As I wrote you in my last letter, I think you have a very good contract with Lee County, but my financial condition is such that it is impossible for me to take on any new obligations; in fact, I am trying to get rid of some that I already have on hand. That is my chief aim at the present time. I can not afford to go any deeper in debt.

In your penciled letter of some week or ten days ago, you said that for the past year, you had had to go elsewhere than to your associates in the Chevelier Corporation, for even a conversation. I am sorry that you have felt that you could not discuss any matter with me fully at any time, as there has never been a time that I would not gladly have discussed with you any phase of the Chevelier business or any other matter that you might desire to discuss.

I realize that you have been heavily loaded with debts the same as I have and I appreciate your desire to pay off the indebtedness on your home and raise money for your road work, and I should be very glad to know that you are successful in both of these enterprises. If my friends at Bristow go into the proposition as we have planned, and I am sure they will, altho we have not closed anything definitely yet, the Chevelier will have some money with which it can pay the greater portion of its existing obligations, outside the bonds, and I will have some money with which to take care of our part of the road work, and the payment of the \$10,000 notes due you, will enable you to proceed with your road work and make a substantial payment on your home.

I may have occasion to go to Miami again soon and if so, could you meet me down there for a few days, at which time we can go fully into all matters that we desire to discuss?
