After getting your last letter I wired you that I would come to Tallahassee any time you said to come. So I have been busy getting my work shaped up so I could leave it on short notice.

I have been much interested in your meeting the Governor and Rev. Dr. Lawler, and what you told me of them.

Mr. Moore of Moore Haven has planned to visit the Capitol, if he has not already been there. I want you to meet him, he is a good friend of the Seminoles, and a man of great influence. Keep a look out for him, and meet him.

Mr. Claude F. Johnson, representing the Times-Union, is also there, and he is a friend also of our Indians. I wish you might meet him.

The Bill as you have it I think is all right, now to get it passed is the next thing. I hope we can get some help from those friends of the Indians at different places by writing to their Representatives.

If there is any thing you think will help out that we can do let me know. As understand the matter, there is no danger of a vote, is not that the way you understand the Gov.?

Let me know when you think I and better come, and I will start at once. I feel very hopeful that we will win out this time, Two such heavy weights as you and Capt. Spencer being on the job, things are bound to move, and to move right too, I think.

Mrs. Willson, joins me in kind regards to both you and to Capt. Spencer. Hoping to see you soon, or it may be you will leave before I get there, at any rate, good bye until I do see you.
