THE REBUILDING OF SULAWESI


S ince the opening of the Asian/European lobe of Metrozoo in 1982, Sulawesi has been a focal point for human - animal interaction. Nowhere else in the zoo could visitors feed or touch some of our exotic animals; from the aardvark to the pygmy zebu.

Designed after the villages on the island of Sulawesi, part of the island nation of Indonesia, our village of Sulawesi adds bright colors and a touch of Asian culture to the zoo grounds.

Originally designed as an animal contact area, Sulawesi evolved into an educational experience with the hope of instilling in our patrons an awe and respect for wildlife from around the world as well as their own back yards.

In trying to maintain the naturalistic style of Metrozoo, Sulawesi was built with all natural materials. Unfortunately, the Florida climate is not very kind to palm fronds or wood, and early last spring, it became obvious that repairs would have to be made to keep Sulawesi going.

While looking at the physical needs of the area, zoo staff began re-evaluating the needs of the zoo visitor in regard to animal contact, entertainment and education. The result was a consensus of opinion that Metrozoo had an obligation to provide more to the public.



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will ultimately include educational facilities, a children's playground and a nursery for small animals.

The Zoological Society quickly offered it's support to the project and meetings were begun to develop the basic concept from which we would work.

It became clear from the onset that the rebuilding of Sulawesi was going to be no small task. Given the numerous other projects and commitments made by the Zoological Society and zoo for the 1986/1987 budget years, the decision was made to plan Sulawesi in three phases.

The first phase should begin this fall and will consist of the following:

1. Expansion of the seating area adjacent to the existing food stand. Continued on Page 2

- Renovation of all animal stalls located on the west side of Sulawesi, adding concrete flooring, block walls, and new back holding areas.
- 3. New roofing material for all of the existing structures.
- 4. A new tack room for the keeper staff, equipped with holding cages for small animals, and food preparation area with lockers and showers.
- 5. Expansion of the existing goat corral to hold deer and provide them with holding stalls for night protection.
- 6. Construction of shaded seating areas under the existing east wing where the bird rooms are now located.
- 7. Constructing a show ring and expanding the present seating capacity for elephant shows. We will move our elephant demonstrations from the Burma Trail, where they are now being held, to Sulawesi.
- 8. The elephant ride ticket booth will be moved back to its original location and the ride trail will be resurfaced. Trees will be planted along the trail to give the rider a more "jungle like" experience.

This will complete Phase I of the rebuilding of Sulawesi. The remaining phases will occur over the next several years as funding permits.

At this point in our planning, we hope to include in Phase II and Phase III some of the following:

- A children's interpretive center with a large classroom, laboratory and library, plus an outdoor classroom area combining animal and educational graphic displays in a jungle garden habitat.
- A small animal nursery for hand-rearing orphaned animals, equipped with viewing windows for the public.
- Numerous small mammal and bird displays to provide activity and color for children and adults alike.

Our goal is to change Sulawesi from a one dimensional experience, as it exists, into a multi-dimensional center for education and entertainment. We aspire to provide our visitors and Zoological Society members with a means of getting better acquainted with Metrozoo and the world of animals it strives to protect. It is only through the support of the Zoological Society that Metrozoo will be able to accomplish the task of expanding Sulawesi

Black & White Ruffed Lemur

The black and white ruffed lemurs belong to a very unique and ancestral form of primate called prosimians. German zoologists refer to all prosimians as Halfbaffen, half-monkeys. The reason for this is that it is scientifically incorrect to call a prosimian a monkey because they actually represent a transitional stage between insectivores (insect eating mammals) and the true monkeys.

The family Lemuridae (true lemurs) consists of nine recent species, of which the ruffed lemurs are the largest living members.

Today, lemurs can only be found in Madagascar and a few smaller islands in the Indian Ocean. Inhabiting the forests of eastern Madagascar, the black and white ruffed lemur has a very soft thick fur and its ears are hidden by a ruff of white hair. All Malagasy prosimians are listed as endangered by the United States Department of the Interior and are on appendix 1 of the Convention for International Trade in Endangered Species.

Metrozoos first pair of black and white ruffed lemurs arrived in February 1984 on a breeding loan from the San Diego Zoo. Since they replaced the more common ring-tailed lemurs onexhibit, they have produced two litters. A set of triplets was born in June 1985, and the following May the same female gave birth to twin males. The infants weigh 80-95 grams at birth (about 3 ounces). Unlike the ring-tailed lemur mothers who carry their offspring wherever they go, the ruffed lemurs prefer to deposit their young in a nest of branches and leaves. Females nurse their young from three pairs of mammary glands, one set on the chest and two sets on the abdomen.

As the wild population of all lemurs continues to succumb to the pressures of deforestation, it becomes most imperative that zoos pool their resources to maintain a self-sustaining captive population of these gravely endangered primates.



The American Association of Zoological Parks and Aquariums (A.A.Z.P.A.) formed in 1924, of which Metrozoo and the Zoological Society of Florida are members, is a non-profit organization which represents virtually every major professionally operated zoological park and aquarium in north America.

In 1980, the A.A.Z.P.A.'s Board of Directors voted that conservation of the world's wildlife become the Association's highest priority. From this commitment evolved the Species Survival Plan (SSP), the master breeding plan for endangered animals.

In 1984, the Board voted to form an endowment fund for conservation projects. The endowment fund is supported by zoos, zoological societies, corporations, foundations and individuals who support the worldwide conservation efforts of the A.A.Z.P.A. The Zoological Society has pledged \$25,000 on behalf of the Society and zoo to the endowment fund.

Members from different zoos make up the A.A.Z.P.A.'s Board of Directors and its numerous board committees. Metrozoo is represented on the board committees by Education Director, Dr. Gordon Hubbell; General Curator, Bill Zeigler; Business Manager, Eric Stephens; and Curator of Mammals, Rick Barongi. Dr. Gordon Hubbell, is a past president of the A.A.Z.P.A. He was also a member of the Accreditation Committee which oversees the accreditation process which zoos must pass to become a member of the A.A.Z.P.A.

Presently, Dr. Hubbell serves on the Long Range Planning Committee, the Ethics Board and is Chairman of the Convention Program Committee.

Bill Zeigler is one of three Vicechairmen for the Wildlife Conservation and Management Committee (WCMC). WCMC oversees all conservation activities of the A.A.Z.P.A. He is Chairman of the Clearinghouse Committee which handles the distribution of all confiscated animals that enter the United States illegally. In September, he was appointed to the International Zoo Liaison Committee which will represent the A.A.Z.P.A. dealings with other zoos outside the United States. In addition, Mr. Zeigler is on the SSP Committees for the conservation of the following animals: Indian, black and Sumatran rhinogs, Asian elephant, Grevy zebra and okapi.

Rick Barongi is a member of the SSP Committee for the scimitar horned oryx.

Eric Stephens was recently appointed to the Association's Bylaws Committee.

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President's Message

Perhaps one of the greatest honors a person can receive is the opportunity to accept a leadership role in an organization that is near and dear to your heart. On October 7, 1986, I was installed as the President of the Zoological Society of Florida and given the responsibility of representing 62,000 members in a mutual effort to advance the cause of Metrozoo. With this honor goes the responsibility of following in the footsteps of past presidents such as Lester Goldstein, Ron Esserman, Jack Lowell and Dick Mahmarin, which is a tall order in itself.

Even more important is the responsibility for providing direction to a dedicated staff led by Executive Director Joe Ferrer, meeting the expectations of the Metrozoo staff led by Bob Yokel, and representing the Zoological Society before the Parks and Recreation Department Director Bill Bird and the Board of County Commissioners which provides overall policy guidance for Metrozoo. This year is also the beginning of the one year term of presidency which provides the challenge of achieving goals during a shorter period of time. When one reviews the composition of the Executive Committee and the Board, it is an extreme pleasure to realize the tremendous level of leadership for the future.

A number of challenges face Metrozoo and the Zoological Society of Florida. As Dade County reaches its taxation limit, it is clear that a debate will ensue regarding the allocation of scarce resources between basic services and the alternate uses which many view as lower priority. It will be difficult to expand the operational subsidy for Metrozoo in light of police protection, health care and transportation needs. The responsibility of the Zoological Society will be not only to provide capital projects such as the Christopher Weeks Memorial Hospital, the Koala project, and the replacement of Sulawesi Village, but also to assist in the development of a permanent operational funding source. This issue must be resolved during the upcoming year. We must also expand utilization of Metrozoo and support for the Zoological Society from all segments of our community as a primary goal. To continue growth in fundraising, membership, the Board of Trustees, endangered species programs, and completion of the south lobe will also be high priorities.

In future messages from the President, it will be a pleasure to share with our members the history of Metrozoo and observations on various programs and projects. For this first message, it is enough to say thank you for your confidence and to accept the great challenge of being President of the Zoological Society of Florida.
