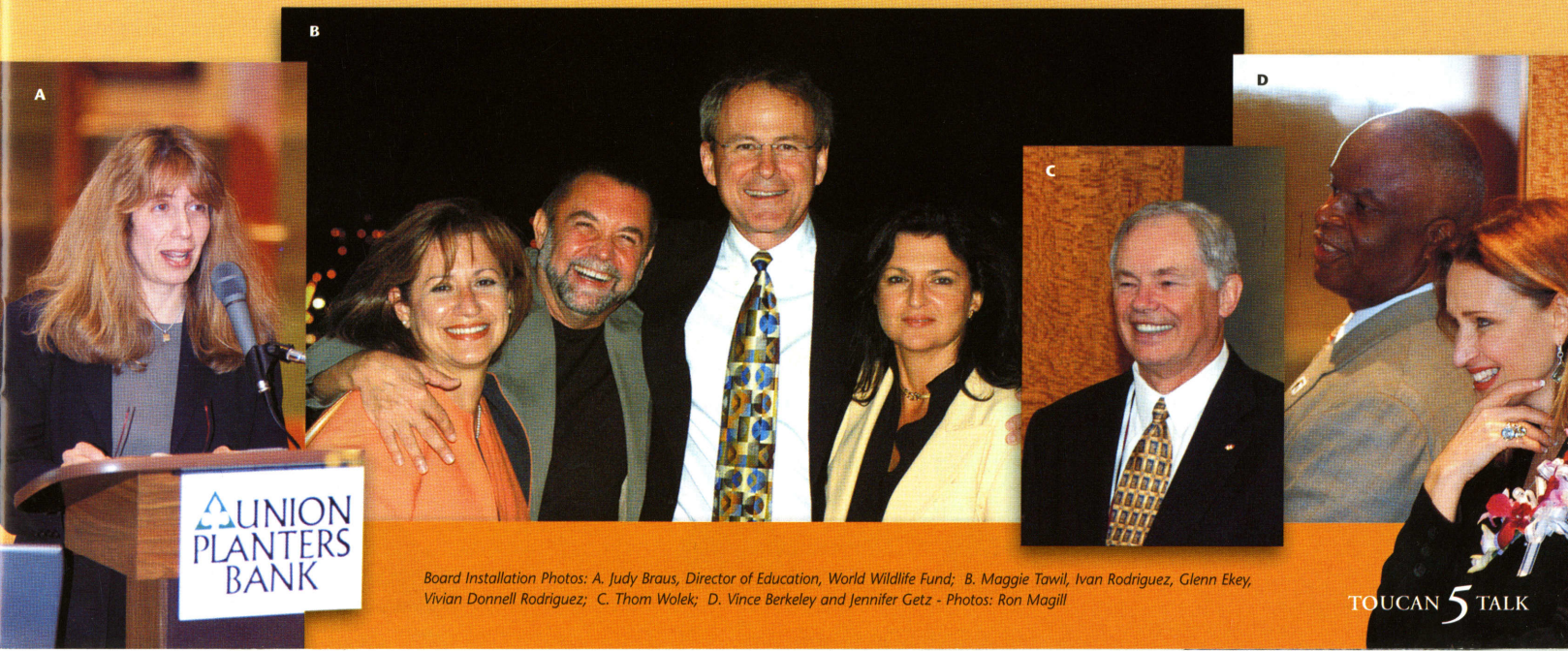
G. Glenn Huber

Miami Metrozoo designated a Major Cultural Institution.

Not all museums are indoors! There's one in Miami where the collection snarls, growls, roars, leaps, flaps, flies, hops, climbs and dives. Miami Metrozoo is a living museum and is the only American Zoo and Aquarium Association (AZA) accredited zoo in Florida's three southernmost counties.

In September 2003, Miami Metrozoo was designated a Major Cultural Institution by the Miami-Dade County Department of Cultural Affairs. The designation as a Major Cultural Institution was based on the Zoo providing full and regular seasons of cultural programs open to the general public; the impact of its programming of county-wide, regional and national significance; its highly-rated educational programs; and active cultural offerings which advance the Zoo's mission of encouraging an appreciation for the world's wildlife and helping to conserve it for future generations. The four hands-on, interactive galleries at Miami Metrozoo not only entertain, but also provide educational insights on many aspects of the world's wildlife, history, culture, and science.

"We are extremely honored and proud to be designated a Major Cultural Institution," said ZSF President and CEO, Glenn Ekey.

"Our organization plays a vital role in the cultural life of our community's citizens through our world-class exhibits and programmatic offerings. This designation further validates our claim that we are a 'living museum' for all of South Florida and the world."

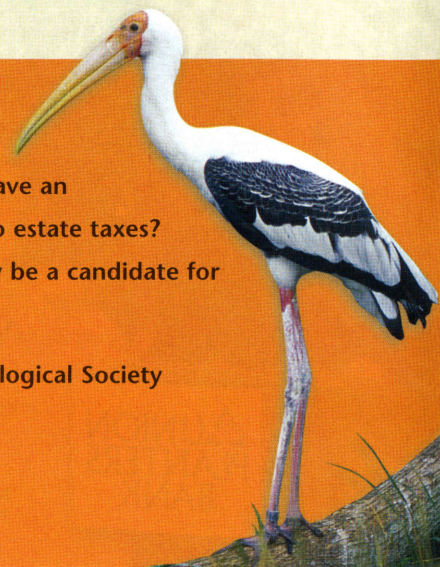
"I am excited about the new possibilities as well as the responsibilities that come with this designation," added Eric Stephens, Metrozoo Director.

The rhino horn is made up of modified hair and keratin, which grows from the nose, and is matted to form a continuously growing horn. If broken off, the horn will grow back.



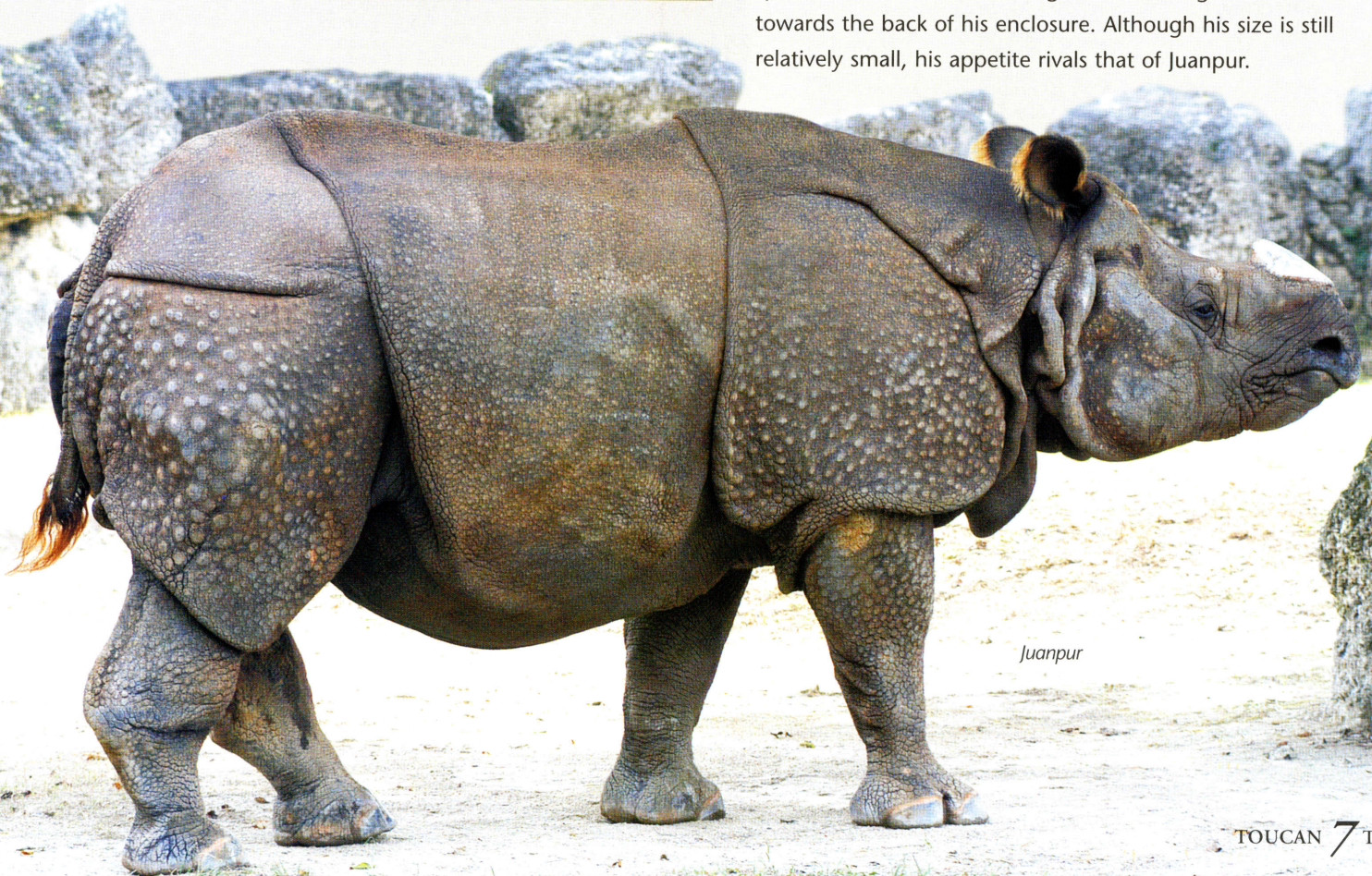

Metrozoo's New Indian Rhinos

"Juanpur" affectionately called Johnny by his keepers, was born on January 27, 1990 at the San Diego Wild Animal Park, which has a very successful rhino-breeding program. Currently on loan from the Baton Rouge Zoo, Johnny arrived at Miami Metrozoo on October 1, 2003. He has fully adjusted to his new surroundings and so far is a very active rhino, choosing to spend most of his time roaming his exhibit perimeter. His large size can be very intimidating, but his keepers have reported that he is very easy to work with and is well behaved.

"Suru" named after the famed Suru Valley of India, was born on December 31, 2000 at the San Diego Wild Animal Park and came to Miami Metrozoo on October 19, 2003. He is still adjusting to his surroundings, which for now includes his barn stall and the Indian Rhino breeding paddock (which is located off exhibit). Strangers can easily spook Suru (as I found out first hand during an early morning visit). However, he has quickly learned to recognize who his keepers are and seems to have started a bonding process with each of them. Suru seems to spend most of his time resting under the large shade trees towards the back of his enclosure. Although his size is still relatively small, his appetite rivals that of Juanpur.

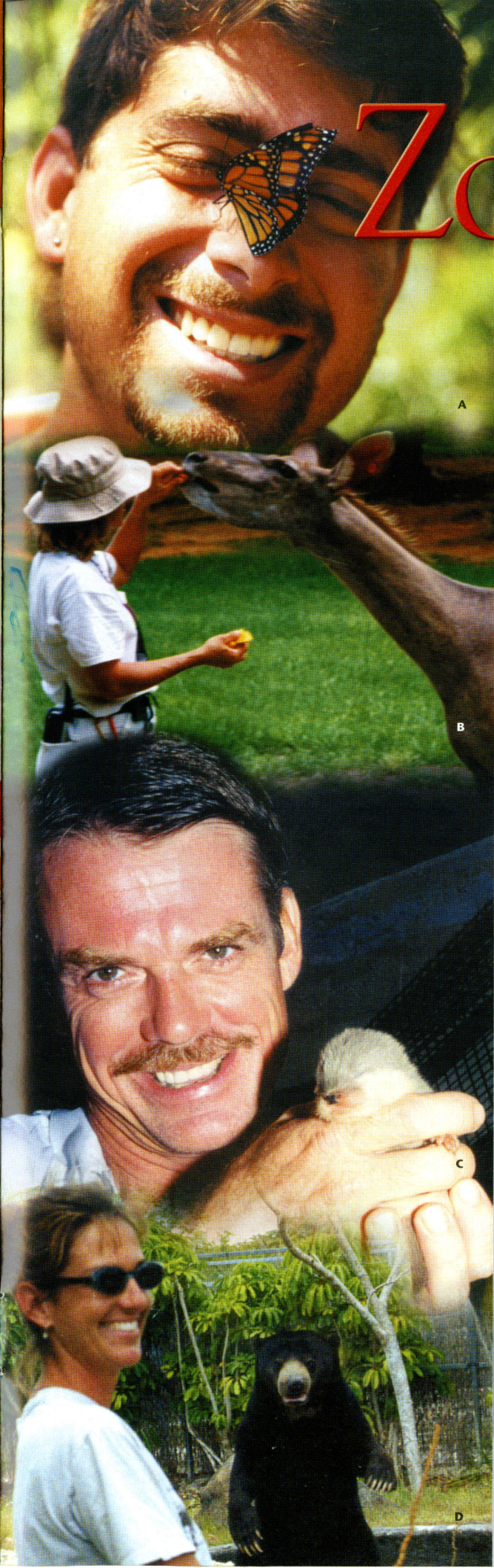

Zookeepers

Why would someone want to be a ZOOKEEPER? Imagine spending your day with exotic animals in a park! The zookeeper is responsible for the livelihood of some of the most endangered and beautiful species in the world.

The zookeeper profession has evolved over time, with many zookeepers today holding advanced educational degrees. They conduct research, provide quality care, and are dedicated to a challenging and difficult job. Zookeepers are responsible for the day-to-day care and safety of the animals in the zoo's collection. Each zookeeper has an area to which he or she is assigned, and each has a niche, a special interest, or knack for the animals under his or her care.

Animal care ranges from working with small insects to the 10,000-pound elephant. Zookeepers are the front-line specialists that know the animals the best. Because they see the animals daily, they know each animal's individual behaviors and personalities.

Without the zookeeper, the zoo could not function. Managers rely on zookeeper input for information needed to make important decisions. The zookeeper is the first individual to notice health concerns, behavior changes, or physical changes with an animal. The veterinarian depends on the zookeeper to provide insight and early communication to provide appropriate medical care.

Zookeeping is a rewarding and interesting profession. It takes a special person with special skills. Miami Metrozoo has a wonderful and dedicated group of zookeepers providing quality care to a great animal collection.

Wildlife Photographer of the Year 2003

The winners of the 2003 Wildlife Photographer of the Year Competition were announced on Wednesday, October 15, 2003 at a special award ceremony held at the Natural History Museum in London and presented by famed ornithologist Bill Oddie. Gerhard Schulz of Germany was named Wildlife Photographer of the Year 2003 for his image, *Gorilla and Boy*, which features Miami Metrozoo's lowland gorilla, "JJ".

The winning image of a young boy looking through the exhibit's cave window at Metrozoo's majestic gorilla was among more than 20,500 entries, from over 60 countries. World Wildlife Fund-UK supported The World in Our Hands category from which *Gorilla and Boy* was picked as the overall winner. Wildlife Photographer of the Year is the world's biggest and most prestigious wildlife photographic competition, jointly organized each year by the Natural History Museum and BBC Wildlife Magazine.

Gerhard Schulz, Germany

"From the other side of the gorilla house at Miami Metrozoo in Florida, I could watch the visitors' reactions as they encountered their relatives at close quarters. Many people came by, pointed at the lowland gorillas and continued on their way, but this boy stopped and stared in awe. It was their expressions that made such an impression on me. There was such a depth of feeling in the gorilla's eyes, and the boy leant against the glass as if he wanted to reach through and make contact. It was a poignant juxtaposition."
