#### Trainer of Exotic Animals, Wife, Mother and Our Friend 17 October, 1959 – 2 July, 2001

ow do you say goodbye to someone who has been such an important part of our personal and professional lives? The staff of Toni Brough, Inc. is like a family. We never thought we would lose the person who brought us together.

As our boss, Toni made us feel important and let us know she appreciated the work we did. She always made sure that we were happy with our jobs, and she went out of her way to give us a pleasant working environment.

Toni allowed us to think outside the box and make mistakes without placing the animals or ourselves at risk. She knew this was a great way for us to learn

"Toni had a zest for life that extended from her professional life, into her friendships. She liked to dance and she liked to present her animals in a professional manner. The way she cared for her friends and her animals will be deeply missed by everyone," said Rachél Watkins Rogers, close friend and Zoo Registrar.

Toni Brough was a graduate of Moore Park College, and held a degree in exotic animal training and management. Shortly after graduation, Toni joined Miami Metrozoo and worked for Ray Burwick along with other well-known animal trainers such as Steve Martin. Eventually Toni branched out on her own and created Toni's Traveling Zoo. She traveled with a variety of animals such as parrots, reptiles, primates and other small mammals to birthday parties, barmitzvahs and corporate conventions.

In 1989, with increasing success and a growing reputation as an animal trainer, she expanded her business to Toni Brough, Inc. That same year, Metrozoo contracted her company to produce a wildlife show at the Zoo. As producer of the wildlife show, Toni devised unique ways to display the animal collection. She had the animals perform their natural behaviors in such a way that the show was both entertaining and educational for the audience.

Toni had an endless source of energy. No matter how hot it was after a show, if a guest wanted to see a snake or hear the parrot sing one more time, Toni would grant the wish—even if the animal had already been returned to its enclosure. It was evident to all who worked for her that Toni had a way with animals. She was the only one able to work with the king vulture without getting bitten or being bruised from head to toe, unlike the rest of us!

Toni had a great sense of humor and knew how to make us laugh. She always interacted with the Zoo guests and her staff with a bright smile on her face! Toni was a warm, affectionate and compassionate person. Not only was Toni our boss, she was our mentor and our friend. We miss you, Toni.

Toni's husband, William Carey Martin, will continue Toni Brough, Inc., and Letty Jurado will continue to be the manager of the Metrozoo Wildlife Show.

# METROZOO'S STATELY FLAMINGOS

The first animals to greet our visitors are the beautiful ducks, swans and flamingos in the Zoo's Flamingo Lake. One of the most poetic sights at the Zoo is to watch the entire flock gracefully glide back and forth in unison in the lake. All

the exhibit lacks is strains of Tchaikovsky's "Swan Lake" to complete the fascinating water ballet.

Flamingos have very ancient origins. Fossils of flamingos living over 55 million years ago have been found around the world and in places no longer inhabited by flamingos today. Interestingly, flamingo fossils and modern flamingos are very similar to one another. It has been suggested that the harsh environments where flamingos are found has contributed to this similarity.

Flamingos typically are found on water bodies that are either too caustic or too salty for most other organisms

and are often located in harsh desert areas. In many flamingo habitats only tiny crustaceans, algae, and bacteria can survive alongside the flamingos. The absence of other animals to compete with the flamingos for food and resources has allowed flamingos to remain relatively unchanged for the millions of years that they have inhabited the earth.

There are five species of flamingo living today and at Metrozoo you can see perhaps the most well known species, the Greater Flamingo (*Pheonicopterus ruber*). Greater Flamingos are found in Africa, Southern Europe, parts of the Middle East and Central Asia, the Caribbean, and Galápagos Islands. Our flock consists of birds from the Caribbean race of Greater Flamingos that are known scientifically as *Pheonicopterus ruber ruber*. The species designation, *ruber*, means red and refers to the bright pink coloration found in some populations of Greater Flamingos.

The Caribbean Greater Flamingos are well-known for their bright pink plumage, but many people do not realize that the bright colors are the result of eating tiny crustaceans. The crustaceans contain chemicals that the flamingos need to make the bright pink pigment. The flamingos must constantly replace the chemicals or else their plumage will fade, sometimes becoming white. In fact, when a flamingo loses a feather, that feather will lose its pink color. In zoos, flamingos cannot feed on the same crustaceans as they do in the wild so we add the pigment producing chemicals to their Zoo diet and the results are the same, pink flamingos.

While observing the Zoo's flamingos, you will notice the oddly shaped bill that these birds use for feeding. Flamingo bills are curved abruptly downward and contain a large fleshy tongue. Around the inside edge of the bill are specialized plates that have long hairs attached to them. These plates can be raised or flattened inside the bill. When feeding, the flamingo will open its bill slightly and flatten the plates. The bird then will pull its tongue back to draw water into its mouth. The bird then raises the hairy plates and pushes the water back out of its mouth using the tongue. Any crustaceans or other microorganisms become trapped in the hairs and are guided down into the flamingo's throat. All of these steps occur very quickly and continuously while feeding, such that the tongue acts much like a piston and pumps water in and out to trap enough food for the flamingo to survive.

Flamingos nest in large colonies and individual pairs will build a cone-like nest out of mud and place their single egg on top. When the chick hatches, it is fed by its parents and later will live in a large nursery group with the other chicks

from that nesting season. The large flocks of flamingos that amass for breeding and nesting are a spectacular sight and birdwatchers and tourists thrill at such flocks.

Unfortunately, the attention that flamingo flocks receive from ecotourism is not always good. The practice of flying small planes over the flamingo flocks so that people can view



the birds from above has resulted in many nesting areas being abandoned. The lakes necessary for successful flamingo nesting are very few. While they do not need to be salty or caustic to be successful nesting sites, the lakes must be free of fish that compete for food with flamingos. Protection of the fish-free caustic and salt lakes from low-flying aircraft has resulted in flamingos returning to some nesting areas and remaining safe in others.

# EXPERIENCE THE SENSATIONS OF TROPICAL AMERICA

r. Wilde's World is a hands-on adventure

that will stimulate your senses and inspire your mind. This new exhibit on the wonders and biodiversity of Tropical America focuses on learning through interaction. In Dr. Wilde's World you will find buttons to push, puzzles to solve, games to play, and questions to ponder. The exhibit itself is a quest for exploration. You must open the drawers to find the puzzles, slide the panels to discover the clues, or use the binoculars to reveal the hidden life of the rainforest.

Dare to touch the mystery artifact in the touch box. Can you guess what it is? Or would you prefer to smell the pleasant aroma of the coconut orchid flower? Push the button. Did that sound like a frog? No, that was the sound of a toucan high up on a tree branch. These are all part of the "matching game" at Dr. Wilde's World where you can touch, look, listen, and smell the clues to investigate tropical plants and animals.

The toddler exploration room is a fun-filled spot for children to sit and experience the stories in the pop-up nature books, or create their own tales with animal hand puppets and life-like reptile toys. There are even books and magazines for older children and adults to peruse.

Learn about biodiversity close-up by examining the items in the magnifying boxes. Compare the different eggs, measure the animal teeth, or weigh the seed pods. Discover a world of microscopic creatures and observe the scales of a butterfly wing or the cells of a plant stem. Special microscopes with extra-large lenses make viewing easy.

There is a whole world of information waiting to be discovered inside the drawers in Dr. Wilde's World. Inside the drawers you will push the buttons to learn how similar yet different animals can be, turn the wheel to discover the unlikely rainforest dwellers that live in

the water, or slide the panels to find which animals and plants are active during the day and night. Solve the puzzles in other drawers to study the intricate relationships between the indigenous people and the rainforest. Listen to

the different languages, try to find the camouflaged animals, or feel the different plant textures. There is something special waiting to be revealed in every drawer.

Throughout the exhibit there are items to examine on the walls and counters. Feel the ridges of a giant armadillo shell, compare the rings of the tree cross-sections, or touch the intricate patterns of a delicately handcrafted mola. You can even look inside a Galápagos tortoise shell and observe how the backbone is connected to the shell.

Relax for a while in the George Batchelor Theater where you will experience the sights and sounds of the rainforest. Listen carefully for the songs of the different birds, and the call of the howler monkey. Observe the grace of the jaguar, and the power of the harpy eagle. The beauty and diversity will astound you.

Can you identify the familiar scents from the rainforest? You may find that you use many products that originated in Tropical America. Consider this as you study the striking images of the forest and the progression of deforestation. Learn what you can do to help. You may be amazed at the simple actions that can have an important impact on conservation. There is even an opportunity to contribute to a variety of organizations if you desire.

Before you exit, be sure to visit Dr. Wilde's Gift Spot where you will find many items from Tropical America including hand-woven baskets, tagua nut carvings, molas, and jewelry. There are also many educational toys and books available to continue your adventure at home!

If it were not for Metrozoo and the Zoological Society of Florida, your children and grandchildren might never have the privilege of seeing a black rhino or an African elephant.



# THE WINGS OF ASIA: Lite Construction Begins!

This is the third in an on-going series of articles to keep you informed of the creation and development of the American Bankers Family Aviary: The Wings of Asia.



ulldozers moved into the old aviary site on Friday, August 31st, and the undergrowth began to give way. Throughout August, the Zoo maintenance and horticulture crew diligently removed a number of trees; transplanting them to a behind-thescenes holding area to either be incorporated into the landscaping for the new aviary, or to be replanted throughout the Zoo.

Not all the trees were trashed. Keepers cut branches from trees and shrubs (that were not destined to be replanted) to use as browse for the animals under their care. The orangutans are especially fond of palm fronds and elephants enjoy browsing on entire trees. Our colobus monkeys thoroughly enjoy the ficus tree that was transplanted onto their exhibit and that offers shade, new branches from which to leap to and fro, and delicious new leaves to eat! The Malayan sun bears benefit from the shade of the orchid tree that was transplanted onto their paddock. Browse from trees and shrubs not transplanted has doubled as a form of animal enrichment activity.

Only one single tree has been left standing and the new Aviary will be built around it. The silk-floss tree (Chorisia speciosa), native to Brazil and Argentina, is the most prominent tree remaining after Hurricane Andrew; thus the wish to preserve the tree and incorporate it into the rebuilt aviary. It will grow to a height of 45 feet and produces very showy pink flowers during the fall and winter. Everything from the old aviary has been leveled, except for the monorail and the silk-floss tree. With all of the vegetation gone, you will be able to get an idea of the scope of the new aviary, which will encompass approximately 2.6 acres.

# The Intergenerational Program is a Big Score for Students

This past school year the Intergenerational Program provided a curriculum for Robert Morgan Vocational School and South Miami Middle School. For 132 high school and middle school participants, this included three field trips to the Zoo and two outreach sessions for each school. Our main objective was to teach conservation through adult volunteer mentorship. This special program has increased student awareness of the role of a modern-day zoo and the impor-


tance of global and local conservation. At the end of the school year, the students applied what they had learned by performing local service projects. Robert Morgan Vocational students identified and labeled many of the local pine rockland plants on their school grounds, while students of South Miami Middle School planted bushes and shrubs that support local butterfly populations at their school.

This was a wonderful example of hands-on learning! Being physically close enough to hear a cheetah exhale, hand-feeding whole carrots to an Indian rhino, and gently feeling the individual scutes on the carapace of a Galápagos tortoise were memories that will last forever! As the level of caring increases through this special exposure, these students may choose to make conservation a lifelong effort.

Equally important, cognitive learning was addressed in classroom presentations with biofacts, zookeeper talks, behind-thescenes visits, a specially narrated tram tour, amphitheater show and a pine rockland activity on Zoo grounds. Students used journals to record notes and thoughts, and to sketch animals.

Participating Zoo docents included Vicki Brown, Colin Browning, Mary Rose, Gene Greenspan, and Carol Green. These docents were involved in every aspect of the program; they planned Zoo visit and outreach activities, taught classroom programs, narrated tours, and gave walking tours.

Gene had a special focus on sixth and seventh grade, and said of his experience, "I really enjoyed working with the students of

Mary had her own experiential education, "I didn't think mixing senior citizens with students varying in age and aptitude would be productive until we set out to explore the Zoo

together. We soon found that we all cared deeply about the conservation of endangered plants and animals. Age and cultural backgrounds quickly became unimportant as we explored the natural world together. If these students are representative of the younger generation, I am encouraged about the future of conservation and look forward to meeting more students in the coming year."

Carol was also impressed, "The Intergenerational Program at the Zoo was a wonderful chance to interact with preteens and teenagers on an individual basis. It was an experience that allowed us to promote conservation and the importance of maintaining diverse ecosystems in a relaxed atmosphere. I personally was impressed with the interest and input of all the young people with whom we dealt. Hopefully the children benefited from both the lessons and the interaction with their teachers and mentors."

ZSF Education staff assisted in the planning and teaching. "The Intergenerational Program offers Miami-Dade Public School students a great opportunity to learn about conservation. The students have a great time at the Zoo, while interacting with experienced and motivated Metrozoo docents," commented Maria Sarno, Education Specialist. "I (Lily Forni) love the pine rockland, and my favorite component was working with the students in the fun but detailed detective work of finding twelve specific native plants in the pineland at the Zoo."
