Dear Mr. Cralle:-

In accordance with Colonel Geo.R.Lynn's suggestion I secured a kodak and "snapped a few views of the housing that is already constructed here at or near our plantation.

Most of these houses are vacant during the year as immediatly after the tomato and vegetable season is over the workers must move to Miami,Tampa, Fort Myers or elsewhere.

We of course have planned our own housing for our year round and regular labor, and have included same in our budget of expense, but with these houses we can furnish imergency needs for un-employed now.

In this set of pictures I have included one of a man standing in a field of tomatoes just planted, you will note that the land has simply been taken from the hand of nature, the grass mowed, and then burned and it is then ready for the plants; thus you can readily explain the low cost of growing sugar cane or any other crop adapted to these lands.

You will note from the views that we have stores, garages, cales, restaurants etc etc; in other words that we are a real going concern.

I can not think of a single thing which I could add to your set-up and presentation of the actual facts and necessities.
