THE NYALA

Across the walkway from the gorillas, in the paddock until recently inhabited by the maribou stork, is the zoo's newest arrival -- the nyala (*Tragelaphus angasis*). These impressive antelopes are from Eastern South Africa, where they live on plains in the

fringe forest area, primarily along the river.

The nyala collection at Metrozoo consists of one adult male, two females and one juvenile male. These animals were received from Santo Domingo and are from wild founder stock, representing a new bloodline in the United States.


Nyalas belong to the spiral-horned antelopes (which include kudus, bushbucks and sitatungas), and have a distinctive, striped coat, with fine white lines running vertically. There is a marked difference between the males and females of this species. Females are a rich chestnut color, weigh up to 200 pounds, and are three feet high at the shoulder. The males are half a foot taller, weight up to 285 pounds, and are a darker slate brown. Unlike the females, the males have horns that are lyreshaped and may reach 30 inches in length. The male's mane runs to the base of the tail and stiffens to threaten other males, to attract females, or when he senses danger.

Nyalas are browsers, eating leaves, fruit, flowers, twigs and the bark of more than one hundred species of plants. They are capable of standing on their hind legs to reach high-hanging leaves, and also occasionally eat tender shoots of grass. In the wild, nyalas roam in herds of 6 to 40 animals. A herd may consist of females with one mature male, all males, or all females.

When walking, they proceed in single file, with the females in the lead and the oldest bull bringing up the rear. They feed mainly in the early morning and late afternoon, but are sometimes active during the day, and at night during the rainy season. There is extensive overlapping of home range both between and within the sexes, but they don't seem to be territorial.

The gestation period of the nyala is from 7 1/2 to 8 1/2 months. After it is born, the single offspring, weighing 10 - 12 pounds, is usually hidden in thickets by its mother for one or two weeks. At birth, both sexes are the same color, resembling adult females.

The nyala will allow other animals to come quite close before running away. In fact, nyalas have one of the shortest flight distances of any of the antelopes. This





Docents For A Decade

Three members of our group recently became 10-year docents. What is the secret of their success? Loyalty, commitment, tenacity, and, most of all, flexibility.

Joyce Meade has actually been a docent for a dozen years. She was in the second-ever docent class in 1973. Since then, she has been a docent, President of the Docent Council and Board Member of the Zoological Society. Petite and attractive, Joyce has played a highly visible role in promoting the zoo by co-starring with various animals on TV programs such as "Skipper Chuck," "Outside Chance," "Something on Seventeen," and "Duck Duck Goose," In her spare time, Joyce has been mother to 18 opossums, 12 ducks, countless baby birds, bats, snakes, a raccoon and a spider monkey!

Bob Kartman says he has been a docent for 10 years because he loves both the people and the animals at the zoo. Although the docent council now boasts a number of husband-wife teams, Bob and Flo Kartman were the first.

They loved Crandon Park and volunteered a great deal of their time there. Bob reminisces fondly about Duchess and Colonel, two chimpanzees who loved grapes. In fact, when Flo died, Bob adopted Duchess in her memory through the Adopt-An-Animal program.

Chester Wofsey's trip to Kenya in the early '70s and his frequent visits to the London Zoo prompted his interest in Crandon Park Zoo. His enthusiasm has never waned. He remembers all that has happened at the zoo in the last 10 years -- the names of all the animals, the funny incidents, the poignant moments. As a docent, Chester shares his memories and knowledge with others. A retired criminal investigator for the IRS, perhaps Chester finds it a pleasant change to give information rather than to get it.

To Russia, With Love

Two fertile Stanley crane eggs laid at Metrozoo are now at the Oka State Nature Reserve in Russia, part of a rare exchange program to preserve the world's vanishing wildlife.

The Stanley crane eggs were taken to Chicago, packed in a specially designed box with foam rubber and a hot water bottle. They were handed over to Dr. George Archibald, director of the International Crane Foundation, who then carried the eggs, along with three Siberian crane eggs laid at Baraboo, Wisconsin, to the nature reserve in Russia.

We hope that Metrozoo's Stanley eggs will hatch into potential mates for the Oka State Nature Reserve's two Stanley cranes -- both males. The Russians are interested in establishing a breeding program for this African species. The Stanley crane is one of several bird species that Metrozoo is concentrating on reproducing.

It was an obvious match. In return for the two fertile eggs, Metrozoo will receive a pair of birds from the U.S.S.R., probably a species that we would be unable to obtain otherwise.

The International Crane Foundation, in conjunction with the World Wildlife Fund, has been working with the nature reserve in Russia since 1977 in a cooperative breeding program for Siberian cranes, which are severely endangered in the wild. The fertile eggs being delivered to Russia from Wisconsin will be placed in the nests of common cranes, in an effort to bolster the meager population of Siberian cranes in the wild.

This is an important step towards cooperation in preserving endangered and rare wild-

life around the world, and Metrozoo is proud to be involved. State of Florida




In addition, the nominating committee was chosen, and this committee will nominate future members of the Board of Directors.
