Dear Sir:

Referring to the attached letter which Mr. Powers asked me to read over and mail to you. I note he refers to my opinion in connection with some controversy the Company seems to be having with the Roberts boys in regard to a land claim.

I was present at a conference this morning between Mr. Powers and Mr. Wofford, and when this matter was mentioned to Mr. Wofford, he stated that he positively would not go down there with the possibility of having the ill feeling of the "Roberts crowd", and Mr. Powers told me that one of the Roberts boys told him that if Wofford bought that land that they wanted, that he would never keep a man on it, and with this information in mind and with an impression that the Roberts family were about the "whole thing" at Cape Sable, I told Mr. Powers I thought it would be policy for the Company, if it was only a matter of a few hundred dollars worth of land, to give them the land and get their good will and make them feel obligated, and no doubt with their knowledge and experience of nine years or more in that section that they could be of considerable help at times with their boats, etc.
