I am enclosing, herewith, a letter from Mr. W. E. Brown, which with copies of letters from his surveyor in charge of the Cape Sable survey, are confidential and are given to me by Mr. Brown so that you and I may have an idea of the situation there. I presume that Mr. Powers is writing you in the same way.

Mr. Brown's idea is that while it is raining so much and mosquitoes are so bad, that it does not pay the Company to have the surveying done, but that the work should be put off until later in the season under more favorable conditions.
