
Close Encounters of the Wild Kind!

t's very early in the morning at Metrozoo and two volunteers exit the back door of the Society Membership/
Administration building, carrying a selection of educational materials and a road map. Their first stop is the white van in the parking lot, with the message "Animal Encounters," sponsored by McDonald's printed boldly on the side. The van is further enhanced with a shadow painting of an African savannah, complete with silhouettes of animals that occupy that habitat.

With materials and travel instructions on board, the next stop is the Animal Resource Center (A.R.C., a small building, located behind the scenes). Here, several furred, clawed and feathered passengers, who will be part of the day's presentation, are put on board. With preparations completed, the specially trained volunteers who devote countless hours of time, boundless energy, and enthusiasm to this program, are ready to embark on another educational safari.

The Animal Encounters program, formerly called Outreach, takes small animals and a big message about conserving wildlife to every corner of South Florida. In visits to schools, day care centers, hospitals, nursing homes, churches, synagogues and shopping malls, the Animal Encounters crew makes it possible for everyone to actually touch a tortoise, pet a ferret, talk to a bird, and learn how important snakes are in the balance of nature. From kindergarten children to retirees, everyone comes away with some new knowledge about animals and a greater respect for the diversity of life on planet earth.

Each presentation is geared to the individual audience in order to accommodate different interest and comprehension levels. The pre-school, kindergarten, and first grade crowd enjoys "Animal Wrappings," a presentation which allows them to touch feathers, fur and scales. In second through fourth grade classrooms, "Animal Interelationships" encourages students to explore the ways in which animals and men interelate in their diverse environments. For students in the middle grades, available presentations include "Zoos" and "Conservation."

Some special options are available for adults and older students. "Florida Endangered Species" uses animals and fascinating biofacts, such as turtle shells, a key deer skull, and confiscated products made from endangered animals to dramatically illustrate the peril of many native animals.

In "Calls of the Wild" the audience is treated to the sights and sounds of Metrozoo. Discussion of why animals make the sounds they do and the opportunity to test their listening skills draws the audience into active participation in this program.

These presentations are not lectures. They are designed to involve the audience in a "see me, touch me, hear me" manner. Our volunteers have discovered that small animals are the best teachers and the tactile experience serves to reinforce the conservation messages.



Come to the Fair!

Beneath the sprawling shade trees on the Miami Dade Community College Wolfson campus, the Zoological Society of Florida will, for the first time, help celebrate the International Year of Literacy by participating in Miami Dade's Seventh International Book Fair.

Over 140 authors from a variety of genres will come together on November 11 through November 18 in a spectacular gathering to read from and discuss their latest works as well as previous writings and works in progress.

The Zoological Society exhibit will be located in the paradisiacal land of "Children's Alley" where fair goers will find a potpourri of wonders to please even the youngest book lover.

Three presentations per day will be offered by our Animal Encounters program during the Street Fair to be held November 16, 17, and 18. Children and adults alike will have the opportunity to share in the experience of Avian Adventures, Snakes in the Balance of Nature and Florida's Wild Things, a glimpse of Florida's endangered species. The time and place for each of these presentations will be published in the International Book Fair program which will be available at the Fair.

The Street Fair will offer author presentations, special programs for children, demonstrations by gourmet writers, rare book exhibits, continuous music and great conversation. A once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to have your favorite book inscribed by your favorite author is also available during the Street Fair. Literary personalities like Norman Mailer, Edward Albee, Leo Buscaglia, Alex Haley, Mario Vargas Llosa, Alice Walker, Guillermo Cabrera Infante, Gwendolyn Brooks, Garrison Keiller, and Armando Valladares have participated in past Book Fairs.

Our Society booth will have zoo books, t-shirts, book marks, posters and many of the items now available at our Toucan Trader gift shop. Opportunities for joining the Zoological Society will be explained by our volunteers to those attending the Fair.

Elephants and camel rides will give children and their parents an opportunity to touch and feel animals of the wild. The rides will be available at Children's Alley.

In Children's Alley, kids and adults as well can truly experience a magnificent land of wonder and amazement ... won't you come and join us?

Programs For Children

Breakfast With the Beasts – Asian River Experience





Travelogue 1991: Education Through Fascination



Our 1991 travel schedule offers a variety of destinations designed to introduce you to some of the planet's last pristine habitats. From our lodge at the base of Mt. Kilimanjaro to a stilted camp in the Amazon river basin, each of our tours will allow you to experience the earth's natural jewels – its jungles as well as savannahs, deserts, and underwater treasures.

Each trip is fully escorted by trained naturalists familiar with the flora and fauna of the region. In addition to experiencing nature, each expedition also schedules time in some of the world's great cities, allowing you to take in theaters, museums and organized cultural tours wherever possible.

AUSTRALIA: 16 days, March 9 through March 23, 1991. Back by popular demand, experience Australia's national parks and cities from the Great Barrier Reef to Melbourne. \$3,995 per person out of Miami. Optional extension to *New Zealand:* 8 days, return March 31, \$1,695 per person.

KENYA SAFARI: 12 days of the best game viewing in East Africa. You'll experience the annual migration in the Masai Mara, Samburu Game Reserve, Lake Nakuru and the Mt. Kenya Safari Club. An optional 8 day extension to Amboseli National Park and Tanzania will take you to one of Kenya's most beautiful parks, to the Serengeti during the annual migration and the Ngorongoro Crater, a true Eden. Our safari to Kenya departs July 12 and returns July 23, 1991, the per person price from Miami is \$3,250. Amboseli/Tanzania returns July 31 and is \$1,650 per person. For travelers who want to see another side of East Africa, the extension is also available as a 12-day tour, July 20-31 and the price round-trip from Miami is \$3,550.

AMAZON: Only a four hour flight from Miami but a world away, the Peruvian Amazon still holds treasures waiting to be discovered. Our 7-day exploration will take you on boat and on foot to experience the fragile power of the rain forest. A 6-day extension to Cuzco and Macchu Picchu, the "lost city of the Incas," provides a fascinating contrast high in the Andes. Departing September 28 and returning October 4, the Amazon expedition's price per person is \$1,598. The extension is \$698 and returns October 10.

INDIA: 15 days of tigers and temples! You will view tigers, rhinos, bears, and a myriad of other species in three national parks from a jeep or the back of an elephant. In addition to fine game viewing, we'll visit Old and New Delbi and the Taj Mahal. A 7 day extension to Nepal will take you to Tiger Tops in Chitwan National Park. You will also journey to Pokhara, one of the loveliest spots in the Himalayas, and marvel at the background of snow clad peaks and ice fed lakes and rivers. Become immersed in India's natural and cultural wonders October 11, returning October 25, 1991. Per person price from Miami is \$3,895. The extension to Nepal returns November 1 and is \$2,395 per person.

GALAPAGOS: Separated from the mainland thousands of years ago, the wildlife of the Galapagos adapted to their isolated environment in many unique ways. As you cruise between islands, you will have the chance to swim with sea lions and stroll among giant tortoises, bluefooted boobies, land iguanas, and fascinate to the riches of Darwin's "enchanted islands." Our tour will also take you to Ecuador to experience its natural treasures and culture. 10 days in Ecuador and the Galapagos Islands departs November 17 and returns November 26, 1991. Price per person is \$2,895 out of Miami.

SYDNEY, Umbrella Cockatoo

From the pscittacine family – relative of parrots. Sydney is the only bird in the ARC who likes to be touched (gently, please). She enjoys people and is becoming more vocal as she gets older.



MOE, East African Hedgebog

Moe is one of three in the ARC, but the only adult. Hedgehogs have quills on much of their bodies, but cannot shoot or launch them. DOOGIE, Fennec Fox

From North Africa and Arabia, the original "desert fox." In the wild, fennec foxes dig down in the sand to escape the intense heat of the desert. The large ears also serve as a cooling mechanism.
