

Kissimmee Fla. March 16th, 1921

My Dear Mr. Moseley:-

I was so glad to get your report of your Everglade hunt, it was almost as good as being in your party. When Mrs. Willson heard the letter she asked for it to send to the Metropolis, - part of it, - as she thought it would be of interest to the readers. I am enclosing the printed article which I trust you do not object to seeing it in print.

The house-boat arrangement you mention sounds good to me, and I wish I were in that class, and could take an interest in the purchase if you decide to put it through, but until I can dispose of some of my real-estate holdings I am very much pressed for ready cash. My taxes this year are over \$900. If I can turn loose some of my holdings I would be on easy street. The times are looking brighter for Kissimmee's future and I believe within six months we will have a better feeling here in business.

I am glad you have looked the Everglade country over and are pleased with the prospects for a future hunt down there. I would like to go on a hunt there and to pay part of the expenses even if I cannot pay for a share in the house-boat at this time.

You certainly made good time the day passed through Kissimmee to get to Esterre that night, it must be more than 200 miles. I am pleased that you saw some of the Indians' land, it will probably be drained by the time they get ready to do much real farming. I know only one Indian down in that section, - Charlie Tigertail, unless some of the other seminole have moved down there. Still I would not be afraid of being scalped if I should be met by any of the Big Cypress Indians out in the woods.

Well when you feel like getting away from home, run down and spend a few days with us, we would be delighted to have you in our home.
