Dear Sir:

We are in receipt of your letter of the 3rd to Mr. Morse in regard to the survey work at Cape Sable for Mr. Powers.

Mr. Jenkins just came in yesterday from Lentana having completed that work, and in Mr. Morse's absence the writer took the matter up with Mr. Jenkins this morning, showing him your letter. He asked me to write you that he didn't feel like he was physically able to go down there on that work at this time, as the last job at Lentana has practically all been in water, as was also the job just previous to that and it has about knocked him out. Two or three of his men came home sick from Lentana, and he does not believe he will be able to get men to go and stay with him on the Cape Sable job at this time. We understand the State Surveyors on the new work in the southern end of this county are having this difficulty on account of the mosquitoes being so bad principally. Mr. Jenkins shipped his outfit from Lentana to Fulford where he has his men ready to complete the work laid out there which he left unfinished when sent to Lentana.

Of course, as far as this office is concerned, we would like very much to keep Mr. Jenkins on the work here until it is completed, especially the Ferrine Grant in anticipation of operations there next season.

If you are unable to postpone this work until Mr. Jenkins feels able to take it up, we would suggest that the services of Mr. W. B. Brown here might be secured. He has within the past few months done considerable work for the Boston Company and we have found him reasonable and reliable.
