



Cheetah cubs stay with their mothers on average for 13-20 months before going out on their own. Next to the lion, they are the most sociable of the cats.



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
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### Dear Friends,

If you haven't already seen the fabulous art exhibit, *The World of Guy Harvey* and *Art and the Animal,* you must do so quickly, as the exhibit in Dr. Wilde's World ends on Sunday, September

14. The original paintings, limited editions and sculptures are wonderful representations of some of the world's most beautiful wildlife, and many are for sale. The "Create" corner in the exhibit provides our visitors with an opportunity to be artists themselves. On the fun side of the exhibit is a 500-gallon saltwater fish aquarium provided by Exotic Aquariums and four original paintings by the Zoo's very own African elephant and orangutan!

Then be sure to come back on October 5th for the opening of yet another spectacular exhibit in Dr. Wilde's World, *Masters of the Night: The True Story of Bats*. Explore the mysteries and myths of bats. This new exhibit requires five 40-foot-long tractor-trailers to transport the components and requires a week to install.

Why do cockroaches from Madagascar hiss? Why is the glass lizard not a snake when it doesn't have legs and feet and looks like a snake? Where is the poison in the poison dart frogs? These and many other questions you have will be answered when you visit ToadStool. This hands-on, interactive indoor, air-

conditioned exhibit enables you to touch and, in some cases, hold some very curious animals.

New to the Children's Zoo is Noel, a Linne's two-toed sloth we recently acquired from the Caldwell Zoo in Tyler, Texas. Noel was born on December 26, 1999 and was hand-raised. The volunteers will be handling Noel so you can get a close-up look at this slow-moving yet captivating animal.

Over the next several months we will be adding new birds to the American Bankers Family Aviary, *Wings of Asia*, so be sure to visit the aviary often. The birds are settling in very well, and it's a joy to watch them fly throughout the aviary, and more so when they perch close by and sing for their visitors!

We're having a lot of fun bringing you unique exhibits to give you more reasons to keep returning to your Miami Metrozoo. Be sure and bring a friend the next time you visit!



# Call of Africa's Native Visions Gallery sponsors fundraiser for Metrozoo By Metrozoo's Goodwill Ambassador, Ron Magill

Although Metrozoo is committed to providing a wonderful and educational experience for its visitors by providing an outstanding venue to observe and appreciate wildlife, it is also committed to protecting that wildlife in the habitat where it naturally occurs.

Recently ZSF Board Member Harvey Weinstien brought representatives from the Lewa Wildlife Conservancy to Metrozoo. The Lewa Wildlife Conservancy is world renown for its ongoing, precedent-setting efforts to preserve and expand the wealth of wildlife and culture in Northern Kenya. I can say without hesitation that the dedicated representatives from the Conservancy well serve as a role model for conservation efforts worldwide as I have been there several times myself and have had the opportunity to work side by side with some of the staff. Their visit to Metrozoo was an effort to secure additional funding for ongoing projects in Kenya.

To raise the funds, I contacted Patrick Pullin of the Call of Africa's Native Visions Gallery. Patrick and his partner Ross Parker immediately volunteered to have a fundraiser at their world-class art gallery to benefit the Zoo's efforts to help Lewa. The event was an art preview featuring critically acclaimed African wildlife artist Kim Donaldson. Mr. Donaldson's work is world renown and provides unforgettable windows into the African wild.

As part of the event, Mr. Donaldson agreed to paint a portrait of King George, Metrozoo's stunning King Cheetah, and the painting was auctioned off to benefit the Zoo. The evening was a tremendous success with nearly \$10,000 raised for the Lewa

Conservancy. This money will be used by Lewa to provide small business loans to women in the wildlife conservancy areas of Northern Kenya to help them live with wildlife and help them better appreciate it.

In addition to the fundraiser, Call of Africa's Native Visions Gallery has donated several valuable pieces to Metrozoo to be featured at future events as fundraising items. Patrick and Ross are good friends of Metrozoo and wildlife, and we extend to them our sincere appreciation.

# Some can't hear the roar of a lion or tiger. Some can't see the beauty of an Emerald Tree Boa...

...But for a group of 84 physically, mentally and emotionally challenged children at Miami's Citrus Grove Occupational Training Center, Miami Metrozoo came to life in May during four memorable outreach educational encounters made possible by a grant from the Dade Community Foundation.

Special Touches for Exceptional Children is a unique, hands-on outreach educational program that was conceived of and designed completely by Zoological Society of Florida volunteers and Nora Robbins, ZSF Manager of Volunteer Services, to meet the special needs of multiple-handicapped students attending the Miami-Dade County Public Schools Occupational Training Centers (OTC) for middle schools. The Special Touches curriculum was developed to follow the guidelines for special programs for autistic children in public schools, created by Dr. Arlene Lowenstein, Ph.D. for and with the help of Miami-Dade County Public Schools. Dr. Lowenstein emphasized the need for a structured environment that provides a feeling of security and safety for the children.

Students attending these special education centers are encumbered with special needs reflecting the full range of acute and chronic illnesses, learning disabilities, and physical, cognitive and emotional deficits. Unfortunately, these special children are unable to accompany other schoolchildren on field trips, and children with severe autism have behaviors that often prevent them from participating in school programs brought to their own schools.


Special Touches took some of the Zoo's smallest and cutest animals to the exceptional children's center and provided a level of enrichment they rarely experience. The children were offered a hands-on encounter with a ferret, hedgehog, box turtle, ball python and bearded dragon – animals that served as living illustrations of the two components of the program – mammals and reptiles. An impressive collection of animal artifacts helped to reinforce the underlying animal appreciation and conservation message.

**S**porting tiger and alligator costumes, the ZSF cast put on skits that not only brought smiles to the children's faces, but brought those that physically could to their feet in song and laughter through rap songs. Some even found the courage to touch the live animals.

"... All of our students participated, and we all appreciated the Mammals and Reptiles materials. We cut, painted, colored, and consumed our way through everything, and all the students loved the presentations. Your [ZSF] hard work to make this a hands-on experience worked beautifully, as did the thought and presentation of all of the materials. Our students truly understood what you were trying to get across, and the follow-up activities allowed for the experience to go on into their own hands. You did it all – visual (which is our students' strength!) and all the other modalities as well..." – Vicki Pollard, MSW; ESE Teacher, Profound; Secondary Autism Programs/Citrus Grove OTC.

**D**onna Whelan, ESE teacher at Citrus Grove OTC said, "One of our students, who had been afraid of a stray dog which wandered by the classroom, was confident enough to touch the animals, including the snake, because the presenters instilled confidence through their teaching."

After completing the program, students were given a "post-visit test". The majority of the children were able to identify some of the mammal and reptile characteristics they had learned. One of the students picked up the test and completed it entirely on her own - her answers were 100% correct!



The De Wildt Cheetah and Wildlife Center (birthplace of Metrozoo's two cheetahs, Savannah and King George), is considered an icon for cheetah captive management and breeding.

Over the years, more than 600 cheetahs have been born there making it the premier breeding facility in the world.

In an effort to reduce the killing of cheetahs by farmers, De Wildt's founder and director, Ms. Ann Van Dyk, spearheaded the development of the precedent-setting De Wildt Wild Cheetah Project. The goal of this project is to develop relationships with farmers and convince them to allow the trapping of problem cheetahs so that they can be relocated to protected areas. In the process, farmers are educated about cheetahs and made to realize that more common predators such as leopards, hyenas, and caracals in fact make many kills that they associate with cheetahs.

Although the challenges are many, the project is experiencing significant success with several cheetahs already successfully trapped and relocated. Some cheetahs in the program are implanted with radio transponders and are monitored carefully from the ground, and in the air using a special microlight aircraft, to learn as much as possible about their range and behavior.

Through the efforts of Metrozoo's Cheetah
Ambassador Program, significant fundraising efforts
by school children from Gulliver Academy Lower
School and George Washington Carver Middle
School, and the support of an anonymous donor,
Metrozoo has provided over \$40,000 in direct aid
to the De Wildt Cheetah and Wildlife Center and
the De Wildt Wild Cheetah Project. It is part of our
commitment to protect these remarkable and
beautiful animals in the wild areas from which they
originate for generations to come.

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

# Certify your backyard habitat

The National Wildlife Federation's Backyard Wildlife Habitat program is celebrating its 30th anniversary this year. This program is designed to help people restore a wildlife habitat in their yards, gardens, and throughout the community by providing food, water, cover, places to raise young, restoring native plants, and using chemical-free gardening practices.

The National Wildlife Federation (NWF) recognizes these wildlife oases by certifying them as Backyard Wildlife Habitat sites. Once certified, participants get a certificate with a unique habitat number, a subscription to the NWF newsletter filled with wildlife tips and projects, and are added to NWF's national registry of habitats. Participants are also eligible to post a Backyard Wildlife Habitat sign outside in their habitats.

NWF is able to provide public facilities or educators with free copies of its information booklet and an application for certification for distribution.

You can certify your habitat in two ways: online and by mail.

Evaluate your choices. Be as prudent when offering your volunteer time and money as you would with any other investment. Take time to investigate and compare the relative value of the charities







### THE RETURN OF THE UNICORNS

The Recovery Of The Greater One-Horned Rhinoceros Speaker: Dr. Eric Dinerstein, WWF Chief Scientist October 28, 6:30 P.M.

Since 1984, Eric Dinerstein has led the team directly responsible for the recovery of the greater one-horned rhinoceros in the Royal Chitwan National Park in Nepal, where the population had once declined to as few as 100 rhinos. in Asia for twenty-six years. He is the co-author of the Global 200 Ecoregions, an effort to establish global priorities for biodiversity conservation.

This lecture is the result of a groundbreaking partnership established between Miami Metrozoo/ Zoological Society of Florida and World Wildlife Fund in 2003. The partnership was a first-of-its-kind alliance between a major zoological park and World Wildlife Fund created to unify conservation efforts on behalf of the world's wildlife.


