Dear Sir:-

We have your favor of the 19th inst. with copy of letter to Mr. F. J. Powers, in re: Taking Mr. Kenan to Cape Sable overland and then back by boat. I will take the matter up with Mr. Powers, but so far as my information goes, this would be a practically impossible trip for you and Mr. Kenan, as I believe you would have to walk several miles.

Last week Mr. Pepper and I went down the Ingraham Highway to the dredge, which was about 2,000 feet from the east boundary of 59-35, the main Jennings' tract. At that time you could go in a car to within about a mile of the dredge but the last two or three miles of the trip was pretty rough. The dredge is making about three-quarters of a mile a month and is at present in very low land. Mr. Pepper is making arrangements to go down and look over that country, especially the Dewhurst tract, in the near future. Last week, while we were down there, R. L. Hill with a hunting party went along the prairie, close to Long Key, as far as the east boundary of Twp. 59-35 where they stopped and camped on Long Key as they could not go further by automobile. They found the traveling pretty rough in going

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even that distance. From that point, of course, one can walk over the pine land several miles west and south. We found parties farming along the edge of Long Key and one of them stated that in the last cold spell we had here that the thermometer went down to 26 degrees.

Please send me a copy of the map showing the levels made by Mr. Livingston from Biscayne Bay to Cape Sable.
