

HUNTING AND FISHING CLUB
and
GREAT GAME PRESERVE

To be located South of the Tamiami Trail
near Miami.

In connection with the announcement that in all probabilities the County Commissioners of Dade County will take immediate action towards the speeding up the early completion of the work on the Tamiami Trail, J.F. Jaudon, President of the Chevelier Corporation announces that they have consummated a sale of 64,000 acres (which is 100 square miles) of the Chevelier or A.W. Hopkins tract, located in the south-western portion of same, directly on the Gulf of Mexico, directly adjacent to and The Ten Thousand Islands the purchase embraces a number inland bays, among them Tarpon, Cannon, Alligator, Dad's, Russell, Cook, Lossman No. 5 and Possum Key Bays, directly tributary to the Gulf.

This sale was made to C.T. Henshall and associates, who after nearly a year's earnest search for a location to establish America's largest, greatest and best hunting and fish preserve, established themselves in the location named.

This will bring ^{to} Florida annually some of the greatest sportsmen and anglers of the United States, Canada and Europe.

They have adopted the name of "The Seminole Hunting and Fishing Club" and it is their purpose to erect Club houses, with garages and stables for saddle horses, at a point they have selected about four miles south of the Tamiami Trail and approximately the same distance from the Gulf of Mexico, to be connected with the Tamiami Trail by a hard surfaced road and with the Gulf of Mexico by the inland bays and Chatham River--hence the Club membership will have access to their Club Houses and preserve by the hard surfaced highway, the Tamiami Trail, and water sufficiently deep, so that one can reach the Club House and property there by both yacht, launch or automobile.

Construction of the Club House ~~xxxxxx~~ and protection of the property will begin in the early part of 1921 and be finished and ready for occupancy by the members for the hunting season of 1921-22.

Mr. Henshall has had prepared drawings of the Club House

which shows conclusively that everything will be first class in every particular.

Hunting and fishing will not be restricted for a great number of years to the property acquired, as perhaps the area adjacent is stocked by nature with more game and fish than any like area in the world.

There will be a commercial side of the proposition, also, inasmuch as the Wardens employed by the Club will plant a number of citrus and tropical fruit groves at favorable locations on the property. Portions of the land will be seeded to Bermuda, Para and other grasses and the Club will stock same with cattle and hogs, which will in no way interfere with the deer, turkey and other game by reason of the fact that these will attract rather than drive them away.

Perhaps this proposition will ^{bring to Florida} ~~xxxxxxx~~ more men of wealth and influence than any similar enterprise ever undertaken.

Mr. Henshall is now in New York perfecting his organization, but at a very early date he will return to Miami, where offices will be established and the personnel of the Club published.
