I expect to be in Jacksonville Friday morning, May 13th, at the Mason, and will take the steamship Apache that day.

I appreciate your letter very much, and wish I had time to have a talk with you.

I rather think now that I will remain at the Hotel Imperial in New York, rather than go to the Netherland, where I had reservations, because I am physically "done up", and my physician here says that I must be careful with myself; so I am looking forward to the sea trip, and yet feel with keen disappointment that I will only get a bird's eye view of the Biennial, as I have not strength enough to get around. This is heart-breaking sometimes, as I know several of the General officers, and Mrs. Sneath is my cousin's mother-in-law, and yet I feel that I will see very little of any body in the crowds.

I am certainly glad that you were able to present the Seminole subject at the D. A. R.; and when you know as much as I do about the conditions you will understand why my writings have been censured in the Jacksonville papers and why our State President has written to the Seminole Indian Chariman saying that she does not wish the resolutions presented at the Biennial. In as much as the subject is now a national one and being endorsed by national organizations, I believe it can go through without Florida, since Mrs. Stranahan says that she would not offer the resolutions, etc., etc. I am hoping to see you, however.
