



□ Pay television was one of the chief topics at the recent cable-TV convention in Chicago, and the news—for cable-system operators — was very good. Movie companies, it was reported, are now indicating that they are willing to cooperate with pay-TV planners, and, with all signs pointing to continued growth of cable television, the future looks rosy indeed.

Whether this also bodes well for broadcasters, for theater owners or for viewers is highly doubtful. If a new movie is available at home to a cable-TV subscriber for a dollar or two, he may be less inclined to get dressed, pick up the baby sitter, drive to a theater, stand in line, pay several dollars for a ticket, drive home afterward, pay the sitter, take her home, and then drive back home himself.

□ With several million homes equipped to receive pay programs, the potential home box office for current movies has visions of gold sugarplums dancing in the heads of film producers.

As for the viewers of free television, they are now protected by Federal Communications Commission rules from pay-TV inroads on their programs. Live sports events shown on free television in the past two years may not be taken over by the cable-TV people, nor can most movies from two to 10 years old, the theory being that pay-TV should concentrate on new films and old ones rejected by free television.

□ But there is a hint of things to come. Pay-TV now is permitted to telecast sports programs in blacked-out cities. Once sports promoters get a taste of pay-TV money, once pay-TV promoters get a taste of sports money, the push will be on to handle top sports events only on a cash-TV basis.

There are pious assurances from both groups this won't happen. We'd be happier with assurances in the shape of Congressional legislation.

NEIL HICKEY REPORTS

Next February HARRY REASONER will do a weekly half-hour show for ABC News called The Reasoner Report. The magazine-format series is to include investigative reports, headline news, feature stories and essays . . . JACK BENNY, PEARL BAILEY and GEORGE CARLIN will be on FLIP WILSON's first show of the new season on Sept. 14.

NBC News kicks off its weekly Tuesday-night series NBC Reports in September with an investigation of private pension plans. Reports will be pre-empted once a month by First Tuesday (which used to be Chronolog, which used to be First Tuesday) . . . PBS is making a documentary about Florida's Cuban community called "This Exile and This Stranger," to be telecast Aug. 15.

A new concert series on PBS will offer a variety of music next season: Stravinsky's ballet "The Firebird"; Jacques Offenbach's light opera-ballet "Orpheus in the Underworld"; a version of "Salome," the opera based on the Oscar Wilde story; and Tchaikovsky's tone poem "Romeo and Juliet." But with all this advance planning, the series still doesn't have a title . . . A TV version of "Beauty and the Beast" is being filmed in Germany by BOB PRECHT, who used to hold the reins of The Ed Sullivan Show.

ROBERT VAUGHN is going to Acapulco with BARBARA EDEN to make a CBS movie called "Shadow in the Sun." Vaughn's British-made series The Protectors will be syndicated here in the fall . . . The James Bond movie "Goldfinger" will be ABC's Sunday Night Movie on Sept. 17 . . . Gian Carlo Menotti's comic opera "The Old Maid and the Thief" is the PBS Special of the Week on Aug. 28.

THE HARLEM GLOBETROTTERS basketball team will play at least once per season for the next three years on ABC's Wide World of Sports. Also at ABC--an Olympic appetizer on the July 31 Monday Night Special: the movie "Jesse Owens Returns to Berlin"--site of his 1936 triumphs . . . Humorist JUD STRUNK, who's joining the crew of NBC's Laugh-In, will have his own special on ABC, Aug. 17. LOUIS NYE and ANDY GRIFFITH will be among his guests.

EUGENE O'NEILL's drama "Long Day's Journey into Night," starring Sir LAURENCE OLIVIER and CONSTANCE CUMMINGS, will be telecast by ABC next season . . . Former Ironside cop BARBARA ANDERSON plays the wife of a berserk writer (STUART WHITMAN) in "Fright Night" on Rod Serling's Night Gallery, now in a half-hour edition. She will also turn up on a Mission: Impossible caper involving a search for poison gas.





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To All the World —Via Satellite

How globe-girdling
TV communications have become
a reality

Television has been ocean-hopping for 10 years now, and when "via satellite" appears on the screen, we're more likely to yawn than gee-whiz. Without satellites we'd have to forgo our daily dose of bad news from Vietnam in living color—but we'd also have had to do without live coverage of the Winter Olympics, much of the Apollo moonshots and those endless views of Chinese citizens sweeping



snow off the streets with whisk brooms in honor of President Nixon.

We've come a long way since Telstar, which in July 1962 gave us 18 minutes of shaky pictures from across the sea and proved that man could, indeed, bounce television from continent to continent via space. Although Telstar heralded the age of world-wide TV, regular transoceanic telecasting didn't start until 1965. It began with

the launching of the first commercial synchronous satellite, Intelsat I, nicknamed "Early Bird," over the Atlantic Ocean. Last month, the 13th in the Intelsat series of space birds was successfully launched, and positioned over the Indian Ocean.

Intelsat? That's to keep you from breaking your jaw on "International Telecommunications Satellite Consortium," the organization which owns →

the world's only transocean communications corridor in space, and which at last count included 83 countries. The United States is represented in Intelsat by a government-created but private stockholder-owned company, Communications Satellite Corporation, "Comsat" for short. Comsat owns 52 per cent of Intelsat and supervises construction of the satellites, which are launched by NASA from Cape Kennedy. (NASA sends the launching bills to Comsat, not to us taxpayers.)

The idea behind the Intelsat birds is that three synchronous satellites—the type which hover over a given spot on the globe—can provide television (plus telephone and other communications) coverage to virtually all of the inhabited parts of the earth, if one is placed over each of the world's great oceans.

A communications satellite merely receives radio transmission from one part of the world and retransmits to one or more other places. Because of its height (22,300 miles up), a satellite over the Atlantic Ocean can "see" both the United States and Europe. You could accomplish the same result with a tower 22,300 miles high over the ocean, if you'd like to try it.

To get TV programs or telephone voices up to the satellite and down to earth again, earth stations are required—each one equipped with transmitters, receivers and antennas which are aimed at the satellite. At the end of last year, 51 earth stations were serving 76 countries and territories, and some 63 earth stations are expected to be in operation in Intelsat member countries by the end of this year.

The satellite launched in June was the fourth of the "Intelsat IV" type, a high-capacity bird which is a far chirp from the Early one in 1965. Early Bird was designed for a life of 1½ years (it actually lasted four) and was able to relay either 240 telephone conversations or one TV channel at any one time. The 1971-72 model, Intelsat IV,

is built to work for seven years and has an average capacity of 5000 telephone circuits or 12 TV channels, or any combination (a color TV channel requires as much wave length as 400 simultaneous telephone conversations). With the orbiting of the new bird, there is now at least one current-model Intelsat IV over each ocean—two over the Atlantic and one, each over the Pacific and Indian—and three lower-capacity Intelsat III's are operating to accommodate any excess demand (two are not shown on map).


Except for Yugoslavia, all of the Intelsat member countries are non-Communist, but under the organization's charter, any country is eligible to join. Nevertheless, the Soviet Union has announced plans for a competitive worldwide system (to be called "Inter-sputnik," of course). The benefits of Intelsat (except the profits) are available to nonmember countries. They can receive satellite programs via regular earth-based networking facilities from neighboring countries which are members, or they may build their own earth stations and use the satellite facilities for the same charge that members pay. Communist China has purchased the earth station which was set up for the TV coverage of President Nixon's visit.

Intelsat is strictly for hire, and the U.S. member, Comsat, is a profit-making organization. Let's say you want to beam an hour TV special over the Atlantic. Comsat's "wholesale" rate (to regular customers, such as networks) for shooting a program up to the bird is \$650 for the first 10 minutes and \$18 for each additional minute, or \$1550 an hour. But the program doesn't do anybody any good 22,300 miles out in space, so you have to bring it back to earth. You're nickel approximately the same amount for each receiving point as you paid to send the show up in the first place. Transmitting an hour program from →

the U.S. to Europe, using two earth stations, thus would cost over \$3000.

World-wide, earth stations handled a total of 3563 hours of television last year, an increase of nearly 50 per cent over 1970. In the U.S. alone, almost 1000 hours of TV time were leased from Comsat last year. Usage went up by about one-third in the first part of this year, mainly because of the Winter Olympics in Sapporo, Japan, and the President's China visit.

Although Presidential peregrinations have increased the United States' use of Intelsat this year, we have steadily been growing less dominant as the consortium's principal customer. Last year, our use of the system rose by only three per cent. Intelsat is being used increasingly for programs which are not seen in the United States. For example, Spain now beams daily programs to the Canary Islands, its possession off the coast of Africa.

In the United States, Intelsat has given the people of Hawaii and Alaska the opportunity to watch network programs on the same day mainlanders see them. Some 40 college and pro football games were relayed by Intelsat last year, mainly to American possessions and areas with high concentrations of American troops.

You can't pick up programs from Intelsat's high-fliers directly on the family TV, of course. They're relayed from the earth stations to the regular network lines, operated by the telephone company, and distributed by the networks to local stations.

If programs and phone calls can be bounced across oceans by satellites, why not use the same method to send them within the country? There's no reason why it can't be done, and many communications experts think a domestic satellite system would be cheaper and more efficient than the cable-and-microwave linkage now spanning our continent. The Federal Communications Commission in June issued a landmark

policy ruling which opens the way to establishment of domestic satellite systems to serve TV stations and cable television, as well as telephone and other communications needs within our borders. The FCC said it will consider applications by any qualified parties to establish domestic satellite service.

But the Russians "invented" domestic satellites first, they'll be quick to remind us. Since 1965, the Soviet Union has launched 20 satellites, of which 12 are currently in use, serving up TV and other communications to some 35 earth stations from random elliptical orbits similar to that of the 1962 Telstar.

Let's take it a step further. Why not broadcast directly from satellites to home TV sets? Technically, it's feasible right now for one or two satellites over the United States to send us all our programs. But any such system is currently considered impractical—it would mean replacing all home antennas with special, more costly, dish-shaped ones to be aimed at the satellite, and, as TV station owners point out, it could mean the end of all local programming.

But direct satellite-to-TV-set broadcasting makes sense in large, backward countries where no network facilities exist and large sections of the population could benefit from TV's educational and informational potential. The governments of the United States and India have tentatively agreed to a test program next year, using a special communications satellite to beam such programs to community TV sets in 5000 Indian villages where television has never been seen.

The full potential of satellite TV has scarcely been glimpsed. Since 1965, communications satellites have made a start by opening up the world to live television interchanges. Today, one out of every six people on earth can participate in history as it is taking place—live via satellite. And that's the beginning. **END**

She's Karen Huston,
who's allergic to horses

Actresses have to be either hardy or hard-boiled to make it big in Hollywood. Karen Huston hasn't made it big yet, but she has done pretty well in the past five years—roles in top TV shows, notably *Hawaii Five-O*, *The Bold Ones*, *Mannix* and *The Mod Squad*, and in a few movies.

Hard-boiled she is not. She hasn't the heart to poison a gopher which is destroying her new rock garden.

But hardy she is. Maybe it goes back to her Norwegian ancestry. "I have nine uncles, all more than 6 feet tall," says the diminutive Karen. "I see them as Vikings."

Karen herself made the return trip to Scandinavia a few years ago to marry a Swedish boy she had met while both were students. The engagement didn't work out, but she got a job modeling in the same department store in Stockholm where Greta Garbo got her start. When she left Sweden she went to New York and began studying acting.

Eventually she came to Hollywood, where she was cast in various TV series and in the movie "The Boston Strangler."

She's now in a position to be choosy about the parts she plays, and her choice does not always depend upon the size of the role. "I look for something to show the humanness of a character," she says.

Although she is allergic to them and had to carry a box of tissues while riding in horse shows, horses rank close to acting in her affection. She got her own first horse when she was just 9 years old, a gift from her father, who took her to see a horse she had admired, and around its neck was a sign reading, "Hello, Karen, I'm yours."

Once a horse slipped and threw her, crushing five vertebrae. Her back still bothers her, but that doesn't stop Karen Huston. She's hardy. END

First Law of Broadcasting: You can't get a nation-wide audience for a talk show unless you feature big bands, big-name entertainers and big comics.

Second Law of Broadcasting: You can't get a nation-wide audience for a talk show on which people merely talk to each other.

Third Law of Broadcasting: No pure talk show survives in the daytime, because housewives have the concentration span of a flea.

Nobody has ever written these laws down in formal code. But they might as well be chiseled in stone. Everyone at the networks recites them. Experience, say the experts, has proven them out.

Only . . . it's not so.

Sitting smack in the unlikely city of Dayton, Ohio, is a talk-show host who has violated these laws, and turned his violations into one of the more successful syndicated properties in the United States. His show is a solid hour of real talk, featuring the famous and the unknown—and it's devoured by a nation-wide audience of housewives in 40 cities, including San Diego, Cincinnati, Milwaukee, Philadelphia, Detroit, Boston, Cleveland, Tucson, Miami, Atlanta, New Haven, Denver and Indianapolis.

The name of this perverse gentleman is Phil Donahue. As he puts it: "We're the freaks of the industry. You're not supposed to be able to do what we've done, but we've done it. What's happened to us is beyond our wildest dreams. Now we're at the crossroads, in terms of whether we're going to remain a moderately successful syndicated operation or become a really important national show. It all depends on whether we get a full hour in New York and L.A."

You'd think that "New York and L.A." would be falling all over themselves to nail down a young man who has solved the problem they've never quite been able to solve—but it's not as simple as that. *The Phil Donahue Show*, in its own special way, is unique.

To understand why, you have to know something about the show itself, and about its host.

In one sense, the PD show is exactly like all other issue-oriented talk shows that ever have existed. You could figure out the list of guests yourself: Ralph Nader, Gloria Steinem, Germaine Greer, Jane Fonda, Bill Kunstler, Dick Gregory, Jerry Rubin, Mort Sahl, Tommy Smothers, Sander Vanocur, as well as a motley crew of

Turning The Silent Majority into a Chatty Group

unwed teen-age mothers, prostitutes, practitioners of free love, homosexuals who want to get married and advocates of abortion, prison reform and morning-after pills for co-eds. Such voices of the "counter culture" are leavened with an occasional visit from such as Billy Graham, Bob Hope, Meir Kahane, Ralph de Toledano, and even Lester Maddox and George Wallace. And the whole is sprinkled with visitations from Jacqueline Susann, Rod Serling, Rod McKuen and their like. As Donahue puts it: "We're not consistently heavy."

You can't tell people that they've enslaved black people on Monday, that they're polluting rivers on Tuesday, that they're napalming babies on Wednesday. It's a question of emotional tolerance. We're varied. But we do tend to feature the blue jeans and tie-die-shirt set."

All this, of course, sounds like the typical N.Y.-L.A. formula for failure—the very type of largely "relevant" line-up which causes ratings to go crashing

housewives, and answer phone calls from other housewives.

These American women, while curious about all these new subjects, are by no means part of the "counter culture," and are often tartly critical of its far-out aspects. They give *The Phil Donahue Show* a flavor unlike any other issue-oriented talk show. To watch it is to watch Americans react, under your eyes, to the most controversial issues of the day—and to see their evaluations

down from Coast to Coast. Only the ratings don't go crashing down. Phil Donahue, starting with one show in Dayton, Ohio, picked up those 39 cities in less than three years.

The reason is fairly obvious. This is a talk show which doesn't simply lecture, day in and day out, at the viewing audience. It talks directly to that audience—and gets answered back. The PD show invites the active participation of American housewives, and gets it. In the studio, guests sit knee deep in a small intimate audience of Dayton

of the spokesmen for these issues. Ultimately, it is the viewers who set the terms of the discussion, establish the emotional context, and have the last word.

Phil Donahue grumbles: "A lot of people call me a radical fink. They say I'm destroying the moral fabric of America." He likes to grumble about this. The truth is quite the contrary, however: Phil Donahue has created a successful televised talk show featuring the "Silent Majority"—and that "Silent Majority" talks its head off and →

listens to itself with eager fascination.

Who is this young man who had the brilliant idea of allowing the public to participate actively in a discussion of public issues? Depending on who is talking, you get widely varying descriptions: A competing talk-show producer in Detroit, a sophisticated chap with a far smaller audience, calls Phil "a lightweight, an intellectual pantywaist." A sophisticated New York woman, Betty Rollin, senior editor of the now-defunct Look, considers Donahue "an earnest young man who does an interview show that is both agreeable and intelligent." Bill Barrett, TV columnist for the Cleveland Press, describes Phil as "probing . . . compassionate . . . intelligent" and thus sums up his "image": "He's the kid next door and the parish priest and the cop on the block. There's warmth and sex appeal and stern authority."

The peculiar thing is that *all* these descriptions are valid. First and foremost, Phil Donahue is an American Irishman, with a Catholic education in humility that has permeated to the marrow of his bones: "I went to grammar school," he relates, "then had eight years of all-boy education—Catholic high school, then Notre Dame. I think the Catholic input has a greater impact on the personality than any other religion. The message I got was: life is evil, a vale of tears full of temptation. Embodied in the message, but unsaid, was 'You're lucky if you get through it!' It left me wondering if I was good enough to make it through this path of sin. For years, as a kid, I was taught to say: 'Lord, I am not worthy!'"

Over this base of original sin was a layer of pure American middle-class ambition. At Notre Dame, Phil majored in business; graduated in 1957; worked for a bank; then switched to broadcasting. He was a reporter for WHIO, in Dayton, for eight years, where he anchored the 11 o'clock news. Then in 1964, he hosted a successful talk

show for three years. And in 1967, WLWD in Dayton offered him a contract to do another—and the Phil Donahue phenomenon was born.

During these years of interviewing people of all types and all manner of convictions, Phil's horizons were broadening. He was becoming aware of his own insularity: "Do you realize I was 20 before I realized all Jews weren't rich? The only black people I ever encountered were at Notre Dame, and I thought they could all run the 100 in 9.5. As far as I knew, black men either carried the garbage or they were running backs for the Cleveland Browns. As for women, they either made hot, steaming apple pies or they were cranky virgins. Women were here to serve men. They were inferiors. They were also occasions of sin. The black male and the white female were good only for their bodies, not for their heads!"

Suddenly opened up to new currents of thought, Phil fell hook, line and sinker for the new and revolutionary ideas which were fermenting around him. He became a first-rate knee-jerk liberal, by his own admission. He satirizes his development, describing it in three phases: "Phase one: 'Wow, where have I been? I gotta go out and become an activist!' Phase two, the angry phase: 'Everybody's a bigot but me. Nobody understands but me. Boy, I'm aware! The world is 10 miles behind me!' Phase three: the sudden overwhelming realization of the staggering enormity of the problems, the realization of my own inadequacy, the determination to try to work for what I believe, knowing I probably won't make a dramatic front-page New York Times contribution."

Today, like a good many others who have acquired a set of new ideas, Phil often finds himself preaching what he himself doesn't practice. An advocate of women's lib, and a member of NOW, he is struggling to reform his attitudes toward women: "My wife, →



Marge, she's gone through this future shock with me. She got the scholarship to college, I didn't. And she had five babies in six years. For the last year or so, she's realized she's got a brain, she realizes she can have goals and make contributions outside the home. I encourage her—but it's from the neck up. My gut reacts differently. There's still a part of me that wants her barefoot and pregnant."

Donahue is also intensely uncomfortable over the disparity between his own achievements and ambition, and his assorted anti-Establishment views: "With these attitudes, you can get schizo. Here I am with significant misgivings about what's happening in America, yet I'm making a good deal of money. The question is: how successful can I allow myself to be without becoming one of the prostitutes?"

To further complicate the picture, Phil Donahue, when he emerges from his recurrent self-flagellations, is a delightfully Irish Irishman who can lapse comfortably into the broadest of brogues, complete with brilliant twinkles in his piercing blue eyes.

Phil Donahue is an unusual mixture of opposite strains: humble, arrogant, sincere, phony, serious, self-mocking, idealistic, cynical. They all rattle around in him a bit uncomfortably because none of these strains is ever realized to the full.

But, together, they pay off in one unusual way. They make him a unique talk-show host. He can relate to almost any guest alive—and he is utterly without condescension to his audience. He's one of the few men on television who can simultaneously stuff his show full of the "counter culture" while treating Middle America with the utmost understanding and respect. He really is "the kid next door, the parish priest and the cop on the block"—with a medium-sized streak of "radical fink." **END**

Democratic Powwow In Miami a Far Cry From Chicago Days

It was a far cry from Chicago, and TV convention-scarred newsmen couldn't have been happier or more relieved. Whether it was because a new Democratic Party had assembled here and such old pols as Mayor Daley weren't even around to berate them or because the tensions and concerns of American life have taken different, milder directions, not a vestige turned up of the bitter antipathies TV aroused at the 1968 conclave. "It's a pleasant crowd to cover," CBS floor-man Mike Wallace told us. "The reason, of course, is that the outsiders are on the inside this time." NBC's Garrick Utley agreed: "Everybody's entirely friendly." The peace was pervasive. Even Walter Cronkite, who saw "thugs" below him in '68, was moved to say he found the delegates' decorum on opening night "absolutely great." The people at home evidently approved of TV's decorum, too. Networkers claimed most phone calls were "complimentary," only a few objecting to TV's aisle-hopping and analyzing.

If the blight of Chicago in '68 was a thing of TV history, however, the networks had a new worry in the slippage of their convention coverage as a ratings blockbuster. At the peak of prime time the first two evenings of the Democratic powwow, which at least offered moments of who's gonna-win suspense, Arbitron surveys found nearly a quarter of the TV audience looking at nonconvention fare. And Tuesday evening before ABC switched to Miami Beach, *Marcus Welby* grabbed 36 per cent of the set-siders while the best CBS and NBC could muster on the con-

vention pickups was 26 and 20 per cent, respectively. (Not surprisingly, CBS, riding high on Cronkite's popularity, was topping NBC in convention watchers for the first time since the birth of Huntley-Brinkley in 1956.)

With little suspense in store for the GOP gathering in August and with millions going down the drain for gavel-to-gavel telecasts, CBS and NBC officials eyed ABC's abbreviated late-evening wrap-up more and more enviously. As for keeping the tube lit for those all-night wrangles, many a TV newsmen could sympathize with the engineer at ABC's Manchester, Vt., outlet who, when he heard a motion to adjourn at 2 A.M. Tuesday, didn't wait to hear it overruled, switched off the transmitter, locked up and went home.

On the last evening of the convention, after complimenting themselves on a well-run meeting, the Democrats blew their big chance for candidate McGovern to open his campaign in prime time. While delegates frittered away hours wrangling about whether a reform charter was to be enacted now or two years from now, the Eastern electorate, which had been looking forward to meeting Sen. Thomas F. Eagleton and hearing McGovern, began to drift off to bed. The victor's forceful address finally hit the air shortly before 3 A.M. ET. This time it was even too late for the West Coast—midnight.



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This Week's Movies

With Conrad, Hardy and Caligari to inspire you on three evenings, you might just as well spend the other evenings of this network-movie rerun week brushing up on your classics.

Actually it's writer-director Richard Brooks who'll inspire your reading of Conrad, since his 1965 154-minute film version of *Lord Jim*, happily to be repeated in one piece rather than last March's two segments, does better by movies than by the Polish writer's 1900 novel. Brooks has concentrated on the visuals, the literalness and the superficialities that are the juice of a mass-audience spectacular. Hopefully you'll turn to the book to find the intellectual complexities that validate the statement that precedes the film, that "no man was more respected or more damned than—*Lord Jim*." And enjoy the movie as a romantic adventure story.

The second installment of *Far from the Madding Crowd*, along with the first, may not turn you back to the Hardy original, since John Schlesinger's 1967 film certainly captures the scene, characters and *ambiance* of that 1874 work. But its visualization of Hardy country and people can enrich a reading of his other novels—"Jude the Obscure" or "Tess of the D'Urbervilles"—immeasurably.

A second viewing of Robert Wiene's *The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari*, that 1919 root of all psychological horror stories, can only increase one's fascination with its tale of the somnambulist in thrall to the evil showman. It might interest you in other horror-movie sources: for instance, try reading Mary

Shelley's "Frankenstein" to rediscover the compassionate allegory that got lost.

The 1967 film of Graham Greene's *The Comedians*, with screenplay by the novelist and direction by Peter Glenville, is as topical a political thriller today as then, and if it doesn't turn you to Greene's other works—you're unturnable.

The week's remaining repeats can turn you into a fresh-air fiend, if not a reader. *Day of the Evil Gun* is a 1968 Western with ex-gunslinger Glenn Ford, ex-peacelover Arthur Kennedy and Apaches all wanting Ford's wife; *Tarzan and the Jungle Boy*, which in 1968 was a gold-plated observance of the 50th anniversary of ape-man movies, offers pretty color photography of South America masquerading as Africa, and 1967's *The Viking Queen* has Carita, a Finnish actress, masquerading as a Viking; American Don Murray as an ancient Roman, British actors as Druids and total idiocy rampant. The expected dose of the supernatural (and the silly) is provided by the TV quickie-flick repeat, *The People*, enough to discourage anyone from teaching in rural communities and/or watching this stuff.

The week's one newcomer, a 1953 flick that hit few if any big screens even in those double-feature days, is Thursday's late movie, *Desperate Search*. It's a contrived mechanical suspense story involving a search for kiddies lost in a plane crash.

What can you say about a 52-year-old producer who had four weekly shows on this past season? Jack Webb is himself, the character he began to play in "Dragnet" on the radio in 1949 and always played while he was an actor: a tough, doughty, gravel-voiced American who believes in law and order and has made that belief work for him. Look at last year: *Adam-12*, in its fourth season, was generally rated in the Top 10. *Emergency!*, not a police show but still enough within that general, authoritative, "Voice of God" mold to make it unmistakably a Mark VII Production, scored well enough to ensure its return in the fall.

There were two casualties, *O'Hara*, *United States Treasury* and *The D.A.*—but to balance that, *Dragnet* is now being seen in syndicated reruns in 160 cities across the country. And next season another new Webb-produced show debuts—*Hec Ramsey*, starring Richard Boone as a 1901 gunslinger turned frontier detective.

So Jack Webb would seem to be doing something right. To find out what, and to see how the winds of change have ruffled him in the last few years, we sat down with him in his trophy-laden office at Universal and—in one of Webb's rare recent interviews—explored a few sensitive areas.

Q. *Why do you think your police shows, Dragnet and Adam-12, have been so successful?*

A. I've thought about it a lot and I've never been able to come up with a definite reason. On the one hand, having enough ego to have been a performer, I

could say it's because they love me and Ben Alexander and Harry Morgan and Marty Milner and Kent McCord so much. But the shows were never designed as personality pieces—or else we would have called them *Friday and Smith*, or *Malloy and Reed*. When I designed *Dragnet* with Jim Moser, we decided that wasn't the way to go for a documentary approach: the people aren't as important as the overall idea. So I really don't think it's that.

Maybe it was the infinite patience with which Moser and I built up the detail in *Dragnet* that they liked. We tried to show the police officer as he really was—not the fellow who stole an apple from the fruit peddler on the corner. I think we dispelled an awful lot of myth in our day; I think we showed that policemen weren't lone wolves, that they worked together. We showed that captains and lieutenants didn't do all the work, that you could be a sergeant or a policeman and still solve a heavyweight crime.

Then, perhaps the lack of histrionics in all areas gave it a different look, a subliminal acceptability.

Q. *In the last couple of years there seems to have been a rush of books (like Joseph Wambaugh's "The New*

Centurions" and "*The Blue Knight*") and films (like "*Dirty Harry*" and "*The French Connection*") which have claimed to humanize policemen by showing their weaknesses as well as their strengths. Will this have any effect on the way you do *Adam-12*?

A. First of all, the way Joe Wambaugh tells his side of the story is no more the whole truth than the way we tell ours. I think there's much to be said for both ways, but his books are no more accurate or "human" than what we do on *Adam-12*. We've admitted many times that the police make mistakes, both on *Dragnet* and *Adam-12*. People tend to forget that; nobody can possibly see or remember all the shows we've made.

Joe Wambaugh is a dedicated man, or else he wouldn't stay on as a policeman [a detective-sergeant with the LAPD—Ed]. But I do get the feeling when I read his books that they're more of an exposé. But I've always felt that the policeman has been the underdog of society; part of what he became was due to the indifference of the public. I don't like it when a policeman gets away with holy hell or bloody murder any more than anyone else does. But they haven't for so many, many years.

When you do police stories, you're

talking about every policeman in the United States if not the world. I think when a policeman needs all the help he can get in today's rather distorted sociological scene, you have to help him, you have to tell the truth about him. It's what Joe Wambaugh doesn't write; I think there's much to be said beyond constantly tearing down.

Q. How do you react to the charges that shows like *Dragnet*, *Adam-12* and The FBI may be making some of the more radical young people antipolice by showing a one-sided picture?

A. Things are never as black and white as some people make them out to be. I repeat—neither side has a lock on the truth. If I do a story of a crooked or a disturbed policeman, either he'll be eliminated from the department or he'll be straightened out and remain on. But I won't just leave it raw. I think it's improper reporting not to tell the other side of the story. Of course, you sacrifice something in the area of sensationalism when you do that. *Dragnet* and *Adam-12* aren't as exciting as the Wambaugh books or "*Dirty Harry*" in that respect; we don't have the heavies inside the department itself. We're not doing stories about the guys we know will eventually be weeded out. We're doing stories about everyday working policemen.

I also think that this business of having to know everything about what goes on is bad. The release of the *Pentagon Papers* did irrevocable harm—there are certain things you can't know about and still have diplomacy or security.

It's not the province of entertainment to expose. We're primarily supposed to →

entertain. You have a little tougher job doing that when you document. We can't find ourselves a district attorney who's a crook or a rat because he's not allowed to exist. If he were allowed to exist, the whole machine would fall apart like a two-dollar suit.

Q. Your projects, especially recently, all seem to have the same kind of subjects as well as a definite style of writing and acting. Is this deliberate?

A. At my age, I suppose that having had great success—and great luck—dealing with pro-law-enforcement material, I do have a tendency to lean in that direction. It's no secret that everyone in my small group is pro-law enforcement; it's the only way you can treat a subject fairly. My own fascination with police work came while I was researching *Dragnet*; it was pretty much virgin territory then. It became an in-depth belief of mine that here was a group of men trying to upgrade their work against all the odds. I felt, and still do, there was high drama in it.

As for a definite style, all I can say is that the only thing we've always insisted on is an economy of dialogue. We like a clean script, not too much verbiage on the part of the officers or doctors or prosecutors. Aside from that, there are no hard and fast rules. If the writers are working to a certain style, it's not because of any edicts I've laid down. Writers do tend to stick to successful formulas, however—that may be part of it.

But this business of a monotonous style of acting has been going around for years. We play old radio and television shows and compare them with more recent programs, and there is a hell of a difference. The so-called monotone disappeared after about the third season, but for some reason it stuck in people's minds. It piques us because we know we've changed over the years.

Q. There were rumors that at least part of the reason why O'Hara wasn't

renewed was that CBS sacrificed it to the cause of antiviolence in order to keep a couple of other rather violent shows with higher ratings. Any truth to that? And how do you feel about violence on television?

A. As far as I can figure it, and you never really can in this business, O'Hara failed because it was in the wrong time slot. We were on too early, up against *The Brady Bunch* and *The Partridge Family*, and the early hours belong to the young in this country. Then, too, probably David Janssen—who is one of the finest television actors we have—should have had a side-kick, somebody to work with. Very few shows are successful with just one continuing character.

As to the subject of violence, as far as I know, it had nothing to do with the show's cancellation. There is a lot of violence on television, and I think it's because there is no central clearing house for subject matter. One producer does a show with a certain amount of violence in it, then another follows and then another, seven nights a week. So almost certainly you wind up with an overwhelming amount of violence on television. I don't think any one producer intentionally loads his show, but in the aggregate we have a very violent spectrum because we don't know what other producers are doing.

Q. What about your own acting career? Do you ever have any ambitions to return to it?


A. I was never really very deeply involved in acting. I've always had a great love for the production side of the business. But I must admit that there is a lot of satisfaction in performing a role if you do it adequately. It's immensely flattering to stand outside a theater and watch people paying money to see the face that you look at every morning while you're shaving. And aside from that, you can make a hell of a lot of money—which is nice, too. **END**



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
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
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
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UFOs

It's done wonders for his duck hunting.

I know lots of people who turn the sound *up*, not *off*, when the commercials come on. Most of them claim there's as much suspense in the commercials as in the soap operas, maybe more. One of these days, they hope, some housewife is going to swing her pocketbook at that grocer for taking out his dentures and rinsing them while she's in a hurry to get the tomatoes weighed and get on to the meat counter. One guy swears he was watching one night when that creepy gal asked, "Is it . . . irregularity?" and her uncomfortable looking friend replied, "I got the trots. You got a dime handy?" You can see why the commercials have a lot of fans.


Some viewers only enjoy seasonal entertainment. A guy in the car pool

played the tuba in the West Pratfalls High School Marching Band. He goes to the kitchen and fixes a sandwich while the big football game is on and then sits glued before his set during the half-time show. He says kids don't blow tubas like they used to.

Myself, I'm a talking-head freak. Never mind the establishing shots, showing the bustling newsroom or the foreign correspondent diffidently posed before the Eiffel Tower. Give me the close-up—eyes flashing, eyebrows wiggling, jaw flapping—of a screen-filling talking head.

Tastes vary, but my favorite talking head was Lyndon Johnson. When he talked to the electorate, the audio and video complemented each other like ham and eggs.

Hubert Humphrey keeps you on →

your toes. The words come out so much faster than the lips move that it is like speeded up sound dubbed in over silent film. But it's the real-life HHH, make no mistake about that.

Some of my favorites are showing their age. Eric Sevareid's commentary has become so measured you suspect he writes—and talks—to a metronome.

Walter Cronkite is a talking head for all seasons, but they keep cutting down on him and using more and more film. And now they've cut David Brinkley back to one wry a night.

Public Broadcasting is superior in talking heads because of its thoroughness and its imagination in finding people who can tell you more than you want to know about almost everything. If an airplane crashes into a mountain top, Public Broadcasting will bring together a panel of talking heads. A geologist will explain how mountains were created, an aeronautical engineer will explain why airplanes fly, a prominent woman will explain that more women should be pilots, a black will make the same point about blacks, and three behavioral scientists will discuss the social implications of the disaster. There will also be an ecologist to explain how running airplanes into mountains disturbs the balance of nature.

Public Broadcasting also has the unquestioned all-American solo talking head, a chap by the name of Buckley with a remarkable repertoire of facial grimaces and an arcane vocabulary that few of us can understand. No matter. His emotions are as clearly shown as were Fear, Surprise, Disgust, etc., in the old silent pictures and he is as good, if not better, with the sound turned off. Or you can tape people like the President, or Humphrey, or George Wallace, or Julia Child, and use them for the audio to go with the video of Buckley. It's quite an experience.


With the exception of Buckley, and two expensive dropouts from commercial broadcasting who have just joined

up—Sander Vanocur and Robert MacNeil (who shook things up in their first show by bringing us talking heads from a shopping center in Columbia, Md., and the Country Music Hall of Fame in Nashville, Tenn.)—the talking heads in Public Broadcasting tend to fall into two categories: (1) those who have something to say but never get around to saying it and (2) those who have nothing to say but who are very facile with words.

One night a while back our household, including the dog and cat, was assembled in the living room, to watch the public television station. My wife is on the board of directors of the Washington Theatre Club, and Public Broadcasting was going to inform the Nation about the club's modest efforts to raise the cultural level of the Nation's capital. I wanted to try the commercial nets to see if they had any talking heads that night, but I had my viewing orders to watch the Theater Club special: "Try it, you'll like it."

My worries that there wouldn't be any talking heads on the theater program were unfounded. A head with minstrel-show glasses and a Buffalo Bill mustache which belongs to the theater's artistic director, Davey Marlinton-Jones, appeared and talked. There was a play-reading in which two heads talked interminably and inconclusively. The glasses and mustache head reappeared and talked with the audience. The camera panned the audience and came to rest on another talking head—that of the lady of our household. A husband, four offspring, an indeterminate cat, and a blooded golden retriever leaned forward intently as the head (our very own talking head, by golly) continued to talk. Mother, it turned out, falls into Category 1.

After the show was over, we all sat around and talked about it. Too bad Public Broadcasting didn't have its cameras there. It would have made another great talking-head show. END



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
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Can This Marriage Be Saved?

Or will sports fans and team owners continue to bicker?

It happened, inevitably, that a cry of pain rose in the celestial paradise of Los Angeles when it was announced that the 1973 Super Bowl, awarded to that city, would be blacked out on local television.

This will be the seventh Super Bowl; all have produced blackout complaints.

During the National Basketball Association play-offs this year, local blackouts angered the citizenry. And grievances grew in Indianapolis when locals were deprived of the delayed telecast of the 500-mile race.

And it has been a lingering beef that baseball's *Game of the Week* isn't shown on TV in the town in which it is played.

Obviously, a misunderstanding exists between the sports fan and the sports promoter over the respective rights of each. The result is repeated quarrels.

To start with, the sports fan has deluded himself scandalously into believing that the televising of events is his birthright. And, encouraged by lawyers and politicians, seizing the air in behalf of the people, he has demanded someone else's property.

Heaven knows no shortage of sports on television has been reported in America. Each weekend, the populace watches the stuff until its eyes swell.

In pro football as many as four games are offered on a weekend. And now we even have gone to night-watching, taking up positions before the box on Monday evening.

Those who favor the lifting of local blackouts often suggest that events be televised after all the tickets have been sold. An infantile approach, mainly because it overlooks the predicament of the ticket-buyer. He asks himself quizzically:

"Why should I be the patsy here? Why should the others wait for me to buy the seats so that they can watch for nothing on television? I, too, would like to see the game for nothing."

To conduct his business in an orderly manner, the promoter can't have conditional television. He must decide at the outset whether the show will be aired. And if he decides that it won't, this is distinctly his privilege, however regrettable it may be that many people are deprived of watching.

But if the promoter has rights, the public does too. In cities throughout the land, it squanders millions for sports facilities, often operating them at a loss. It makes rental and tax concessions to team owners. It also is asked to get behind the teams and back them at the gate, enduring foul weather as well →

as fair.

So committed, the public needn't accept owners who aren't qualified to run a sports franchise. In their ineptitude, some owners make capricious decisions that louse up the team, rile the community and upset children, while fielding a team that wallows for years in the depths of the standings.

As things now stand, the only requirements for purchasing a sports franchise are (a) money and (b) a record reasonably free of arrests. Say, for instance, a guy is big in poultry. He has made a fortune selling chickens to Colonel Sanders. A millionaire in town, he finds this is no longer a distinction. The town is full of millionaires.

To project himself above the garden-variety rich guy, he buys a major league baseball team, promising to bring a pennant to Cactus City. But he knows as much about baseball as his catcher knows about Cornish game hens.

Cactus City, meanwhile, has passed a bond issue, authorizing a \$50-million stadium. And, for its money, the public sees one manager fired, another hired, the second fired, the first rehired and then fired again in favor of the first-base coach. The trades become ludicrous, and declining attendance and a bad press prompt the down-hearted owner to sell the club—to a group that moves it to another city.

To this day, citizens of Washington, D.C., blame the absence of baseball in that community on Robert Short, proprietor of the team that left their loving bosom for Arlington, Texas. Short explained that losses suffocated him in Washington. But fans contended that the club was mismanaged and the tickets overpriced (highest in baseball).

During the time Charles O. Finley occupied Kansas City with his Athletics, he was ever at odds with the populace, which growled constantly at his unconventional ideas. Piqued, Finley responded by leaving for Oakland, where,

with a winning team, he is less than a box-office smash.

A whim on the part of Philip K. Wrigley has deprived Chicagoans of night baseball at Wrigley Field. And San Diego, which built an expensive indoor stadium and supported its pro basketball team respectably, saw it vanish overnight when its owner, Robert Breitbard, sold out at a fat profit to a group that shifted the club to Houston.

It has been the view here for years that those seeking to operate a sports franchise be subjected to a test to determine their qualifications. The examination would feature an interview with a board that included at least one qualified psychiatrist.

The whole thing needn't be a big deal, but at least as searching as an upper-level civil-service exam.

When we discussed this idea a while back with a football owner, he responded, "OK, so you make sports owners take a qualification test. Then what are you going to do about a guy who wants to buy a pizza stand? Will he be subject to a test too?"

In truth, he should be, considering the amount of bad pizza turned out today. But the purveyor of Italian food-stuffs doesn't fall into the slot of the sports operator for several reasons.

To start with, thousands of fans never meet pizza bakers at the airport to welcome them home from a road trip. Second, their employer doesn't claim that the public has a proprietary interest in his privileged business, which serves as community flagbearer. And, finally, the man who buys a pizza stand doesn't run it in a structure that his town built for him at a cost of millions.

If communities are asked to support pro teams, house them and suffer the travail that comes from rooting for them, they deserve to approve the owners.

But once these owners are approved, no one has the right to tell them how to televise. END



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
