwydir led her team to its third straight winning season, while the program hosted the SBC Championships on its University Park playing field.

Women's Tennis – The Golden Panthers were selected to their second consecutive NCAA Tournament and posted an 18-7 record. FIU finished 38th in the final Intercollegiate Tennis Association Rankings, while the doubles combination of Anneliese Rose and Christina Campana was ranked among the top-50 for most of the year.

Men's Track & Field – Freshman Jamare Clarington competed in the NCAA Indoor Men's 60-meter hurdles and posted a school record time 7.30 in the 55-meter at the Nike Fast Times meet. Senior Alex Shaw of the outdoor team earned All-Sun Belt honors running 10,000-meters, as did junior Gerald Waugh in the 110-meter hurdles and senior Luiz Prestes who took all-league honors in three different events – 800m, 1,500m and 5,000m.

Women's Track & Field – Junior Vronique Wilson ran in both the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships. Wilson competed in the indoor 200-meter dash and was selected as the Most

Outstanding Female Performer at the Sun Belt Conference Championships. Two and a half months later, she qualified for the outdoor 200-meter dash finals and after her season-best time of 23.21 in the NCAA preliminaries, earned All-America honors with her ninth-place finish in the championship finals.

THE BIRTH OF A FOOTBALL PROGRAM

ne of the most important aspects of an athletic program is having a solid foundation from which the team can thrive. When FIU began its push for a football program, more important than a solid playing surface or a stadium or a field house was the need for a strong leader that would create the foundation for the team. The Golden Panthers found that foundation in head coach Don Strock.

"Strock has met all of my expectations. He has done a tremendous job for FIU," said Rick Mello, FIU Athletic Director. "In selecting a coach for FIU football, my No. I criteria was simply this - If I had a son with the talent to play football, would I trust Don to help him excel? The answer is undeniably 'yes I

And Mello is not alone. The parents and families of 85 young men have all entrusted their son's academic and athletic futures to Strock. Since February 2001, athletes from throughout Florida and from as far north as Pennsylvania, have joined Strock in making FIU history.

When Strock began at FIU as the director of football operations in 1999, talk of football had already begun.

In 1997, FIU President Modesto A. Maidique, who had found that he was constantly bombarded by the question, "When will FIU have a football team," from students, alumni and friends of FIU, began to investigate the possibility of having football at the university. He appointed a task force consisting of FIU faculty and administrators, students, alumni, and community and FIU Foundation leaders, too. The task force's report concluded that football would enhance campus life, build alumni loyalty, bring alumni back to campus and increase FIU's visibility in Florida and the nation

After much thought and further studies, President Maidique and university officials began the process of creating a proposal to present to the Florida Board of Regents to receive approval for the start of the program in 2001.

Part of the proposal process included hiring someone who would supervise the operational aspects of developing a football program and to secure important private support from the community. It didn't take long to identify the perfect fit, Don Strock, former quarterback of the Miami Dolphins. Strock quickly became the catalyst in lobbying the (now defunct) Florida Board of Regents for approval for the team, and in May 2000, the Board recognized the university's careful planning with formal approval of intercollegiate football at FIU.

watchers were surprised both that he obtained the maximum 30 commitments allowable under NCAA rules and that the prospective players included several Bright Futures scholars and a number of all-state, all-district and all-county honorees.

"Our first signees were a welcomed sight," said Strock. "And as the time progressed and these guys actually arrived on campus, it was the start of the dream coming to life."

Strock, who is considered by many to be the heart of the team, knew that several things needed to fall into place if the team was going to be successful.

In order to have a true home field advantage, Strock and FIU had a new field house built and a state-of-the-art turf put into place on the existing university football stadium.

A new 15,000-square-foot field house, which includes two locker rooms consisting of 120 lockers, a 2,200-square-foot meeting area with retractable doors for large and small team gatherings, a coaches' locker room, 24 showers, a training facility expandable to 1,200 square feet, a stateof-the-art, 5,300-square-foot weight room and storage space for equipment was built, and the players love it.

FIU also dramatically enhanced its field. AstroPlay® was installed helping to provide FIU and the area high school teams that use the field with a durable, high-tech playing surface. AstroPlay® will work well with the South Florida environment, Miami-Dade County, for instance, occasionally experiences water-use restrictions, as a result of drought conditions; AstroPlay requires no water, fertilizer or pesticides. It is a grass-like, non-abrasive, polyethylene fiber matrix filled with special rubber granules. Unlike other artificial systems, AstroPlay will not compact, grow firmer and become less shock absorbent with age.

Additionally, footballs bounce on the surface just as they do with grass, and the system "gives," allowing players to use grass shoes and relieving high schools athletes of the added expense of purchasing "turf" shoes. Installation cost approximately \$825,000.

AstroPlay® manufacturer Southwest Recreational Industries, Inc., has installed the system for the New York Giants at their indoor practice facility and on the college campuses of the University of Kansas, the University of Minnesota, Oklahoma State, the University of North Carolina

and Illinois University. The FIU Community Stadium is

In addition to the field and facility improvements, the FIU Community Stadium was renovated and expanded from 7,000 seats to approximately 17,000. The expanded facility will include temporary, end-zone bleachers, a press box and a luxury skybox.

Hand in hand with the home for the team, Strock started the training process for his players. Strock and his coaches have put the new players through a rigorous schedule that focuses first on their academic performance and secondly on their athletic ability.

"My No. I priority is that these young men learn," said Strock "They are here to earn a college degree. On a secondary level, they are here to compete on the football field. My coaches and I want to create that balance with our new team. They will go to school, and they will do well -- only then will they play."

Each day Strock works to instill pride and confidence in his players. He wants to prepare them physically and mentally for the pressures of belonging to an intercollegiate athletic team. He wants them to get used to playing in front of new friends and fans.

Last fall Strock scheduled four public scrimmages to show his studentathletes off and to get them used to playing in front of their new

Drills and team meetings have helped to solidify the team and prepare them for the challenges that lay ahead. Last Feb. 6, the second class was signed and the final stage of preparations will now lead to the fruition of years filled with anticipation and excitement.

It will all come to a head on Aug. 29, 2002 when the Golden Panthers play their first game under the lights of FIU Community Stadium against Saint Peter's College, in front of a statewide television audience.



Downtown—Where The Lights Are Bright From a distance, downtown Miami at night looks like a neon

activity. The most recent addition is the \$165 million American Airlines arena, home of the Miami Heat.

Also bustling downtown is the Bayside Marketplace, a 16-acre extravaganza of shops, restaurants and attractions like the Hard Rock Café Miami. From Bayside, visitors can take a romantic gondola ride while watching the laser-light shows that beam from the adjacent 28-acre Bayfront Park, or

Above and beyond the much-celebrated spots, Greater Miami has a rich leading travel destinations.

assortment of neighborhoods that offer charming nooks and crannies and offthe-beaten-path excursions.

Built in the roaring 20s, Coral Gables is a prosperous and dramatically beautiful city, marked by Spanish-style mansions, huge ficus trees, coral rock pools, lush golf courses and a commercial area that's jam-packed with specialty shops and restaurants.

Like most ethnic enclaves, Little Havana and Little Haiti are brimming with immigrant optimism. The Moorish architecture of Opa-Locka, inspired by the Arabian Nights stories, is a stunning inner-city collection of minarets, domes and horseshoe arches.

South Dade offers a more rural ambiance and features must-see spots such as Everglades and Biscayne National Parks, Miami MetroZoo, Parrot Jungle and Monkey Jungle, the Homestead Motorsports Complex and

FOOTBALL FACILITIES

FIU Community Stadium

The FIU football team trains and plays at the newly renovated FIU Community Stadium on the University Park campus.

Opened in the fall of 1995 at a cost of more than \$3 million, the stadium is situated on land that straddles the university and Miami-Dade County-owned Tamiami Park. This cooperative effort with the State of Florida, Miami-Dade County Parks and Recreation, the county commission and the Miami-Dade County Youth Fair, Inc. was the first known project in South Florida that involved a partnership of state, county and private interests.

Highlights of the facility include permanent seating for some 7,000 spectators, restrooms, concession stands, a new field house and lights for night competition.

As upgrades to the facility, the university invested another \$825,000 for the installation of its state-of-the-art AstroPlay® artificial playing surface. Billed as a new concept in turf systems, it is a grass-like, non-abrasive, polyethylene fiber matrix that is filled with special rubber granules. Field drainage is superb.

By the first kickoff on Aug. 29, FIU will also add 10,000 retrofitted seats that will raise the seating capacity to 17,000



for the inaugural season. Ultimately, the goal is to build a 30,000-seat stadium (with long range capability to expand).

In the meantime, temporary improvements like scoreboards on either end of the playing field, a message center, sound-system enhancements, a press box and a skybox will be added to increase spectator involvement and comfort.

Besides FIU athletics, the site remains a primary venue for high school football and track competitions and special events. Several of the university's commencement ceremonies, homecoming festivities and concerts have all taken place within the stadium.

As a track and field venue, FIU Community Stadium's GTE Rack 4000 track is a red polyurethane/rubberized surface that runs east-west and meets Olympic standards. The eight-lane 400-meter all-weather track includes two long jump and triple jump pits, high jump and pole vault areas and a water barrier for the steeplechase.



"Compared to a lot of other I-AA programs, we're so far ahead of the game," said FIU head football coach **Don Strock**. "The playing surface is obviously first class and when the stadium seating is installed, it will look even larger than the 17,000 seats it will have.

"It's so important to have an on-campus stadium for our alumni, students and fans. It makes it so easy for our student body to come out and support the program. We're excited about where we are right now," Strock said.

The Football Field House

The Golden Panthers football program enjoys all the amenities that are usually reserved for "big-time" college football. The 15,000 square feet FIU Football Field House, which opened in time for the 2001 fall campaign, houses all the tools needed for a success program.

This \$1.8 million project includes two locker rooms consisting of 120 lockers, a 2,200-square-foot meeting area with retractable doors that can comfortably accommodate 100 or be divided for smaller team gatherings, a coaches' locker room, 24 showers, a training facility expandable to 1,200 square feet, a state-of-the-art, 5,300-square-foot weight room and storage space for equipment.

The field house is home of a fully-equipped strength

training area designed to accommodate all student- athletes on an individual basis with respect to their particular sports. The program is structured to enable a student-athlete to be in the best possible condition.

Head strength and conditioning coach Lou DeNeen designs both in-season and offseason conditioning programs that assist student-athletes year round in improving their performances.









Hean Coach

DON STROCK

on Strock, FIU's first head football coach, brings firsthand experience as a player, coach and sports enthusiast to his fledgling Golden Panthers program. Strock, who was named the university's director of football operations in 1999 and head coach on Sept. 13, 2000, led the charge before the Florida Board of Regents to obtain approval for the program in May 2000.

"The only goal we've established for this upcoming year is that our athletes are going to play hard for 60 minutes, no mater what the score," Strock said. "That's going to be our trademark as a team. Opponents may come in here with better overall talent, but they better know that they'll be in for a fight."

A veteran quarterback who played with the Miami Dolphins for 14 years, Strock started only 20 games in Miami, emerging as the team's relief specialist. His most memorable moment came on lan. 2, 1982 when he entered the game with the Dolphins trailing, 24-0, then rallied the team before falling short, 41-38, in overtime to the San Diego Chargers. That was not only the highest-scoring playoff game but also the only game in NFL history where two quarterbacks, Strock and San Diego star Dan Fouts, both passed for over 400 yards.

A Dolphin from 1973 through 1987, Strock connected on 388 of 688 passes for 4,613 yards and received much credit for the development of Dan Marino early in his illustrious playing career.

Despite spending almost his entire career as a backup, he's in the franchise's top five in most career passing categories, including yards, touchdown passes, attempts and completions. Strock is second in Miami Dolphin team history—behind Marino but ahead of Hall of Fame quarterback Bob Griese—in career completion percentage (56.4).

> A fifth-round selection of the Miami Dolphins in 1973, Strock spent one year each with Cleveland (1988) and Indianapolis (1989). His 17-year NFL career places him in the top-10 list of longevity for a quarterback.

Strock's lifetime statistics include: 443 completions in 779 attempts for 5.349 yards with 45 touchdowns and 42 interceptions. He was involved in the NFL postseason 12 times and played in three Super Bowls (1974, 1983 and 1985) over

At Cleveland, Strock joined the team in a reserve role, but was called upon to help guide the Browns to the playoffs in an unusual season of quarterback injuries. He started two of four games in 1988 and was one of four starters at quarterback as Bernie Kosar, Mike Pagel and Gary Danielson were all injury casualties. Strock signed with Indianapolis in 1989, but his role was limited.

Strock, 51, began his coaching career in 1993 with Miami of the Arena Football League, guiding the team to a 5-7 record and the playoffs. In 1994, he joined the Massachusetts Marauders (AFL), taking them to an 8-4 mark and the playoffs. Strock was offensive coordinator/quarterback coach of the Rhein Fire of the World League in 1995.

He spent the next three seasons (1996-98) as quarterbacks' coach of the Baltimore Ravens, where, in 1996, he oversaw the second-best passing attack in the NFL

Strock's coaching philosophy includes a little from each of the head coaches he's played and worked under.

"They've all been such great influences on me," he said. "Don Shula taught me organization and I picked up the analytical end of the game mostly from Ted

Marchibroda. Galen Hall in the World League taught me patience. Guys were coming and going every day in that league, yet he was patient enough to stay with a plan and get the job done. Marty Schottenheimer was a players' coach who taught

"Every one of these coaches had his own philosophy but the one thing they all preached was to give 100 percent on every play. They were all different people, but they all had the philosophy of surrounding the ball, going 100 MPH and if you make a mistake, continue to go all out. Nothing good happens when you go half speed. That philosophy is sound, and that's the way I believe in doing things as a coach."

Strock's outstanding college career involved a passoriented offense at Virginia Tech. Overall, he completed 628 of 1,174 attempts (53.5%) for 6,009 yards that still stands as Tech's career best. Strock led the nation in passing as a senior with 3,243 yards (VTU's all-time season record), made an appearance at the Hula Bowl and was voted Outstanding Offensive Player, and later to the Hall of Fame, at the Blue-Gray Classic.

Strock also still holds the Virginia Tech single-game passing record of 527 yards accomplished against the University of Houston in 1972. Following that season Strock was named a third-team All-American by the Associated Press.

He holds a Bachelor of Science degree in distributive education. Strock attended Owen J. Roberts High School in Pottstown, Penn, and lettered in football, basketball and baseball. He and his wife, Debby, reside in Weston, Fla.

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH

BRUCE HARDY

When Don Strock was name director of football operations in 1999, one of his first decisions was to hire Bruce Hardy as the program's full-time assistant head coach.

"His experience speaks for itself with 12 years of professional football experience," said Strock. "Bruce understands and works well with these young men. He brings respectability to our organization. He is a tireless worker and a definite plus to the program."

Hardy was an outstanding prep talent. At 17, he was on the cover of Sports Illustrated, which deemed him "the best allaround schoolboy athlete in the U.S."

A Salt Lake City, Utah athletic phenomenon, Hardy earned all-state honors in three sports, starting as a power-hitting catcher who was called "the best high school athlete seen in 20 years." He was also a Class 3A MVP in basketball and football during both his junior and senior years. Recently, he was honored with induction into both the Utah Sports Hall of Fame for football and the state's Basketball Hall of Fame.

Now nearly 30 years later, Hardy recalls that talent and

looks for it in young student

"Don (Strock) and I have been friends for a long time and having the chance of

working with him attracted me to FIU," said Hardy. "But even more than that was the opportunity to get into a program at the ground floor—a program that is being started from scratch. That excites me."

In 1978, Hardy was drafted in the ninth round of the NFL draft by the Miami Dolphins and played with them at tight end until 1989. During that time, he caught 256 passes for 2,455 yards and started in two Super Bowls.

Once finished with his playing career, Hardy easily transitioned to the sidelines and coached in the Arena Football League for six years, including one year as head coach of the Florida Bobcats.

Hardy has four sons, Nathan 22, Adam 20, Aaron 18, and Matthew 15.

OFFERSIVE COORDINATOR

GREG BRINER

Most recently the offensive coordinator for the New York/New Jersey Hitmen of the XFL, Greg Briner comes to FIU with 25 years of coaching experience at the college and pro levels.

Before that, he coached at SMU, where he was also named coordinator of the South offense in the 1998 Blue-Gray All-Star game. With the University of Georgia, his quarterback, Mike Bobo, led the SEC in passing and was ranked fifth in the nation. The Bulldogs won the Outback Bowl in 1998 with a record set for completion percentage (93 percent).

Prior positions for Briner included offensive coordinator at Marshall University and the U.S. Naval Academy. At Navy, 12 offensive records were set and while at Marshall, the Herd won the I-AA national championship in 1992, leading the nation in offense and scoring and his quarterback, Michael Payton, winning the Walter Payton award, the I-AA version of the Heisman Trophy.

Briner was with the Indianapolis Colts as the quality control director and then moved on to become the quarterback coach. His career began in 1976 at the University of Oregon.

"Greg is an experienced offensive coordinator at both the I-A and I-AA levels. In fact, he was my quarterback coach with the Colts in 1989" said head coach Don Strock, "He's

just the kind of coach you need in our situation. He's a good teacher and works well with the kids on the

Briner holds a Master's of Science in physical education from the University of Oregon and a Bachelor's of Science degree in biology from the United States International

He was the California Player of the Year and prep All-America quarterback at Gardena High School in Los Angeles and a member of the 1970 Rose Bowl Team at the University of Southern California.

"Our goals at FIU are the same as they would be with any established football team: control the ball, make first downs and score points," Briner said, "lust because we are a firstyear program, we're not going to limit those goals. We're going to be as good as we can possibly be.

"The number of quality athletes in our area is well documented and our type of wide-open offense should be something that attracts them here."

He is married to wife Melanie.

HURLIE BROWN

Defensive backs coach Hurlie Brown's wealth of experience at both the major college and professional levels was a main reason why head coach Don Strock sought his expertise for his coaching staff.

"Hurley is a young coach who is doing a heck of a job," said Strock. "He relates well with the kids and they really look up to him after his days playing major college football. I think he's going to make a great college coach."

Formerly the defensive back/special teams coach at Merritt Island High School in Florida, Brown brings three years of coaching experience and seven years professional playing experience - including one year each with the Washington Redskins and the San Francisco 49ers - and a Erickson at the University of Miami.

in 1993 and '94, winning a Super Bowl ring with the 1994 team. Prior to coming to FIU, Grosso was an assistant coach and a guidance

counselor at St. Thomas Aguinas High School in Ft. Lauderdale from 1995-2000.

"Carmen is a veteran coach with experience on the high school, college and professional levels," said head coach Don Strock. "His background in guidance is another important quality of his with regards to recruiting and his contacts are invaluable."


Grosso holds a Master's of Science degree from Barry University in guidance and counseling and a Bachelor's of Arts degree in physical education from the University of Miami.

In four years at South Florida, Diaz played an integral role in the development of that football program's infrastructure. He directly handled many of the administrative duties of the program including matters relating to game operations, travel, facility maintenance and development, academic affairs, NCAA compliance, player relations, community and media relations, budget management, office-staff management and all aspects of recruiting.

At Columbia University, Diaz was responsible for the development of the running backs, especially standout junior Jonathan Reese who became the first running back ever to rush for over 1,000 yards in the history of Columbia University football.

Diaz also worked with the Lion's kickoff return unit that finished 29th in the country and second in the lvy League with a 20.95 yard per return average. His recruiting responsibilities included the states of Alabama, Arkansas, California, the Metro D.C. area, Mississippi and Ohio.

At USF, Diaz was a member of the first-ever football staff at that institution. During his years there, he served as tight ends coach,

special teams coordinator and recruiting coordinator.

Prior to that, Diaz had over eleven years of coaching experience while working full time in his field of study.

"It is always exciting to start a new program and see how the university and surrounding community respond," said Diaz. "Even though I've done it before, it's still tremendously exciting. Football should be a tremendous asset to FIU."

Offensive Line

STEVE SMITH

Offensive line coach Steve Smith was the most recent addition to head coach Don Strock's FIU football staff. "He's a Smith was Heidelberg's young, fiery offensive line coach who I believe has a great defensive line student coach future," said Strock.

Smith joins the Golden Panthers after coaching the last on to Temple University as a seven years on the South Florida high school level. He coached the offensive line at Miami Southridge High School from 1996-99 and, after helping the Spartans to the 1999 state championship game, moved on to Chaminade College impressive turnaround.

Defensive Line

IIM TAUBERT

A 25-year veteran as an assistant football coach, Jim Taubert will continue his career on the sidelines as FIU's defensive line

Taubert has experience on all levels of football, most recently having served as the linebacker coach at the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy in Kings Point, NY. Professionally. Taubert has coached for several teams in the Arena Football League including the New York City Hawks, Charlotte Rage and the Tampa Bay Storm, which he helped make into the 1991 AFL World Champions. He has also coached with the B.C. Lions of the Canadian Football League.

On the collegiate level, he has served on the coaching staffs at the University of Memphis, Bowling Green State University, Richmond, University of Tennessee at Martin, Kenyon College and Southern Illinois, where in 1983 he helped lead the team to win the I-AA NCAA championship.

"lim has been coaching since he got out of college and he's coached with me at several different places," said head coach Don Strock. "His experience on the defensive side of the ball will be invaluable"

Taubert has also taught physical education and has worked as an ECAC football official as well as served as a high school basketball and baseball official.

"At FIU, I like the challenge of being with a brand new program," said Taubert. "This was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to help build a program from scratch. What we see, is what we're building, not what someone else has already built. There are no obstacles here other than the barriers we put up

12002 Season Preview

he long wait for FIU football supporters is over as the Golden Panthers get ready to take the field for their inaugural season. It has taken nearly five years, since University President Modesto A. Maidique first established a task force to determine the feasibility of football at FIU, and now, Golden Panthers football is a reality.

Coached by NFL veteran Don Strock, win or lose, there should be plenty of excitement on the gridiron each and every Saturday, but fans will need to be a little patient, too.

"We'll play hard and fans will see some very exciting football," said Strock. "But remember that this is going to be a very young team. There are few schools anywhere in the country that will start as many freshmen as we will.

"Remember, we have no senior leadership. This is a brand-new group. We'll need some players to step forward and make plays on offense, defense and on special teams. As coaches, we'll try to put them in the best positions to do that. The staff is excited about the players we have, and those coming in. We're going to go out and play some exciting football and we plan on having a lot of fun doing that"

FIU's first-ever schedule is loaded with above-average I-AA opponents. The overall record in 2001 of the teams on the schedule was 66-51, and a couple of those (Maine and Western Kentucky) played in last year's NCAA Playoffs while another (season-opening opponent Saint Peter's) led the divi-

"This schedule will be a good test to see just where we stand as a program and how much improvement is needed in order to move on to the Mitchell, Julius Eppinger, Lenorris Hestor, Andre Rollins and Michael Edge. next level," Strock said.

At this point in time, the offensive-minded Strock believes the defense is the strength of his team. Other than during one spring scrimmage, the defense dominated the proceedings. That, according to Strock, wasn't all that unpredictable

"On defense, one player makes a big play, and the entire defensive side gets the credit," reasoned Strock. "On offense, the entire unit must work together in order to be successful and that takes time and patience."

Strock and his coaching staff welcome the team to the start of fall practice on Aug. 12. Seventeen days later, the Golden Panthers debut against Saint Peters in a game that will be televised statewide (and nationally on satellite) on Sunshine Network.

Former professional quarterback Strock will have three signal-callers in camp, but only one, redshirt freshman David Tabor, spent last year learning the system. Tabor, the All-Osceola County quarterback set county records for most yards passing (5,765) and touchdowns (57). He completing 63.2 percent of his attempts (48 of 76) in six fall scrimmages for 545 yards and two touchdowns.

But two true freshmen enroll at FIU this fall with eyes on the starting, assignment. Highly-recruited Jamie Burke threw for 2,835 yards as a senior and led the state with 34 touchdown passes. He was a second-team all-state player and runner-up as Florida's Class 2A Player of the Year. Also expected to compete for playing time at quarterback is All-Space Coast Conference pick Josh Padrick who accounted for almost 1,800 all-purpose yards as a high school senior.

Strock hopes for a balanced offense, a 50-50 mix of pass and run and, because of that, hopes to have seven or eight receivers who will play key roles. Two transfers who will get long looks are sophomores Harold Leath (West Virginia) and Cory McKinney (UConn). Leath participated in spring drills and turned heads with six receptions for 93 yards and a touchdown. McKinney was a first-team all-state selection out of high school.

True freshmen C.J. Smith and Gentry Jackson are also expected to contribute. Smith has prep all-star experience with great hands and good speed while Jackson was the utility player of the year in Florida last year. Besides wide receiver, he can also fill in as a defensive back if the need arises.

Back after spending a redshirt year at FIU are receivers like Everett Mitchell is expected to see action as a third-down slot-back receiver and Eppinger averaged nearly 11 yards on 14 catches last fall. Hestor (pelvis), Rollins (ACL) and Edge (collar bone) all look to rebound from injuries.

Another freshman who could play into the rotation is walk-on Dan Landrau, a favorite receiver of quarterback Burke at Cardinal Mooney High School. Among his prep accomplishments was being named an area Player of the Week after setting a new state record with nine catches for 225 yards

Tight ends Edwin Pierre and Joe Struyf also figure into the mix. Pierre was an all-state and all-county selection who ranked among the top tight ends in Florida in 2000. Struyf was a team MVP in three different sports in high school. He led FIU last fall with 18 pass receptions, 201 yards and three touchdowns.

freshman Tori Robinson, junior Jerrid Lundstedt and true freshman Dravien Jones as the top contenders there. Robinson was the prize of 2001's recruiting class and led all fall rushers with 291 yards on 61 carries and two touchdowns. Lundstedt, a transfer from Southern Illinois University, was one of the top backs in all three spring scrimmages, rushing for 145 yards and a touchdown. Jones is a tough inside runner who was his prep team's MVP

after rushing for 1,111 yards last season. called upon when the two-back offense is employed, as will fullbacks, freshmen Adam Gorman and Adam Radno and sophomore Aston Wilson.

Strock saw potential in his returning offensive line, but went out and recruited size and toughness to help bolster that area. Eight new true freshmen offensive linemen were brought in who average better than 6-feet-4 and 283 pounds each.

"Everyone of the players we had in last year worked hard and at times showed potential, but the offensive line aggressiveness and toughness needs to be improved. That's why we went out and added depth, there," said Strock.

Strock and his coaches went out and built a defense they believe can compete right away. "Defense is probably the strength of this team, right now," he said. "Our secondary is very strong. The linebacker corps seems solid. We may need a little more help on the line, but overall, I'm pleased."

The coaches seemed settled on the backfield as far back as the end of last fall's practice. Freshman Kris Thomas and sophomore Kevin Timothee are penciled in as the starting cornerbacks. Freshmen Nick Turnbull and John Haritan should be the starting safeties. Thomas is a good cover back who is physical and likes to mix it up. Timothee is another speedster with good cover ability. Turnbull is a playmaker who ranked third on the squad last fall with 28 tackles (14 solo) and led the defense with a pair of interceptions. Haritan showed tremendous improvement in the last year and led the defense with 34 tackles (20 solo) last fall.

A host of others will compete for nickel and dime assignments including sophomore Greg Moss and freshmen Matt Castillo, Terran Bell, Travis Brown and Randy Arnold at the corners, and freshmen Gerrod Bodie, James Knapp, attending Miami-Dade C.C.

Strock sees the team mainly running the one-back offense with redshirt Demeritt Rucker and Everett Baker at the safeties. Moss is the top nickel back on the depth chart and Arnold is a great athlete who should come in and immediately compete for playing time. Baker is another good athlete who has made a lot of plays as a high school free safety and Knapp has endeared himself to the coaching staff by doubling as the long snapper on punts.

Among a solid group of linebackers, freshmen Dane Ireson (strong side),

Lance Preston (middle) and Kyle Salas (weak side) have the inside tracks on er rushing for 1,111 yards last season.

Sophomore Rashod Smith and junior O.J. Price will probably be the first

starting, Ireson, one of only two players on the roster from outside of Florida,
made 19 tackles (11 solo) in the fall. Preston is a tough, physical linebacker, expected to make a lot of tackles. Salas has gotten himself bigger and stronger in the weight room and he made plenty of important defensive plays during the fall and spring scrimmages.

Capable backups at linebacker include sophomore Johnathan Sturrup who will be used in third-down nickel situations, and freshmen Shaun Dudney and Ethan Cherasia who are expected to compete against Preston and

Ireson, respectively.

On the defensive line, Strock has identified freshmen Christopher Horne and Payton Williams as his starting ends. Horne came on in spring drills with 11 tackles and 2.5 quarterback sacks over the last two scrimmages. Williams had 21 tackles (13 solo) in five fall scrimmages and far-and-away dominated the line with 11 quarterback sacks.

The two starting tackle spots are up for grabs, however. Redshirt freshmen Josh Alexander, George Gonzalez, Nick Carreño and sophomore Ira Turner along with true freshmen Terrance Allen and Brandon Higdon will all compete for those two spots.

Kickers have come and gone from camp, but one who has remained is freshman Adam Moss, a strong-legged place kicker who showed promise on kick-offs and long field goal attempts.
