NEW AMPHITHEATER SHOWS

S everal times a day the "oohs and aahs" of zoo visitors can be heard above the calls of the gibbons and siamangs. The exclamations originate at Metrozoo's amphitheater which now houses an entirely new collection of animals. During the last several months, Metrozoo's staff has been busy putting together some very special, all new shows. The new shows will expose the public to a wide variety of animals never seen before at Metrozoo.

Although educational, the new shows also provide an enjoyable experience for the visitors. The blend of humor, excitement and information will keep everyone entertained while they learn more about some intriguing creatures. It is not the zoo's intent to teach animals to "jump through flaming hoops", but rather to demonstrate behaviors that are natural to them in the wild.

Anyone who visited the zoo in November or December probably saw a preliminary version of the new demonstrations. Although the earlier versions of the shows featured reptiles, the new shows will include birds and mammals as well. The reptile segment features venomous cobras and rattlesnakes handled in front of the audience, along with a very close look at several large constrictors. "Stretch", the 15 foot

python, has already become quite a celebrity.

The birds used in the show will include the familiar cockatoos and parrots, as well as some magnificent birds of prey. A bateleur eagle, native o Africa is awaiting his debut

to Africa, is awaiting his debut. In addition to Indi, our baby white tiger, the zoo has several other large cats for the show, including a cougar and a clouded leopard. Plans to acquire a cheetah are underway, and there is a possibility of obtaining a wolf as well. The show staff, headed by Ron Magill, Assistant Curator, is rapidly acquiring and training animals. In addition to Ron, the staff includes Mike Cotter, a former killer whale trainer; John Atchinson, who many will remember from the original bird shows: and

None of the show animals are on exhibit on the zoo grounds. Rather, they are housed in specially built holding areas behind the amphitheater. Even though the zoo does not currently have space available to exhibit these species, visitors to the zoo will have the opportunity to see them during the shows.

Perhaps one of the most special features of the shows will be the exhibition of hand raised Metrozoo animals during performances. Although it is the zoo's policy to leave newborn animals with their parents whenever

possible, it is sometimes necessary to hand raise an infant. When this happens, the staff will attempt to arrange the feeding schedules so that the animals can be fed at showtimes. These animals will not become permanent members of the show cast, but will be exhibited to allow the public a closer look at some of our younger residents.

at some of our younger residents. These all new Metrozoo amphitheater shows are just one more way we have of making sure that every trip you take to the zoo will be new and exciting. The shows are offered three times a day on weekdays and four times a day on weekends and holidays. Be sure to bring your camera; the photo opportunities will be unique!

The Artist's Touch





TOUCAN TIDBITS

S.S.P. Animal The Orangutan



The orangutan or Asian "man of the forest", is the only species of great ape surviving outside the African continent. These large reddish-brown apes occur only on the islands of Borneo and Sumatra. The two populations have been separate for many thousands of years and are divided into two subspecies, the Bornean and Sumatran races. Both subspecies are severely endangered due to the continuing elimination or alteration of their habitat by the logging industry and agricultural development.

Orangutans in the wild are almost totally arboreal, spending most of their lives high above the ground, in the enormous hardwood trees of the tropical rain-forests. They are the least social of all the great apes, with the average group consisting of one adult female and one or two of her offspring. The adult male is the patriarch of a territorial domain that overlays the ranges of several females. Male orangutans don't become sexually mature until about 12 years of age. By this time they are twice the size of the adult females and possess very large, exaggerated cheek pads.

Metrozoo exhibits and propa-

gates the Sumatran subspecies, *Pongo pygmaeus abelii*, which is slightly smaller and shaggier than the Bornean subspecies. Our orangutan group consists of 6 individuals: a 25 year old male, three adult females, and two juveniles. The youngest member, "Talu", is a two year old female that was the first orangutan born at Metrozoo. We were extremely fortunate to acquire this breeding group from the Wassenaar Zoo in Holland in 1983.

Records of all orangutans held in captivity are maintained in an international orangutan studbook. Presently, there are 282 "orangs" in U.S. zoos. The taking of animals from the wild has lessened due to total protection by law in Indonesia and East Malaysia. Without being able to acquire wild-born orangutans, zoos have become more committed to cooperative self-sustaining captive breeding programs.

While prospects for survival in their natural habitat are declining, the increase in captive born orangutans assures that these highly intelligent animals are not destined to be seen only as museum displays.

Volunteer Training

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Metrozoo-London Keeper Exchange

In the true spirit of cooperation among zoos, Metrozoo and the London Zoo shared a wealth of information and expertise with a recent exchange of elephant keepers. The London Zoo is an older, very traditional zoo, with an emphasis on research. The elephants were exhibited, but zoo philosophy did not include training them. A recent decision to offer the public a display of a Malaysian village complete with working elephants present-ed a new challenge to the London Zoo. Faced with a young and inexperienced elephant department, Curator of Mammals for the London Zoo, Dr. Brian Bertram, asked Metrozoo's visiting Director Robert Yokel and Curator of Mammals Rick Barongi if they could offer any assistance. After numerous telephone conversations, the London Zoo sent one of its elephant keepers, Lee Sambrook, to Miami to work at Metrozoo for three weeks in April under the supervision of our elephant department.

In exchange, Metrozoo sent our head elephant keeper, Bill Doss, to the London Zoo for three weeks in September. Working in conjunction with the London zookeepers, Bill helped to develop their elephant handling and training program.

The London Zoo had acquired two young elephants, a two year old from Sri Lanka and a six year old from Malaysia. Although he is an extremely experienced ele-phant trainer, Bill was faced with a few new challenges. First, the elephants understood only Cevlonese, their native language. Since the exhibit was to be authentic, the commands were to be given in that language rather than English. In addition, the elephants were conditioned to be worked from the right side rather than the left, just the opposite of what Bill was used to. However, these obstacles were easily overcome, and during his brief stay, Bill established an effective training program.

Both the London Zoo and Metrozoo are extremely happy with the results of this exchange. It is hoped that this was only the first of many cooperative efforts between the zoos. Exchange programs between these two zoos are simplified because there is no language barrier. Future visits by elephant keepers are in the planning stages, and there is hope that eventually keepers from other departments will be able to share their expertise. Not only do these programs offer different perspectives in the field of zookeeping, but the keepers share many other cultural and social experiences as well. For Bill Doss, training elephants was not that different in London, but the chance to see the country and share a different lifestyle was an experience he will long remember.

A Very Special Preview

The Education Department is pleased to announce a very special guest lecture by world reknowned primatologist, Birute Galdikas. Dr. Galdikas, regarded by many as the world's foremost authority on orangutans, spends six months of the year conducting research on wild orangutans, and re-introducing hand-reared animals to natural habitat. The remaining six months of the year, she spends teaching at Simon Fraser University in Vancouver. Dr. Galdikas has devoted the last 15 years of her life to the study of orangutans. She has published numerous articles in both the scientific and lay press, and has received national as well as international recognition for her work.

Her lecture at Metrozoo is scheduled with the cooperation of the L.S.B. Leakey Foundation, for Sunday, March 15. The lecture, titled "Asia's Arboreal Red Ape - the Orangutan", is scheduled for 7:00 P.M. Participants will have the opportunity to meet Dr. Galdikas at a reception following her talk.

The fee for this unique program will be \$8-Members/ \$12-Nonmembers for the lecture alone; and \$10-Members/\$15-Nonmembers for the lecture plus reception. The past few months have been busy ones for the Zoological Society. With the new year, we look forward to new challenges and new accomplishments. Groundbreaking for the koala exhibit will take place early in 1987, along with the renovation of the Sulawesi Village. In addition, we are in the process of constructing picnic facilities for visiting school groups, which will make zoo visits more enjoyable and comfortable for students and teachers alike.

The new year will offer addi-tional benefits to our members as well. You will receive discounts to other recreational and cultural facilities in Miami through a reciprocal agreement with the Miami Seaquarium, Vizcaya, the Museum of Science, the Historical Museum, and the Center for the Fine Arts. As a result of negotiations between the Zoological Society Board of Directors and the Dade County Park Department, the Zoological Society will be operating the gift shops on zoo grounds. Society members will receive a 10% discount on purchases amounting to \$10 or more. In addition, all purchases made in the shops will now help to support capital and operational projects at Metrozoo.

In closing, I would like to thank all of you for your support during the past year, and I look forward to realizing, with your help, our goals for 1987.
