s guests of the Fourth Annual

Funds raised from this year's Feast will go toward an endowment fund for the Komodo dragon exhibit. ## President's Message

I am proud to announce that in May of 1991, the Zoological Society of Florida assumed responsibility for the management and operation of PAWS, the children's petting zoo. Transfer of operational authority was mutually approved by the Society and the Dade County Park and Recreation Department in a Memorandum of Agreement. The Society will relieve Metrozoo of \$150,000 per year budgeted for this operation. These funds will be reallocated to improvements for Metrozoo.

In assuming operational responsibility for PAWS, the Society will continue to provide an attractive environment where children and adults can meet and touch a collection of animals. We also plan to offer a wider variety of animals and animal encounters, and establish programs and exhibits that will prove fun and educational for visitors to PAWS. At PAWS, children and their parents come face to face with small animals. It is often an experience that kindles a lifelong appreciation for wildlife and the wonders of nature.

PAWS, the children's petting zoo, was opened in 1989. Our Board of Directors elected to build PAWS after Sulawesi, the zoo's original children's contact area, was closed for major repairs and renovation. The development budget included \$850,000 for construction provided by the Society and \$100,000 for landscaping provided by the Dade County Park and Recreation Department. Major sponsors of the area include Texaco, Latin America/West Africa; The Knight Foundation; Luria's; Sportservice; Miami Marriott at Dadeland; Dade County Park & Recreation Department; the Grad Family; and the Schull Family.

A children's contact area is one of the most important facets of the zoo visit. Positive childhood encounters with animals increase sensitivity and create an interest that can last a lifetime. Preservation of wildlife increasingly depends on informed public opinion and active popular support. The Society believes that the best way to understand animals is to meet them in a way that is fun, exciting and educational.

The Society plans to refurbish the PAWS facility and add new programs. An important initial goal will be to continue the strong management system and ensure that the appearance of the facility and the quality and variety of its exhibits continually meet the Society's standards of excellence.

This is a very exciting moment in the history of the Zoological Society of Florida. Society and zoo staff will work in close harmony to assure that the transition to Society management will be achieved smoothly. Revenue for PAWS operation will come principally from the Society's membership revenue, with the hope that we can secure additional corporate and individual sponsorships. I want to thank all of you for your past commitment, and hope that you will continue to support one of the most precious resources in South Florida.

## No Peanuts For the Gorillas?

- 1. Where is Jimmy?
- 2. How is Josephine?
- 3. Is that big gorilla really J.J.?
- 4. Little Moja is getting so big, how old is he now?

There are questions we hear frequently from the many, many members who are regular "gorilla watchers." In recent months we have also heard a number of questions on the subject of gorilla feeding, particularly

- 5. Why doesn't the keeper come out on the walkway and feed the gorillas peanuts any more?
  - The answers to these questions are:
- Jimmy is still here and is on the paddock several times each week; the schedule varies.
- 2. Josephine is fine.
- 3. Yes, that big gorilla is J.J. He now outweighs Jimmy and it is more and more difficult to tell them apart.
- 4. Moja is indeed getting bigger and has just passed his seventh birthday.
- 5. The keepers are not throwing peanuts to the gorillas these days because they (the gorillas) are on a diet.

That does not mean the animals are overweight, nor does it mean they are

going hungry. The diet is part of a scientific nutritional study on cholesterol. Great apes, particularly gorillas, are prone to high cholesterol levels and we all know by now that too much cholesterol in the blood stream can be dangerous.

The Los Angeles Zoo, and other institutions, have been studying the problem of cholesterol levels in gorillas and they have discovered that (are you ready for this?) a diet high in fiber and low in certain fats helps to reduce cholesterol levels in gorillas (sounds like something out of a TV cereal ad). Even more important, L. A. found that lowered cholesterol levels in gorillas made the animals more reproductive. Both lowland and moun-



tain gorillas are now so endangered in the wild that captive breeding programs are essential if gorillas are to survive, and anything that increases reproduction is worth investigating.



The National Institutes of Health (NIH), which owns the gorillas on exhibit at Metrozoo, decided to do a diet study here to learn more about diet and cholesterol in gorillas. Since last October, the Metrozoo gorillas have been eating a diet that includes a careful combination of fruit and vegetables and a special primate chow (also known as monkey biscuits) which is milled by Techlab under a contract with NIH.

According to Dr. Chris Miller, Metrozoo veterinarian, the initial test results showed little reduction in cholesterol levels and the diet was changed slightly in December. Part of the change was to substitute raisins for sunflower seeds and part was to switch to a different formula for the primate chow which is "cholesterol free." In coming weeks, the gorillas will have their blood tested again to measure the change, if any, in cholesterol levels. The results of those tests will determine the future course of the diet study. It is important to note that none of the gorillas lost any weight during the diet study.

Another important point to keep in mind is that all of the animals at Metrozoo – at any zoo – are always on special diets. each animal is fed a diet which meets its specific nutritional needs. When zoo visitors toss food (or other objects) on to the animal paddocks, a lot of careful work by the vet, curators, and keepers can be undone. Hot dogs, ice cream, and other goodies from the concession stands can cause a great deal of harm to animals. Such things may also cause the animal not to eat the diet it needs to stay healthy. Of equal concern are non-food items such as pennies, thrown on to the paddocks. Every year zoo animals die as a result of ingesting items thrown or dropped into their

The next time you visit the zoo, enjoy the goodies the concession stands offer, but please don't share them with the animals. We also hope your visit will include a stop at the gorilla paddock, home of Metrozoo's gentle giants.
