Dear Mr. Cralle!:-

Yours 13th acknowledging receipt of my telegram ; by this time you have received my letter which I sent to Miami to be mailed from there on last Sunday 14th; as written I hardly think Morris Plan Bank will be able to handle the loan themselves but think Mr. Brice Judge Gramling and Mr. Taylor can arrange through them to have one of the Mortgage Companies in Miami get the loan from Government and in turn loan us the \$750,000.00 which we require; any of the Companies named in my letter are amply able to make a proper showing as to their financial ability and integrity.

Think I will go to Miami on Tuesday January 16th for the purpose of showing them accurately our "set up" as a matter of fact I am at a little dis-advantage as you have the files which they are entitled to examine; think however that I can overcome this. My fear is that the best Companies in Miami are now able to get about all the money from visitors there to meet their loan requirements, you know any established organization must of a necessity have a great deal of confidence in the stability of our company and the reliability of us and our plans to venture in accepting so large a loan for the purpose of re-lending it immediately to our Plantation Company.

You should get this letter on afternoon of 17th or morning of 18th; I will remain in Miami until noon 18th so wire me there just how matters stand at that time, send wire care PAUL C. Taylor 1502 Congress Building Miami.

So glad that you are getting the unqualified support of both of our Senators, and I note with great pleasure that you think we may get this loan direct as it would be so much better for us as well as really better for Government.

Received a long letter from Colonel Lynn in which he outlines a plan which I do not like nor do I think that Government will for a moment depart from their established rules and customs and the Statutes governing loans, we don't expect them to at any rate.

Note that you hope to get the ear of the President; if you speak of me please tell him I am "the long slim Cracker" who climbed over everybody in Chicago Coliseum when he was through his speech, this was I think his maiden speech as the Vice-Presidential nominee in 1919. I assured him Florida and I was "for him" then and we are still with him.

I will wire you Wednesday from Miami anything of importance--If you have written me here either Sunday-Monday or Tuesday anything I should convey to Mortgage Companies at Miami suggest you wire me at Miami brief resume of same; Mrs Jaudon joins in regards, I am
