ALL RESERVATIONS MUST BE IN BY TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 7, 1967. "KATIE"



WELCOME TO OUR NEWEST BABY "AN AARDVARK"



CRANDON ZOO NEWS

No one expected the arrival of our newest and most famous baby shown on the opposite page. She was discovered at 4:00 P.M. on September 24, 1967 laying on her back with her feet in the air. The zookeeper finding her thought she was dead, but when he picked up the small wrinkled baby, he was glad to find her very much alive. Several attempts were made to place the baby with its mother, but she showed no interest in it.

The baby, a female measuring 22 1/2 inches in total length, standing 6 1/2 inches tall at the middle of the back and weighing 4 lbs. 2 ozs., is being hand raised by Dr. Ronald Sampsell, Staff Veterinarian, on a diet of artificial milk with strained baby beef added to the formula.

The baby, still un-named is very active and in the first week, gained 14 ounces in weight.

This is the first captive birth of an Aardvark in the Western Hemisphere and the only other Zoo to report an aardvark birth is the Frankfurt (Germany) Zoo. This one apparently did not survive.

You will get an opportunity to see this very famous baby at the Annual Dinner on November 13, 1967, as Dr. Hubbel plans to bring her, along with several other small animals, for you to see.
