

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
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Our mission is to encourage an appreciation for the world's wildlife and to help conserve it for future generations.

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To all of the friends of Miami Metrozoo and the Zoological Society of Florida:

Since spring is the time for fresh beginnings, emerging blossoms, and extended daylight hours, we invite you to see the great new animals and attractions at Miami Metrozoo.

Among the newest additions to our wild family is Rosie, a 14-year-old female Black Rhinoceros who arrived from Zoo Atlanta with one very important mission- to get

pregnant! Toshi, the 27year-old male Black
Rhinoceros who has
been at our Zoo since
1983, was charged
with the duty. Once Toshi
completes his job, Rosie will

head back to Atlanta to bring her pregnancy to term and give birth. Make sure you take a tram tour to see her before she makes her grand exit!

Similar to Rosie's arrival, we are extremely fortunate to have received an endangered Indo-Chinese tiger from the Fort Worth Zoo. This two year-old tiger is one of less than 2,500 of its subspecies left in the world, 43 of which are only in North America. This individual was sent to us on a breeding loan from the Fort Worth Zoo in Texas with the hopes that Metrozoo will some day be home to a successful Indo-Chinese tiger breeding program.

Spring break week, March 21-27, is "Venom Week" at Dr. Wilde's World.
Captain Al Cruz from Miami-Dade's antivenom unit is bringing venomous snakes, native to South Florida, such as the pygmy rattlesnake, water moccasin, eastern diamondback and some commonly kept

exotics like the cobra. He is hosting demonstrations on how to identify venomous snakes and tips on what to do if someone is bitten.

In addition, Dr. Wilde's World (DWW) and Africa are engaging visitors in some new animal attractions. DWW is offering everyone the opportunity to encounter a live, working bee-hive, chinchillas and a chance for kids to feel the shell of the Redfooted tortoise inside a tortoise pen. A new Africa exhibit, adjacent to the Gorillas, features the Bat-eared Fox and the beautiful Yellow-billed Hornbills.

As you can see, we have many new and exciting things happening here. We welcome you to enjoy the season at the Zoo and thank you for your ongoing support.

Meet Our New Board Member, Aliette DelPozo Rodz

Aquariums date back to 2500 B.C. when the Sumerians, the ancient people of Mesopotamia, began keeping fish in small ponds as a food source. The first actual public aquarium opened in London in 1853. Three years later, the second public aquarium opened in the U.S. This "spawned" the now common hobby of displaying fish tanks in homes.

For years now, farm-raised fish have been sold in pet shops for the freshwater home aquarium. However, saltwater home aquariums are a trend that require other fish, live coral, anemones and sea stars to be taken from the wild. The saltwater fish tank requires the collection of fish from every coastline on the planet. Some of the practices employed to collect these sea creatures are sometimes "unfriendly" to the environment. The damage that is done to the fragile ecosystems of a reef can take more than a hundred years to repair.

Until recently, the captive-raising of marine life was almost nonexistent. Now, more species of fish and coral are being tank raised and propagated for the pet trade. We hope this fills some of the demand for marine animals and that it will ultimately be the only source for them.

Here at Miami Metrozoo's Toadstool, we have a new reef tank, made possible with a donation from Senator Paul B. Steinberg that contains only captive-bred animals and recycled live rock. The live rocks, seeded with differing kinds of sea life, in our tank were recycled from mining and dredging projects, where they would otherwise be discarded and declared a surplus.

Some of the sea animals that we house in our aquarium include: the very outgoing, False Percula Clownfish (Amphipriom ocellaris); the ever so cute Neon Gobys (Gobisoma oceanops); the slow-moving Fighting Conchs (Strombus alatus); the Caribbean Queen Conchs (Strombus gigas); the active, brightly colored, Orchid Dottyback (Pseudochromis fridmani); the blue and black Springeri Dottyback (Pseudochromis springeri); and the majestic Kenya Tree Coral (Capnella sp) can be seen swaying back and forth in the water current. All of these animals inhabit our 26-gallon aquarium, giving a good example of what captive-breeding can accomplish. This is also a great way to demonstrate how we can coexist with wildlife and their habitats. Witness for yourself this busy scene from 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM seven days a week at The Toadstool next to the Children's Zoo.

Tropical America Building Tomorrow's Zoo

In the late 1990s, a group of leading zoo designers and animal scientists began meeting here at Miami Metrozoo. They envisioned a major, 20-year expansion of the Miami facility, that when completed, will provide unprecedented educational opportunities for students from grade school through graduate school. The new Zoo, at the center of a major development initiative that will bring jobs and resources to South Florida for years to come, will be a place for visitors from around the world to encounter a variety of animals in their natural habitat. It will focus the attention of the world on the plight of endangered species, helping ensure their survival. It will be, quite simply, the finest zoo in the world.

Because of Metrozoo's location in the only subtropical region in the continental United States, it has an opportunity to play a unique role in displaying and championing tropical species in a new exhibit scheduled to open in late 2007 called *Tropical America*. Three percent of all the land in the world devoted to zoos is encompassed by Miami Metrozoo. There is no place in the United States better suited than Metrozoo to display the drama and scale of the tropical rain forest and highlight the plight of its threatened species.

At *Tropical America's* central plaza, visitors will discover the sights and sounds of a vibrant village surrounding a large riverfront plaza cleared from dense jungle. Searching pathways leading from the plaza, zoo-goers will find jaguars, giant river otters, black caimans, harpy eagles, Orinoco crocodiles, toucans and capybaras, the world's largest rodent.

Inside *Tropical America*'s Flooded Forest building, visitors will encounter an inundated

forest teeming with life, exhibits featuring species from throughout the Amazon basin and education space where programs will inform and inspire students of all ages. Visitors will walk through a jungle passage into the world of turtles, amphibians, spiders, insects and poison dart frogs. They will explore *Tropical America's* Cloud Forest building and marvel at the wide variety of reptiles and Spectacled owl. In all, *Tropical America* will be home to more than 100 extraordinary species.

For the people of South Florida, Metrozoo's *Tropical America*, larger than the average American zoo at 27 acres, offers the promise of a strengthened "pride of place." For many newcomers with roots in the nations of the hemisphere with rain forests, it represents an important cultural connection and a confirmation of their acceptance into the community's fabric. For the harried citizens and families of an increasingly crowded and busy metropolis, it will provide a needed place of respite.

The task of building a world-class zoo has begun. Each stage of the Master Plan is being carefully developed by experts in zoo architecture, animal welfare and conservation, education, and visitor comfort.

Today, the Zoological Society of Florida (ZSF) and Metrozoo are mobilizing the private and public funding necessary to bring the wonders of *Tropical America* to the people of South Florida and to the world. In its 20-year Master Plan, the ZSF is offering South Florida the opportunity to help build a resource that will provide education, entertainment and economic return for generations to come.

Studbooks have been most commonly used for the purpose of breeding desirable traits in horses and dogs. Today in the zoo community, animal managers use studbooks not to breed traits that are different, but rather to keep the animals from varying from their natural forms or colorations. This is done to maintain the wild characteristics in the animals so that they can be reintroduced into their native habitats. Reintroduction occurs when the danger or threat concerning the species' survival has passed or appropriate protection has been established for the habitat and species.

Studbooks have been in the zoo community since the 1950s and only recently have become computerized. The computer program enables animal managers to keep track of animal breeding, as well as their offspring, for many generations. In zoos, animals are often traded between facilities for breeding; therefore, it can become a challenge to follow them throughout their life spans.

Creating a studbook can be a complicated process. A potential studbook keeper must qualify to become a holder of a studbook by completing a class given by the American Zoo & Aquarium Association (AZA).

> Upon successful completion of the course, a studbook keeper has learned how to collect information and enter it into a

computer program specifically developed for maintaining studbooks called SPARKS or Single

Population Animal Record Keeping System. This program allows animal managers to make informed decisions about which animals should mate together.

Here at Metrozoo, we hold the studbook for the Leaf Turtle (Mauremys annamensis) from Vietnam, the Reticulated Python (Python reticulatus), the Pig-nose Turtle (Carettochleys insculpta), the Cuban Amazon Parrot (Amazona leucocephala), Stuhlmann's Blue Monkey (Cercopithecus mitas), and the Tazmanian Devil (Sarcphilus harrisi).

All studbooks contain information about birthdates, parents, location, collection data, transfers and reproductive history. Some of this information is collected through other zoos that house the species' records of breeding, hatching and transfers. Ideally, studbooks include a husbandry guide (care and maintenance), natural history, notes on conditions for reproduction, past and present animal holdings, as well as habitat conservation. The ultimate purpose of a studbook is to ensure the survival of endangered species in captivity through scientific breeding of the animals in the population.


