In advising people who may be interested in the Seminole situation to make their sentiments known, do you think they ought to write or petition Governor Catts or ~~XXXX~~ simply the State Legislature, or both? Those to whom we appeal will naturally want to know who should be addressed, and that point ought to be clear. Of course if we knew the names of the Chairmen of the Indian Committees of the Legislature, or whoever will be behind the bill, that could be given, but the chances are that this will not be known until after the legislature convenes. Our work ought to be well developed by that time.

I would suggest that you send me your opinion on this point by a night-letter, charges collect at my end of the line.
