DRAINAGE COMMITTEE ** MEETS ON MONDAY

Proposed Key Largo Canal Discussed and Prompt Action Advised

Largo road was made on Monday of this week when the drainage committee of the Redland District Chamber met with Frank J. Pepper, of Pepper & Potter, Miami, and explained to him the aims of the committee in regard to the canal. Mr. Pepper is the representative of the Model Land Co. which owns or controls the majority of the lands covered by the proposed drainage district. By the decision of these parties the canal proposition will rise and fall.

Mr. Pepper asked what provisions had been made for having the lands surveyed, which had to be answered in the negative.

Mr. Pepper inquired if the Chamber of Commerce could not finance a survey, which was estimated by W. J. Chamber of Commerce was back of it, provided that body would guarantee the payment thereof. The generous offer of Mr. Redd to intercede with the commissioners was accepted.

Seventy-five percent of the land in the proposed district can be drained and made tillable, according to A. R. Livingston, himself a surveyor.
