

New Exhibit EMPEROR TAMARINS

By Steve Conners, Metrozoo General Curator

Two diminutive emperor tamarins (*Sanguinus imperator*) are at home in the large display window visible from the front entrance to the ZSF building. Tamarins are almost exclusively South American with primary and secondary tropical forest canopies being their favored habitats.

Tamarins can be distinguished from other monkeys by their silky fur that is often brightly colored and grows in long adornments on the heads of several species. The incredible mustache of the emperor tamarin is an extreme example. They don't have opposable thumbs and all their nails have evolved into claws (except on the big toe) to enhance their climbing abilities. Photo: Dolora Batchelor

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




The Secretive



Based on some small strips of hide sent from the then Belgian Congo to the Zoological Society of London, the first description of an okapi was published in 1900. Initially scientists believed it to be some type of zebra because of the bold stripes on the skin fragment.

The following year, an entire skin and skull arrived in London, and it was obvious this was a relative of the giraffe. It was unique enough, however, to be placed in its own genus, *Okapia*. It's specific name, *johnstoni*, is a tribute to Sir Harry Johnston, the man who obtained the skin and bones from which the animal was described. The first live okapi arrived in Europe in 1918 and in North America at the NY Bronx Zoo in 1937. It is interesting to note that five large mammals have been discovered since the okapi--one of these as recently as 1990.

The overall color of the okapi is a rich, dark maroon-brown. The fur is short and fine, looking like velvet. The lower portions of the legs are nearly pure white. The dark body color merges with the white via a series of distinct horizontal stripes on the rump and upper parts of all four legs. The giraffe-like head with its

Meet Ramses

Ramses, a reticulated giraffe, was born on March 15th, weighing in at a mere 161 pounds and standing 6 feet tall! Ramses is the 32nd giraffe to be born at the Zoo, including several born at the old Crandon Park Zoo on Key Biscayne prior to 1980. His mother, Kita, was born at Metrozoo in February 1984. After 15 months of pregnancy, the laboring mother rarely, if ever, lies down while giving birth! The baby falls about 4-6 feet to the ground where it meets the world with quite a bang.

The giraffe is the tallest living terrestrial animal, averaging a height of 16-18 feet and weighing about 1,400-2,000 pounds. It is active early morning and evening and rests during the heat of the day. Giraffes usually sleep standing, but will occasionally lie down, resting their heads on the lower part of one hind leg. The giraffe depends on eyesight and may have color vision.

large ears and eyes stares calmly down at you from a height of about seven feet. A 14-inch tongue is used for grasping otherwise out-of-reach leaves, and also comes in handy for ear and eye cleaning! The okapi's most important senses are smell and hearing.

Okapi feed on the freshly growing tips of trees and shrubs at the edges of rainforest clearings. Mainly solitary animals and never found in herds, females tend to maintain separate territories of one to two square miles in size while the males apparently do not, and range over large areas.

There are believed to be about 30,000 okapi living in the forests of central Africa and less than 60 in captivity in the United States. The Ituri forest in the Democratic Republic of the Congo has the highest concentration of the species. They are not considered endangered yet, but poaching, mining and logging are all occurring in this unique forest. Metrozoo's two females, 3-year-old Kiara and 2-year-old Karma, will be paired with suitable males sometime in the future. Our Okapi came from the San Diego and Oklahoma City zoos.

GIRAFFES AND OKAPI Celebrating their similarities and differences


The beautiful okapi is now on exhibit across from its giraffe cousins. Notice the similarities in their ambling walks, straddling or bending their forelegs to reach the ground with their mouths, elongated, pointed faces, small skin and hair-covered horns, large soulful eyes with sweeping lashes, and long tongues. Both are built with their front quarters taller than their hindquarters. The okapi is unsociable, whereas the giraffe is gregarious.






